## WALK ON LEFT SIDE OF HIGHWAY

In their radio programs, $W$ : Lee O'Daniel and his Light Crust Doughboys are certainly hitting top with their radio programs. One incidental and very important matter which they are bringing to the attention of their listeners is that of walking on the highways "facing the traffic." In other words, when walking out on the street, highway or road, Mr. O'Daniel and his boys urge you to walk facing the traffic and on the left side of the highway.

Several times when driving at night we've passed cars and at the same time pedestrians who were on the right side of the road, and if they are not watching unusually close they do not see cars approaching from the rear consequently making it very difficult to pass them and the other ear without danger.

Clubbing the youngsters in an effort to train them to this important and safer usage of the highways, both for the safety of the pedestrian and also th automobile user is something very commendable for any one to promote and to sponsor, and especially in a commercial radio program such as that of W. Lee O'Daniel's and his Light Crus Doughboys. For safety, walk on the left side of the highway and FACE the traffic.

## EDUCATION COMES FIRST

The farmer of today is far better informed on financial, social, economic and other national and international problems than was the farmer of pre-war days.

Much of the credit for that must go to the agritural cooperative organizations, which have recognized the need for educating their members in order to make them better, more scientifically equipped soldiers in the fight for farm recovery and prosperity.

The co-ops do not simply try to improve marketing methods and widen markets and raise prices to a profitable level-they disseminate a wealth of information and opinion that bears on a thousand problems which direct!y or indirectely affect the welfare of agriculture. That work, though it is little publicized, is every bit as valuable as the work the co-ops do in connection with the regular routine of the farming industry.

THE TOO WELL REMEMBERED MAN
In a recent article in "Fortune," Roswell Magill. professor of law at Columbia, discusses the plight of the "Too well Remembered Man"-the American taxpayer.

Mr. Magill points out that there are three basic criteria to apply as yardsticks to any tax system. The first of these is adequacy--does the system produce as much revenue as is needed? The scond is economy in ad-ministration-how much of each tax dollar is required to pay the costs of collection? The third is fairness in dis-tribution-do all classes of the people pay their equitable share?

In Mr. Magill's opinion, which is imposingly buttressed with facts, the federal government's tax system falls down on three counts.

It is not adequate-the Treasury's report for the last fiscal year shows total receipts of a little more than $\$ 3,000,000,000$ as against expenditures of seven billion dellars. The deficit has actually exceeded total receipts!

It is not economical in administration--over a tenyear period, the cost of collection to the government (which is obviously the same thing, indirectly, as the cost to the taxpayer) has ranged as high as $\$ 2.17$ per $\$ 100$ of revenue, as compared to a high of $\$ 1.74$ in Great Britain. In addition, the United States develops more than eighteen times as much litigation each year out of the income tax as does Great Britain.
