Soak bread until it is soft in enough water to cover. Meantime caramelize 2 tablespoons sugar in a heavy skillet. Add milk and butte: and cook gently until caramel dissolves. Press water from bread add bread to cooked mixture, and beat well. Remove from stove; stir in well-beaten eggs, mixed with remaining sugar and vanilla. Pour into buttered baking diet and bake for 45 minutes in a slow oven (325° F.). Then cover top with marshmallow halves and return to oven to brown lightly. Serve hot with cream or coffee-flavored hard sauce.


