



## FARMERS TO ELECT COMMITTEEMEN TUESDAY

### City and County School Men Attend Important Matters in Austin Wed.

**BANKS ACCEPT VOUCHERS**

Superintendent Williams of Gatesville public schools and County Superintendent J. M. Witcher were in Austin Wednesday of last week attending to urgent school matters. They report that the department of Education seems to be anxious to do all in its power to give every boy and girl a high school education without extra cost.

The teachers of Coryell County are grateful to the banks for handling their fourth voucher, thus paying the first four months' salaries in cash. Local tax, which will be reported by February 15 will pay one or two more vouchers for a majority of the schools. State aid schools have received a warrant for one-half of the salary and transportation aid. All transportation applications must be filed with the Rural Aid Division of the department of education by March 1st. All of these reports should be in the County Superintendent's office by February 15th, in order that

### LOCAL MAN IS CONNECTED WITH FT. WORTH FIRM

The regulations for the 1935 Cotton Program provide that each county shall be divided into communities of five hundred producer units, and further that the community committeemen shall be elected by the farmers themselves. Three Committeemen and one alternate shall be elected for each community. Under this plan Coryell county will be divided into seven communities with three committeemen elected from each community. The community committeemen will elect out of their group the county Committeemen.

All present committeemen and principals of the various schools are requested according to schedule of elections to be held, which is given below, to announce the time and place for the election in their community so that all farmers can attend and vote in the respective election meetings to be held Tuesday, January 29. The cotton program is a farmer's program and should be run by the farmers. They are given the privilege of electing their community committeemen. It is hoped and desired that the farmers shall elect competent and efficient men to this responsible office.

There is given below the list of the several school districts which have been combined into one community, the place at which the election will be held and the chairman of the election meeting. The date of each election of the different meeting is set for Tuesday, January 29, at 10 a. m. Farmers are urged to attend these meetings and cast their ballot.

The voting in the following combined school districts will be held at Oglesby with Jim McKelvin as election chairman: Oglesby, Eagle Springs, Horse Creek, Whitley Creek, Coryell Church, Osage, Coryell Valley, Coryell City.

The voting in the following combined school districts will be held at Turnersville with O. C. Weaver as election chairman: White Hall, Turnersville, Mt. Zion, Mosheim and Jonesboro.

The voting in the following combined school districts will be held at Gatesville in the Court House with Roy Hayes as election chairman: Newland, Bigham, Leon, Woodward, Spring Valley, Lincolnville, Enterprise, Hay Valley, Schley, Spring Hill, Ewing and Turnover.

The voting in the following combined school districts will be held at Purnela with Frank Blair as election chairman: Murrel, Levita, Oakton, Ireland, Purnela, Liberty, Evant, Cowhouse, Arnett, Springtown, and Plainview.

## Pledge

*I will think—talk—write . . . Texas Centennial in 1936! This is to be my celebration. In its achievement I may give free play to my patriotic love for Texas' heroic past; my confidence in its glories that are to be. . . . .*

There should be no kick-back from cotton producers this year. It will be their duty to elect their own community committeemen instead of serving under appointed committeemen as was the case during the past year. An election of men to fill these highly important roles will eliminate any criticism of the central crop control administration. In cases where faults or grievances arise over the committeemen the farmers will be casting reflections against themselves, for it will have been their duty to select their own choice in these men and will have no one to blame but themselves. The plan will be pursued very much like the recent referendum on the Bankhead Act. The success of the referendum is largely responsible for the decision to leave the matter of electing community committeemen up to the farmers in each district.

Evidence of the wit and wisdom of Senator Tom Connally, of Texas, was outstanding in a recent news dispatch from Washington. It seems that Senator Connally had obtained the floor when the senate convened to get action on his "hot oil" bill. A debate arose between two other senators, to which Connally yielded. After listening to the argument for about half an hour, the Texas Senator put an end to it by saying, "This is an oil bill, not a gas bill." The popularity of Tom Connally, distinguished statesman from this district has grown steadily in Washington circles as well as in his home state, and what's more we are inclined to believe that he is a favorite with the President.

