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TEXAS SENATE REJECTS FERGUSON APPOINTEE

In a secret session of the Texas Senate Wednesday, F. L.

Denison of Temple, Texas, was rejected as a member of the Texas State Highway Commission. Mr. Denison was appointed by Governor Miram A. Ferguson, to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Cone Johnson of Tyler, Texas.

In the failure of the Senate to confirm this appointment, Central Texas and Coryell County loses the possibility of having a real friend on the Highway Commission. In this we mean that on account of Mr. Denison's home being at Temple for many years and familiar with the road conditions in and near Temple which includes a portion of Coryell County that it is likely another appointee would be unable to render this county such an aid and assistance as Mr. Denison.

The action of the Senate is deeply regretted by -many in Gatesville and Coryell County. Th reason for disapproving of the appointment was given on account of Mr. Denison's participation in the construction of the highway from Belton to Temple under a previous Ferguson administration.
