
The cotton control plan will raise the price of that commodity by cutting out over-production. This subject should be of vital interest to the cotton farmers of Coryell County because the time is not far off when state agricultual authorities will put the proposition to us and we are going to either be ignorant on the subject or well enough informed to take advantage of the opportunity to help kick the price of cotton up to the new level.

Mr. Farmer, the federal government is going to allow you rental in cash on so many acres that you already have planted in cotton if you will plow up that cultivated land. The amount that you will be paid will be based upon the average production of your land at the present price of cotton, or you can take an option on your estimated production and collect your rental whenever the current price is good enough. The Wallace plan is a bargain for you now and a life saver for you later.
