## Welcomed Rain Falls Over Entire County Filling Up Streams

3 TO 4 INCHES IN PLACES

Rain reports from over the county are very pleasing, with the heaviest in the north, south, and west, and lighter in the eastern sections. Jonesboro reports four or five inches during the whole time. Reports from McGregor, Waco and east are good to light rains.

Hamilton yesterday reported 2½ inches; Clifton, a good rain; Valley Mills, light; Meridian, some rain; Waco, light.

As far east as Tyler, we have reports that there was a light rain there.

In the county, the Leon was reported up and the Cow House came down full. Pidcoke, Pearl, Evant, Jonesboro, Turnersville and White Hall had 3 to 4 inches.

Second prize went to Roy Bond, relative of L. D. Nobles, the date of the paper being March 17, 1885, the prize being \$10.00.

Third prize went to J. T. Patterson, grandson of M. T. Wallace, who had a paper dated May 9, 1885, winning \$5.00.

During the celebration, six three pound cans of coffee were served and seventy-five dozen cakes.

## TURKEY MARKET NOT UP TO OLD STANDARD

Turkey market opened in Gatesville Tuesday following the Armistice Holidays and according to local buyers the market is not very favorable, and the quality bad.

Most of the birds have had to hustle for themselves and on account of the drought are considerably smaller and of poorer grades than heretofore. With the rains of this week the quality will probably be considerably better for Christmas than for Thanksgiving.

Thanksgiving market will probably close here about the twenty-sixth on account of the time it takes local dealers to prepare the birds either for local markets or for shipment.

The somewhat charitable enterprise conducted by a local church organization recently, referred to as a rummage sale, should not be considered a selfish project, regardless of the fact that the nominal receipts will be used for the benefit of the organization. ## World Comment

According to the Supreme Court "a scoundrel and thief of the lowest level of crookdom" sounds just as bad on the floor of the United States Senate as anywhere else. And United States Senator Huey Pierce Long of Louisiana will have to stand trial on charges of liberling Samuel T. Ansell, as his Senate immunity has been waived by the superior court. Ansell was in charge of the committee investigating the election of Senator John Overton of Louisiana, one of Long's colleagues. And, the Kinkfish didn't want Ansell or anybody probing around in his election affairs, so Mr. Ansell was termed on the floor of the Senate "a scoundrel and thief of the lowest level of crookdom." And Mr. Ansell wants \$500,000 for this statement.

THE CENTENNIAL will probably hit some rocks in its path toward success but encouragement is also forthcoming from some sources. As pointed out in an editorial in the Dallas News, Frank G. Huntress, publisher of the San Antonio dailies, calls for a united Texas to hold a 1936 Centennial worthy of the name and compliments Dallas on its overwhelming vote for a \$3,000,000 bond issue which will help finance the celebration. Dallas should be complimented for its hearty endorsement of the Centennial and so should Mr. Huntress. You remember the Alamo city wanted the Centennial as well as Dallas, but did not bid as high. Congratulations to Mr. Huntress, the kind of a Texan we can be proud of.

THE GOVERNMENT is worried over the shrinkage in cotton exports for the current year. According to figures from Washington, only 1, 153,000 bales were exported from August 1 to October 27 compared with 2, 202,000 for the same period last year. This is an alarming decrease—of over 2,220,000 bales, and its effect will most certainly be felt in Texas and Coryell. This year's crop, as reported earlier in this column, is estimated at 9,443,000 bales and although it is one of the smallest on record—due to the drought and acreage reduction—the surplus which the government now holds will be as large next year as now if foreign and domestic consumption does not increase. Unless something is done, there is little hope for a better price on cotton and that means that the farmer will have to make his profits elsewhere, but where?

**Review of Emergency Aggie Programs Made**

COLLEGE STATION—Reviewing the Extension year in an advance report sent to Washington O. B. Martin, director, pointed out that the regular work of the Service conducting demonstrations over a period of years with the rural citizens of Texas was the thing which made it possible to swing the great emergency agricultural programs which constitute the most spectacular phases of the year's work.

"The cotton, wheat and cornhog programs were handled by farm demonstration agents through the help of local committees composed in many cases of men who were carrying on demonstrations on their own farms," Mr. Martin stated.

"The erosion control programs of the United States Department of Agriculture Erosion Control Camps and those of the Department of the Interior fitted right on to the regular terracing demonstrations Texas farm and ranch people have been carrying on for years. Fitted on and added impetus also. This has been a great terracing year in Texas.

"Extension livestock work and home meat canning formed the

basis on which was erected the Government's drouth relief program of cattle buying and canning. The use of retired acres for foods and feed to be consumed at home and the Secretary of Agriculture's effort to put more into grass was related to and promoted in connection with the live-at-home program Texas Extensioners have laid the foundation for in years of solid

pantry demonstrations and the permanent pasture demonstrations which have made such progress in recent years.

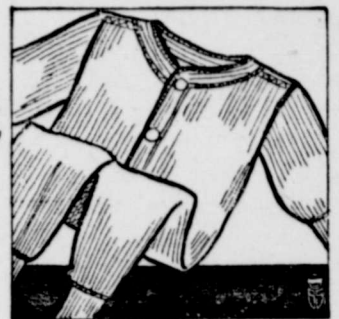
