There are thirty Womens Home Demonstration clubs in ment of 611, and one girls' club with an enrollment of 14.

The Coryell county Home Demonstration Council with an enrollment of sixty has been organized. The council sponsored a county wide exhibit in Gatesville in October, and the Gatesvile Chamber of Commerce very kindly donated prizes for the exhibit.

Club work this year consisted mainly of pantry and clothing work. Reports from clothing and pantry work show that 6,582 articles of clothing valued at \$8,400.40 have been made by club women and that 124 foundation patterns have been made.

Every two years, just before the regular session of the legislature convenes, we hear a lot about tax reduction. It may be caused thru the promises that nominees made to the people over the country about how they would re- future of tranquillity and prosduce the tax burden. Regardless of how it may come perity. about we hear entirely too much about it.

The legislature of Texas has never reduced the tax burden and most likely it never will. It is true that the last regular session cut down its appropriations by about twelve million dollars, but the State ad valorem was just about the same as it has been in other years.

Special taxes levied here and there just as the sulphur tax, cigarette tax and the various oil taxes, along with other special levies are an entirely different matter from what is considered the property tax. The latter is the one that most of the people are concerned about.

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

David, farm demonstration agent. Mr. Manning had about 300 hens which were laying 75 eggs a day. These chickens were bodly infested with fleas and lice and were not getting a balanced ration. After culling his flock to 190 hens and treating them for fleas and lice, Mr. Manning put them on a balanced ration. As a result of this, he is getting 100 eggs a day from his 190

Baird-D. M. Jones of Callahan county will have fresh tomatoes for the Christmas holidays becouse he packed green tomatoes in dry sand and allowed them to ripen, according to Ross B. Jenkins, farm demonstration agent. Due to the late rains in the fall, Callahan county farmers had a fine crop of green tomatoes, and many inquired as to how they might preserve them for fresh use. Under the direction of the farm demonstration agent, Mr. Jones packed them in dry sand using care that no tomate touched another and leaving about 1 inch stem on each tomato. That was done before the first frost, and about 30 days later he exhibited some evenly ripened fruit. He says that hec an easily hold the tomatoes for 60 days.


