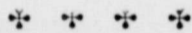
### BUSINESS WOMEN'S WEEK

### INTERSCHOLASTIC COUNTY MEET

Facing us this week is an important occasion, Coryell County Meet. It is an assured success always, because the spirit of youth is behind it. In any endeavor where the spirit of youth is a factor, mountains move, and nothing seems to be impossible or too far fetched. This should be, and really is, "Youths Week" in Gatesville.

Since its inception in 1910 when the Interscholastic League was organized, this meet has always been a success in its intentions. It is for the moulding of future citizens of this city and country. A few statistics on this very important event will serve to refresh our memories to the vast extent of its benefits. The first County Meet was organized by former Supt. George W. Harris and Principal W. S. Dabney, if our information is correct. At that time, due to lack of competition from rural schools, Gatesville schools did not participate. Through to 1915 the meet grew, when J. M. Witcher, now County Superintendent, took more or less control for the following nine years. Up to the present time the year 1929 was the most successful, when 5,000 people attended, with 927 entries from over the county, and \$269.00 were cleared in concessions, however, it is never intended that the Meet be operated for profit.

## World Comment

THE HOUSE has placed a stamp of approval upon the \$3,000,000 Texas Centennial bill. Only 30 dissenting votes were cast against 104 for the measure. Rep. Earl Huddleston cast his vote against the bill. In all probability the Senate will pass the bill without strings and it will be put into immediate effect by executive order of Governor Allred.

JAPAN HAS reiterated her demand for naval equality with the United States and Great Britain. Admiral Mineo Osumi, Japanese Naval Minister, stated that a new limitations treaty that "is fair and just" should be formulated by the three great naval powers. This new treaty would presumably give the Nippons naval equality with the U. S. and Britain, and naval equality with these nations means naval supremacy in the Orient. Britain cannot keep but about one-fourth of her naval strength in the extreme Far East and only a half of the American fleet can be kept on the Pacific coast without opening our Atlantic coastline to attack. Because of this fact Japan should be content with the 5-5-3 ratio allowed her under the Washington naval treaty. Japan can keep her entire fleet in home waters and with no long coastline to defend, remains at a great advantage over the other two great naval powers under the present treaty tonnage.

THE TREASURY has recently called in \$1,933,000,000 (billion) in first Liberty bonds that will leave unrefunded but a wartime debt. The treasury fraction of the government's now has outstanding only \$1,300,000,000 (billion) of the \$25,000,000,000 (billion) in Liberty and Victory Loan bonds issued during the war. Redemption on this latter debt is expected soon.

When the program is completed the government will save a total of \$70,000,000 in reduction of interest charges. This operation will have little effect upon the national debt, which stands at \$28,565,000,000 (billions) at the present. Under President's budget estimates it will run as high as \$35,000,000,000 (billions). Gov. Mariner S. Eccles of the Federal Reserve board told the House Banking Committee he has no fear of a debt peak of \$40,000,000,000 (billions). To size of the national income, he said, is more important. Carrying charges of a \$40,000,000,000 (billions) debt he estimated at 1 per cent of the normal annual income and the total would be less in a comparable sense than the debts of Great Britain and other nations.

IT LOOKS as if the same situation exists in Europe today as did in 1914. Although jealousies and rivalries are not as keen, we find all nations armed to the teeth, with the exception of the former Central Powers, and increasing their

armaments. Because of the fact that Germany is rearming, Great Britain is increasing her current budget by 19,000,000 pounds in order to strengthen her land, air, and naval forces. France is doing likewise. Because of Germany's admission that it has an air force, the term of compulsory military service is being lengthened in order to keep the army strong during the lean years caused by the low wartime birth rate.

Russia has also warned that it will increase its defenses on the West if Britain makes any concessions to Germany. Germany thus assumes her old role of trouble maker in Europe with practically no friends.

# THE TEXAS BLUEBONNET

By F. E. Simmons

Before long the little waste places and skirts of grass land, where not too heavily grazed by sheep and cattle, will be covered with bluebonnets, our State flower. It asks no assistance from the hand of man, but springs spontaneously from our native soil to soften the landscape to beautify waste places. It springs from the soil in late Fall and early Winter and is so hardy and resistant to the severest winters that it survives, and by early spring blankets the uncultivated landscape with a blue velvety covering unknown in extent or beauty to any other country.

