This movement has the O. K. of every President we can remember not to mention "Big Shots" in every line of endeavor. It started as an outgrowth of two necements, one American and one British, which originated to furnish wholesome pleasure and develop self control, resourcefulness, endurance, true courage and strength of character. Early organizers were Ernest Thompson Seton in America and General Baden-Powell in England, and together they evolved the plan of joining their two ideas since they were so similar into one movement, the Boy Scouts.

Now, under nearly every flag in the world, there are boy scouts, united internationally in their annual "Janiborce" at some designated country. The one this year takes place in Washington, D. C. and 30,000 scouts will be there.


