BODY TAKEN TO HILLSBORO FUNERAL FOR MRS. MARTIN

Sam Duffie, 62, who moved from Gatesville many years ago, W. Martin, one of the pioneers strength of the Temple Wildcats being sponsored by the Gateslast Saturday morning at 3:00 o'clock. He was ill only a few days prior to his death.

Mr. Duffie had been a resident of Hillsboro for several years and had made occasional visits to his mother who lives at Gatesville. He was a cotton buyer at Hillsboro and prominent in civic cirles there.

Services were conducted at 1 p. m. Sunday at the residence of his mother, by Rev. C. A. Morton, pastor of the First Baptist Church of this city, after which the remains were carried overland by Marshall and Ma.shall, undertakers, to Hillsboro for burial.

The deceased was born in Gatesville November 1873. He is survived by his widow, his mother, one daughter, Mrs. Lance Walker of Hillsboro, three sons, Earl of Tyler, Homer of San Diego, California, Sam of Tyler, and two brothers, Willie R. and W. A. Duffie of Gatesville.


