The following remarks were taken from the speech delivered by Judge Sam Scott of Waco at the Roundtable Banquet Tuesday evening:

GOVERNMENTAL PROBLEM
Gentlemen I hate to present a dark picture for you young men as you are about to enter life as men of tomorrow, but what is the use of a man that is able to foresee the problems confronting us and then not tell people that are reasonable minded about them.

When the colonies formed the United States there was one particular problem that faced the people. The problem of personal freedom. Later after the states were formed into one Union, there was another problem that stood before the people of the United States. The problem of rights of the States. At one time the Union tried to divide over this difference with the slavery problem playing an important role in this issue, however, the people confronted this matter and over-through it in a most serious manner. Costly in property and human life.

Today the United States is facing a governmental problem that is much more serious than either of the two mentioned above. The problem of personal selfishness in our social and economic life. In your city, our state and all over the United States, selfishness has become a common and universal practice. When men are elected to office they prepare a platform to run on. After elected they are so involved in their personal selfishness, they forget the piatform.

Less than ten per cent of the people of these United States control the money in circulation today. Many people high in public esteem content the money should be redistributed in some form. A man that some people consider a joke, has stressed his opinion on this matter, Huey P. Long has said this situation has got to be controled by some system. (I am not a follower of this man,) however, he is being taken seriously by people of the United States, and has been invited to appear before three Legislatures of southern states and discuss the issue of the day, "Redistributing the Wealth."

In a few years, if something isn't done, the majority of men with their families will become hungry, and the United States will enter a period worse than any period since the organization of this country. Not by any means take a million dollars from a man that is worth more than that and hand it out, but by some system redistribute the money. My confidence in my country and the good sense of the people show it will be only a few years until when a business transaction is made, people will think more of humanity than of the green-backs or gold involved.

More and more of these special clinies are being formed in connection with the state university hospitals, These hospit-
als, in addition to giving genals, in addition to giving general post-graduate informatian o the medical profession, can to physicians and smaller hospitals that are handicapped by the enormous cost of adequate
facilities. This service includes facilities. This service includes
group study, diagnosis and outline of treatment, thus giving the patient the benefit giving knowledge of many specialists. As the program is extended, every physician in every state will be abde to secure competent group consultation services for very early suspected cases of
cancer of the breast and reproductive organs. This is already true in several states
For people outside of the medical profession are aware that practically all the state medical societies of the south have adopted active five year cancer
control programs. These procontrol programs, These pro-
grams include the establishment of additional cancer treatment clinics. They aim to give to the public the latest knowledge regareing the itrovention and cure of cancer of the breast and reproductive organs. They seek to reduce needless suffering. They plead for early cooperation from patients at the time when maximum effectiveness can be secured from x-ray, radium and surgery, and then the cost of hospitalization and treatment can be kept at a minimum.
Will these clinics and hospitals be used? Will the physician be consulted when treatment can be most effective The issue is squarely up to the cancer patient. He must make full use of very available existing agency.
