Had the Mexican opticers been watohing their mier Texan prisoners more closely as they were marching them to the in terior, they might have observed that suppressed excitemen dominated the atmosphere of the camp. Signals and meaningful looks were exchanged: break was planned.

In the blackness of the night a large number of men crept away, and lost thenselves in the thick woods of the mountains their absence and began a search. The escape was worse than the marching the worse than the marching, the Texans were soon to find out. There were no mountain streams;
there was not sufficient wild berries for food, and it was almost impossible to know which direction to take. Lack of food and water killed many; some
died wandering through the mountains, and the rest were recaptured by the Mexicans. The horrors they had gone through cauld not possibly be worse than Perote Castle, where they were being taken.
The Castle of Perote, near idable. Surrounding by formtwenty feet deep and a moat twenty feet deep and two hun-
dred feet wide, it was the strongest prison in Mexico. It was built of volcanic pumice stone, an the flat roof was supported by arches seventy feet
leng and twenty feet wide. Huge stairways leading to the cells were guarded by strong

A small grating at the top of each cell door was the only ventilation. The atmosphere was dank and stifling, and the