Vice-President John Nance Garner is remaining quiet on the possibilities of his teaming up with Roosevelt on the 1936 Democratic ticket. Reports have already leaked out that the party leaders have tagged the Texan for renomination along with President Roosevelt. When queried on the subject, Garner declined to be quoted on any reaction he might have to such a proposal. The amiable Texan, known as Jack to his intimate friends, is living up to his reputation by wearing the poker-face. He is that genuine type of person who never makes doubtful statements but on the other hand cracks his whip with a determined will when the whipping time is positive.

People about here, especially Gatesville folk, are beginning to wonder seriously what the five-and-a-quarter mile highway east of the county seat is going to be used for. Old timers claim the abandoned highway would make an ideal track for exercising gaited horses, if they had gaited horses. The younger set claim it makes an ideal spooning area. Just what the bob-tailed highway will produce no one seems to know. A good surface has been put on the road and it will be useless for cultivation. The only idea we have to offer is that the strip of land, which is five and a quarter miles long by fifty feet wide, be converted into the only state park site of its kind west of the Mississippi. **ROOSEVELT AND GARNER**  
Apparently that will again be the battle cry of the Democrats in 1936. It was disclosed Monday that President Roosevelt wants Cactus Jack to again be his running mate at the next election. And thus the aspirations of some half dozen prospective candidates were shattered at the blow. Secretaries Ickes and Wallace—the two liberals in the cabinet—were the main "prospectives." With this development, any doubt about the president wanting Garner to be his vice presidential candidate was definitely dissipated.

The Democrats in Washington are passing the word around quietly that they are going to get Bill Borah's scalp in 1936. The senator from Idaho will come up for re-election then—and the New Dealers are ready with popular Gov. C. Ben Ross, who was elected for a third term as Idaho's chief executive in the fall elections. Borah entered the senate in 1907.

Another old timer up for re-election will be Senator Carter Glass of Virginia—ardent critic of the Ned Deal and its legislation. Glass apparently will have little opposition.

Senaoor Huey Pierce Long is making plans to seek the presidency in 1936, having definitely broken with the Roosevelt administration. However, the Kingfish has to come up before the people of Louisiana for reelection in '36—but ah, he has fixed that as he fixes everything else he wants in the sovereign state of Louisiana. At a special session of the Legislature recently, the Kingfish obtained passage of a bill which permits him, if he receives the votes to get the Democratic senatorial nomination in his state next January. So the Kingfish is all set for his debut into national politics—probably on his "Share-the-Wealth" ticket.

Prince Eraest von Starhemberg, vice chancellor of Austria and virtual dictator of the country, by his control of the powerful Heimwehr, has announced that his organization will decide shortly when young Archduke Otto of Hapsburg is to ascend the throne for which he has so long waited. Heretofore von Starhemberg's attitude on restoration of the monarchy in the diminutive country has been doubtful but his declaration in favor of the return of the Hapsburgs, who ruled Austria for five hundred years before the World War, is the greatest gain the monarchists have made since the war and means that the return of this powerful ruling house of Europe is imminent.

The Austrian peasantry has long favored the return of the dynasty—rather strange to say, as it suffered the most during the war which the Hapsburgs presumably provoked. Nevertheless, it is not the middle classes of the cities that is backing Otto in his efforts to secure

the throne.

Italy is known to favor a restoration in Austria as a means of keeping Nazi Germany from annexing the country. The attitude of France is unknown—but presumably Foreign Minister Pierre Laval reached some agreement with Mussolini concerning the matter in their recent conversations in Rome. The main obstacle remains the opposition of the Little Entente nations—Yugoslavia, Roumania and Czechoslovakia, all of which were created or profited out of the break up of the dual monarchy at the close of the war. However, France and Italy can probably calm these rather nervous states long enough to whisk Otto into Austria and put him in firm control of the crown.

## FIRST NEWSPAPER PRINTED

A printing press 300 years old and an exact reproduction of what is believed to be the first newspaper in existence, are on show at the exhibition of post-war type revivals in the Technical library of St. Bride institute.

W. T. Berry, the librarian, who has arranged the exhibition, says this old press is undoubtedly the oldest example of the original form of hand printing press in existence in England with the exception of one of a slightly earlier pattern that can be seen in the South Kensington museum. "It is practically identical in design with the hand press used by Caxton, but it is the only one of its kind found in Great Britain in which both horn and wood have been extensively used.

