### FLASH! **BONUS BILL FAILS**

(Special to the News)

The Senate by a vote of 40 to 54 upheld President Roosevelt's veto of the Patinflationary bill. The vote came late Thursday afternoon after heated hours of debate. Senator Thomas (Dem) of Oklahoma led the fight for bill against the Administration leaders. Robinson. Harrison. Byrnes and Connally.

The House of Representatives had voted 322 to 98 to override the President's veto after he had personally delivered his veto message to a joint session of Congress, leaving the decision squarely up to the Sen. ate.

The Administration won seven votes since the Senate passed the bill the first time by a vote of 55 to 33. 33 votes would have sustained the veto of the President.

Late Thursday the Patman forces refused to concede defeat. There was talk of forcing the President to pay bonus out of the giant \$4,000,000,000 (billions) work-relief fund.

PROTEST CHAVEZ APPOINT'M. FRENCH PREPAREDNESS HITLER'S ADDRESS

E x-Representative Dennis Chavez, 47, Monday was sworn in as United States Senator from New Mexico, succeeding Senator Bronson Cutting, killed in an airplane crash. Senators Johnson, Borah, Norris, Nye, La Follette and Shipstead walked out of the Supreme Court room where the oath-administrating ceremony took place in protest to the appointment of Chavez as Senator Cutting's successor. Chavez was defeated in November by Cutting by only 1,200 votes and at the time of Cutting's death was contesting the election with the support of the Democratic National Committee, of which James A. Farley is chairman. The liberal Senators felt that the Roosevelt Administration had done Cutting an injustice by refusing to support him in the election last year, as Cutting left his party in 1932 to support Roosevelt.

FRANCE does not intend to fight the next war with Germany on French soil. Thousands of troops have been moved to the northern border to occupy the new \$100,000,000 set of fortifications extending from the North Sea to Lorraine. In 1914 the frontier was unprotected except for a few garrisons and the Kaiser's hosts had actually reached French soil before an adequate French army could be assembled. But no surprise attack can be launched now. The French believe their new ring of iron and steel forts to be impregnable.




never "THE BOLSHEVIKS" retreat, asserted the Soviet air minister when announcing that three new planes of the same type as the Maxim Gorky, which crashed last week with a loss of forty-nine lives, would be constructed in the future. The new air ships are to be larger, more beautiful and more powerful than the old Gorky and will be named after three of the Soviet's greatest herdes-Nicholas Lenin, Joseph Stalin, and Maxim Gorky.

Russia, like Italy, feels that its future lies in the air. The Soviet Union is second in air strength in Europe with 2,5000 planes and 30,000 men in the air force.

Adolf Hitler, in his speech before the German Reichstag Tuesday, blamed the war victors for the mad arms race, charging that they violated the peace treaty's arms limitations. Hitler solemnly promised that Germany would not alter the present boundries fixed by the treaty of Versailles. "Germany of today is immersed in the tremendous work of repairing its domestic damages.' None of our subjects of a factual nature will be completed before ten or twenty years," he said. "What

> PRUNE MARLOW 20 marshmallows

% cup prune

pulp teas. lemon juice cup prune 1/2 1/2 pint whipping juice cream First of all, rub the cooked dried dried prunes through a puree sieve. (The dried prunes should be prepared by washing them carefully the night be-fore they are to be used; soaking them overnight in cold water to cover; and steaming them until tender in the same water without tender in the same water, without sweetening.) Put the prune juice and marshmallows together in the top of a double boiler, and steam them over boiling water until the marshmallows are entirely melted. Add the prune pulp and lemon juice, and set aside to cool, until slightly stiffened and quite cold. Then whip the cream until stiff and fold in carefully to the marshmallow-prune mixture. Pour into containers and freeze without stirring either in an ice cream freezer or mechanical refrigerator. An ordi-nary mold may also be used, with an ice-salt pack. Be sure the mold is tightly covered and sealed with ad-



Continued rainfall in the afftected areas has increased property damage and added to the discomfort of flood victims. Incomplete surveys embracing little of the rural area affected confirm nine dead, fifty-six major injuries ,and six hundred twenty homes damaged or demolished.

An ernest request for funds has been sent ot all Texas chapters. Contributions may be left at either of the local banks.

### **President Vetoes Bonus** But the Lower House Quickly Repasses Bill

The House Wednesday passed the Patman bonus bill over President Roosevelt's veto after the President had appeared in person to deliver his veto message before both houses of Congress sitting in joint session. The Representatives voted 322 to 98 to override his veto, leaving the issue directly up to the Senate. The President's message brought no important vote changes in the House. The House ballot showed a net gain of four votes against the Patman bill. Gains were expected in the Senate as Sen. James P. Pope of Idaho, a Democrat who voted in support of the Patman bonus bill when it passed the Senate, announced he would vote to sustain the president when the bill comes up again under the veto message.

President Roosevelt in his speech delivered before both Houses of Congress and the Cabinet condemned the \$2,200,-000,000 (billions) Patman bill as "disastrous." 





The school will open on Tuesday, May 28, and will close on July 27, comprising a nine weeks session.

Tuition charges will be somewhat dependent upon the attendance. A large attendance will reduce the tuition per pupil. Not more than \$20 per pupil for the full pupil load will be charged and it is almost certain that the charge will not be more than \$17.50. It is hoped that this can be reduced to \$15.00.

No pupil will be permitted to earn more than two one-half units during the term. No full unit courses will be taught. A pupil may take one or two half unit courses. If he takes two courses one of them should be a course which he has had before. Classes will be 2 hours long in length and will meet six days each week, except on holidays.

The courses offered will very likely be: English II: English IV: History II; American History; Plane Geometry and some advanced elective course that will fit the demand of the students needing the work. Algebra I and Algebra II will be taugh if the demand is sufficient.

Fifth, sixth and seventh grade pupils may do summer work also if the demand justifies offering the work. No pupil below the fifth grade may attend summer school. Tuition will be lower than for high school pupils. Grammar school pupils may take one or two courses but not more than two.
