Civilization begins and ends with the plow. The American civilization, the destiny and future of this great nation of ours, today, rests in the hands of the cotton farmers of the South. What will be your verdict? Will you deliver yourselves, your family and your country out of the chaotic crisis that now exists into days of prosperity and rehabilitation?

Farmers of Coryell County, we are not confronted with a mythical fantasy in this plan for cotton control; We are faced with a vital, living condition. Such a condition as now exists presents two eventual solutions. If the cotton growers of America fail to lend the cooperation expected of them by President Roosevelt and his administration and refuse to take in this colossal cotton reduction program, the greatest, most deplorable of all economic reverses is inevitable. On the otherhand, should the farmers see fit to accept the offer of the national government to lease a percentage of their cotton acreage, thereby reducing by twenty-five percent the probable 1933 cotton production, it is also inevitable, witout reservation, that the price on the raw product will reach a new level which has not been experienced for more than four years. The beneficial results of such a change in price are easily anticipated.



The fact that allocation of \$400,000,000 to states for highway construction has been completed by the federal public works board should be of vital local interest. Coryell County will likely participate in this program to the extent of something like \$600,000, enough to build lateral roads all over the county, and incidentally a much needed

The features provided in the plan for the expenditure of this vast sum of money for the sake of re-employment and economic recovery are several and highly worthy. First, each employee will be granted thirty hours work a week with fixed minimum pay, and this will be under contract. Secondly, no convict labor will be permitted, which is only fair and just to unemployed civilians. Thirdly, the projects must not be concentrated; in other words, the entire county must be benefited by the the program of improvements. The alloted amount of money must not be centered in one locality although that locality might easily stand all the money that has been provided for the entire county.

The federal control board has had enough foresight to instigate provisions of the public works program that are fair and impartial and each county in Texas should cooperate with the board by observing the provisions which that board has defined.


