THE ANTI-DISCRIMINATION BILL

House Bill No. 476 by Greathouse. This bill provides that corporations and persons engaged in the production, manufacture, or distribution of any commodity in general use, who intentionally for the purpose of destroying competition of any regular, established dealer in such commodity, or to prevent the competition of any person who in good faith intends and attempts to become such dealer, shall discriminate between different sections, communities, or cities of this state by selling such commodity at a lower rate in one section than charged for such commodity in another section, after equalizing transportation costs from the point of production, etc., shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to fine or forfeiture of the charter of corporations so offending upon quo warranto proceedings by the Attorney General.
