

Under a recent deficiency ap-propriation by the State Legisla-ture, Coryell County Schools are to receive \$3,469.00 to be dis-bibuted by the state of the stat tributed as follows: Industrial department \$575, Transportation account \$1,414, High School tuition \$1,480. These amounts are to take care of deficiency in are to take care of deficiency in 1931 and 1932. These various departments were authorized to expend a *d*-finite amount of money, which they did, and the same was to be repaid by the state. Heretofore the State had only paid 60 per cent of the High School Tuition budget and 50 per cent of the Transportation bud-get. This appropriation is to take care of these deficiencies. Gatesville High School will be the greatest benefactor from this appropriation, in Coryell County,

THE TOLL OF MEMORIAL DAY

Memorial Day saw diverse means of commemoration and celebration, but probably the rankest and most inexcusable of all took place at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, where death claimed two lives at the expense of speed artists and their enthusiastic promoters and fans.

On a day that was set aside for paying honor and respect to those who so heroically gave their lives upon battle fields for the sake of their country, 10,000 spectators for a visit. jammed the amphitheater at Indianapolis and cheered with delight at the record-breaking speed of one motorist, while four men had previously dropped from the race-two killed Billy of Osage, and Mrs. Jack instantly and two others seriously injured.

It was a victory for the driver who raced to win that day but a horrible tragedy to the families of those who met Sunday. their unexpected death.