Many flowers are rich in song and story and poetic legend, but none occupy a more enviable place than our Texas Bluebonnet. It has been the theme of artist, poet and historian. Its history reaches back into an age that would have been forgotten had not the poetic legends of its origin been preserved by the native nations of the Southwest.

The Bluebonnet is a lupine, and restores atmospheric nitrogen to the soil, hence is a soil builder, and has an economic as well as an aesthetic value. It is indigenous to the country from the Yellowstone Park to the Chilean Andes Mountains, but attains its most perfect development in the prairies and wastelands of the central hill country of Texas. The ancient scars, ragged, blunt, that were left when the world was created, in springtime are covered with fields of blue and the harshness of wastelands is softened and beautified by this beautiful flower that revels and delights in taking care of itself, asking nothing of man, only that he keep his sheep and cattle away from its haunts.

All primitive peoples have tried to account for things beautiful and things awful, by weaving stories around them that attribute a divine origin, or an undivine, according to whether the thing was a curse or a benefit to them. In the case of Bluebonnets (or Buffalo Clover, as pioneers called it), there are a number of fanciful or poetic legends that have been preserved from the lore of the American peoples that occupied the country from the Red River to the high tablelands of Mexico, at the time of the coming of white people. These legends are valuable as interpretive material to the student of cultural

values of the peoples who originated them.

We have heard several versions of these legends, and, with one exception, they all center around the idea of human sacrifice for the alleviation of some great evil, for instance, pestilence, drought, or for success in war or the chase. The following folklorists have reclaimed legends relating the story of the origin of Texas Bluebonnets: Mrs. Lida Lee of Austin, Texas, Mrs. Mattie Austin Hatcher of the University of Texas, and Mrs. Bruce Reid furnishes still another. Mrs. Lee's story points out that the seed of this wonderful flower were brought from Palestine by the founders of the Texas Missions. The seed were planted on the mission grounds from whence they scattered over our Texas prairies. The other two legends have the idea of human sacrifice, after the creed of the Indian, for the appeasement of the gods. We have heard a number of others, however, briefer in detail for the most part. Only one will we offer. It has been family property since we used to sit close to the fireplace on rainy days and long winter nights and listen to old people tell the traditions and lore of the prairies. It bears out the sacrificial idea.

We do not know where the legend given here originated. We have heard it in several variations all of our lives and record it as a folk tale that is told, and has been told, for a long time at many Texas firesides.

"There was a long drought. The grass withered and died. The springs ceased to flow. The game left the country. The Indians were starving. At this time the wise men and the prophets came together to hold council, to agree on an offering to the Great Spirit.

"After a day in council, the wise men of the tribes agreed that the most valuable possession of the people should be offered. Then they bivouaced for the night, awaiting for the rising of the sun, for they were sun worshippers.

"During the night a young Indian mother strangled her baby with a cord of bullalo hide, and offered it on a fiery altar. The ashes were scattered to the winds. The next morning the whole prairie, and the wastelands, were covered with Buffalo Clover (Bluebonnet). The game, including buffalo, return-

ed in great herds and the famine was at an end."

We learned to love this wonderful flower when it was "buffalo clover." When it was adopted as our State Flower it became "Bluebonnets." Its color scheme has the red, white, and blue of our flag.

## FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH BUILDING PROGRAM

Committees met continually last week. Each meeting brings the church nearer the time when a contract is to be let and ground broke for the building that will adequately meet the needs of this working denomination. The finest spirit of christian fellowship has prevailed in all deliberations. Many minor differences have had to be worked out but each time the conclusions reached have been accepted gladly by all. The spirit of give and take but all work together to one end has prevailed since the old church was condemned. The hope of having a house of worship that will please the Lord seems to make all efforts one in their purpose.

Last Sunday our beloved Pastor preached two consecrated, powerful sermons. At each service announcements concerning the building program are made. Those who attend these services understand the progress that is being made.

The Finance Committee is

anxiously waiting the returns of results of an every member canvass being made by church workers. These workers will continue until every member has been contacted. If this work can be completed by Thursday evening the Finance Committee will have its report ready for the General Committee which is called for Friday night. If plans are not changed recommendations with reports will be made to the church Sunday which should lead to the letting of a contract for the church building desired. Time must be taken for necessary thought and consideration but no time has been lost since the building program was launched.




