Sixty citizens, enthusiastic good roads boosters, Chamber of Commerce officials and county of-Architects for Church ficials from Bosque, Tarrant, Bell, Johnson, Williamson, Hill and Coryell Counties met in the District Court room in the Coryell County court house Wednesday afternoon to continue to formulate plans begun at a meeting held in Cleburne Jan. 15 by the North and South Airline Highway organization.

This group has been organized at the suggestion of Tom B. Blackwell Jr. of Whitney, for the purpose of securing one of the proposed five national highways through this section of the country. The highway is the International North and South Airline Highway which begins at Winnipeg, Canada and continues through Tulsa, Okl., Fort Worth probably through Mexico and Central America and on into to South America.

In order to relieve the heavy burden now carried on Highway 2 between Fort Worth and Austin, to shorten the distance by some 30 miles, and also to furnish a highway to this section of the country, which is considered not adequately served by a hghway running north and south, the committee is planning to secure the highway thru sections of the counties mentioned.

Even if the highway should not run through any one town it would prove a great benefit to this section, the organization believes.
