The proposed amendments will be voted upon by members of all political parties.

The Democratic party has gained a powerful grip in the halls of Congress and the election today will determine whether or not this grip will be strengthened or not.

A punting duel in the first half of the game between the Gatesville Hornets and the Marlin Bulldogs here last Friday on a rain soaked field and played most of the time during a heavy downpour ended in a 20 to 0 victory for the heavier visiting team when the Bulldogs got the ball in the Hornet territory early in the third period

We were very clear in our remarks that the holes needed to be filled and to the satisfaction of many local residents most of these bad places have been repaired. We understand however that it is going to take some rain before general repair work can be done successfully on our gravel roads and streets. The rain which came Friday afternoon will help to make road improvements possible and it is very likely that this week we shall see road graders and gravel trucks busy taking advantage of the recent shower that fell over most of the county. + + + +





No. 2. The Founding of Fort Davis



-Thiak-Talk-Write-Texas Centennial in 1936

On October 3, 1854, United States soldiers, searching for a "water route" to the Far West, marched up Limpia Canyon into the center of the Davis Mountains in the Big Bend country of Texas, and Fort Davis was officially founded on October 7. according to records of the War Department. The mountains were thick with Mescalero Apache Indians, and travel was difficult, but this big Fort made setement of the mile-high region possible. Its work done, the Indians safely on a New Mexico reservation, Fort Davis was abandoned in Its charming ruins, some of the most extensive in Texas, may still be seen within a stone's throw of the little city of Fort Davis which now stands beneath the forbidding cliffs of the Davis Mountains. The lower picture, taken in 1886, shows the fort in its prime, while above is a most excellent photo of the officers who were stationed there at that time. 