Mr. Berry places the probable date of the machine's construction somewhere about the year 1625. It was found in a Fleet street cellar about 30 years ago. Fastened to the lid of the press is a replica of what is thought to be the first

newspaper ever printed, the Nieuwe Tidinghen (New Tidings).

It was published in Antwerp in 1616, and, with the possible exception of the Frankfurter Journal (1615), is the first newspaper in the modern sense of the term. The first English newspaper, the Weekly News, appeared in 1622. — Montreal Herald.

Connolly believes that inexperienced girls are far easier to direct, more spontaneous and more charming than girls who have appeared in the musical comedies or films.

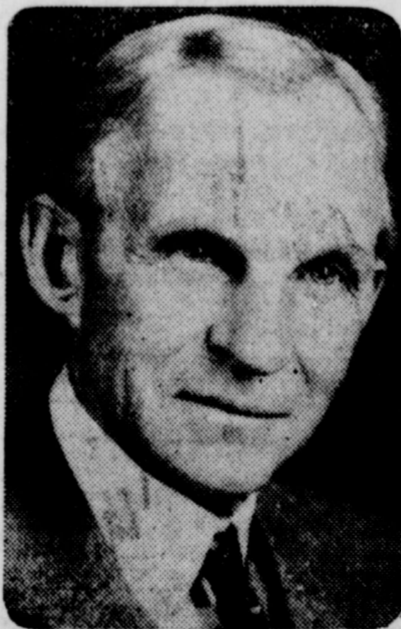
Before Connolly started casting for the picture, he let it be known that experience wasn't necessary for a girl to get a spot in "Flirtation Walk."

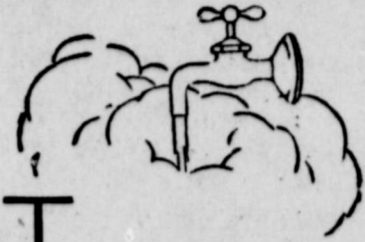

## UNUSUAL INCIDENT RESULT OF CENTENIAL

Dallas, Jan. 24—An unusual incident, an outgrowth of the general interest being developed regarding the coming celebrations of the Centennial of Texas' independence in 1936, occurred here when, to preserve a historical record in official form, the certificate of citizenship and oath of allegiance to the Republic of Texas, signed by William Bradbury and dated Sept. 20, 1841, was filed a few days ago in the County Clerk's office here by F. J. Glenn, Bradbury's great-grandson.

Bradbury, who was district judge of Austin county when it embraced territory now divided between Austin and Waller Counties, came to Texas from New York after having come to the United States from England. He traveled by boat from New York to New Orleans and came overland from that point to the Lone Star State, arriving here in 1838 or 1839.

# FOR INFORMATION of City of Gatesville TAX PAYERS

Current (1934) taxes now due will become delinquent if not paid before February 1, 1935. On that date city taxes for 1934 thus becoming delinquent will have a penalty of 10 per cent added, and the Law also adds an additional charge of 6 per cent interest for the full time thereafter that such taxes may remain unpaid.

## AS FOR DELINQUENT TAXES FOR ANY AND ALL YEARS PRIOR TO 1934:

All such delinquent taxes can be paid, without any penalty or interest charges whatsoever, provided they are paid between February 9 and March 15 of this year, (1935).

If you fail to pay such delinquent taxes within the legally provided period of February 9 to March 15, 1935, then, in view of such failure, the penalty of 10 per cent is placed back upon such delinquent taxes, and also the 6 per cent interest charge is restored from the time such taxes become delinquent. These are provisions of the Law over which Tax Collectors have no control.

These legal provisions, enacted by the last Legislature, can be availed of only within the periods specified above, and the consensus of public and legislative opinion appears not to give any ground for the expectation that further relief or extension of the present provisions will be offered. This for the information of all city taxpayers.

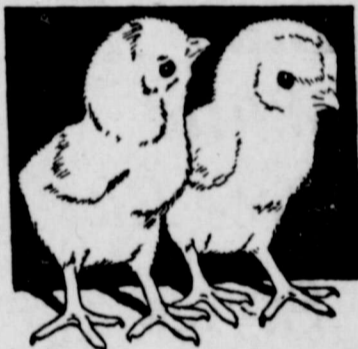
