Predict Certain Races Will Be Close

It will be a big day tomorrow, an occasion which comes only once every two years in Texas-the day when Democrats of this state go to the polls to cast their final vote for the party nominees prior to the general election in November, when Democratic nominees will face the selections of other political parties.

This year has been a record-breaking one for balloting in Texas with approximately 1,019,000 votes cast in the first primary. Coryell county polled approximately 4,725 and will likely cast the same number in tomorrow's election.

Campaigning has tapered off with most of the candidates making a last-minute appeal to the voters.

The following names will appear on the ballots tomorrow, with the choice of the candidates resting entirely in the hands of the voters:
