"Vice-President James D. Mooney of General Motors delivered his address in New York Monday on the economic values of international trade to no unfriendly audience, nor to an unappreciative one. Unusual as a convention talk, the speech was presented in written and illustrated form; picture captions formed an integrated part of the entire argument.
"The pictures told a story that the seaport cities have already learned to know. It was a repetition of the irrefutable statement that domestic prosperity depends on foreign trade. When the freighters lie idle in port, the surplus piles up at home. Mooney presented the argument that for foreign trade to exist, the ships must carry a load both ways. We can not sell when we do not buy. The seaport cities were asked in the argument to join in supporting and enlarging the reciprocal trade treaties engineered by Cordell Hull."

From statistics we've seen, export cotton trade with Germany is approximately 70 per cent off; France and other countries who used to use our cotton are equally bad off. Since the depression, the slack off of cotton exports have been appalling, and even a number of cotton exporters are either moving outright or opening branch offices in South America where tariff rates are more favorable and that country is beginning to gobble up the trade the south has been dependent upon for their bread and butter.
"This is not a seaport fight, but one in which every phase of production is interested. Tariff reduction and mutual trade is a question of markets, not of ports. These are but intermediaries of and exchange which has had a costly lapse."-Dallas News.
 provided that when a farmer was threatened with foreclosure he could apply to a Federal court for aid. The court was empowered to issue a stay against the foreclosure and have the property revalued by local appraisers. Thereafte:, the law provided, the farmer could remain on the property for five years for a small annual rental. At any time during that period he could again regain title to his land by paying the appraised value-which, as the appraisal was made on the basis of depression values, was bound to be much less than the original mortgage. The Supreme Court held that it deprived a mortgage holder of property without just compensation as provided for in the Constitution.
