Your family will think they are eating a brand-new dessert, though, when you serve bread pudding topped first with a layer of jam, then a layer of marshmallows, and lastly a sprinkling of cocoanut, the whole baked until delicately browned. A topping of marshmallows makes any baked pudding look and taste like something different, for that matter. Say it with chocolate pudding, custards, apple betty or any other baked dessert popular in your household.

Try marshmallow baked apple sometime. Core your apples and fill the holes with pieces of marshmallow -not too full, for this filling has puffy habits and will not shrink and run away like sugar fillings. Put bits of butter on the top and bake until soft with a little water, beating frequently.
