## WHY NOT INVESTIGATE?

Down at Austin the "insiders" regard the investiga tion situation as a stand-off between the Senate and the Governor. Mr. Allred is said to have exerted his influence with members of both bodies to have the matter dropped. The "insiders" say that is what will happen, with the Senate satisfied with checkmate.

At the beginning everybody admitted that Mr. Allred had put a troublesome monkey on the Senate's back when at his request, the House passed the joint resolution calling for an inquiry into the private employment and source of income of all legislators. In the late campaign, it will be remembered, Mr. Alired made much of the charge that many members of the Legislature were receiving pay from corporations and individuals interested in state legislation, and frequently asserted that the public interest suffered greatly thereby
Then when the Senate turned around and broadened the resolution to take in the recent record of various state along with the campaign finances of elected and iefeated state candidates in the recent campaigns and the ins and outs of the late speakership contest in the House, everybody agreed that the Senate had put the first monkey's twin brother on the Governor's back.

Now it is a case of "horse and horse," is the cheer ful view of the insiders at Austin.

But the public's view is not quite so cheerful. It is less interested in the checkmating of the Governor by the Senate than in the things that were said on both sides, implying that there are somethings not generally known at Austin that might be of public interest. Letting the matter drop officially is easier than getting the public to forget it

What seems to be in danger of being overlooked at Austin is that, although neither the Senate nor Mr. Allred can claim a victory over the other, nothing of what has been charged and implied by both has been disproved.

The public has not overlooked that point, and the more nothing is done about it by those who ought to do something the more the public will be impressed with the force of the saying that where there is much smoke there must be some fire.

It would seem an act of elementary responsibility to the public, as well as of self-justification and self-protection, on the part of both the Legislature and the Governor to join hands to bring about an investigation so complete that it would leave no unlighted corridors to stimulate imagination or suspicion. The best way-indeed, the only conclusive way-to establish the baselessness of the charges, insinuations and inuendoes, is to unlock all the doors and open up all the books. Worth Star-Telegram.
