## otal Eclipse of Moon Occurred last Night at 9:15; Covered 1 Hour

Central Texans were privileg ed to withess a most phenomenal spectacle last night when a toal eclipse of the moon
curred at $9: 15$ Waco that time the moon entered th hadow cast by the earth and was hidden from the rays the sun and consequently dark visible in all the western hem isphere except in the extrem northern part of North America.
The eclipse began at $8: 15 \mathrm{p}$, m., but which time the moon he penumbra or outer area of he shadow of the earth. This shadow was not discernable
here because darkness had not descended.
At $9: 12 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. the moon enered the umbra or darkest porion of the earth's shadow

Mystery Symbols Cause Search for Treasure of Santa Anna at Grove

Following symbols as complicated as any to be encountered of "Treasure Island," C. C. Wil liams of The Grove has located a number of places where he They are mainly in Corvell county, he says, and he thinks the treasure, if buried in the region, must have belonged to Gen. The symbols are all of spanish derivation, he says, and although he is unable to decipher them completely, he can follow them in the direction hey indicate.
At one spot in this county there are two series of such
symbols running in two straight ines. At the point where these ines converge there is a hole in the ground which must be 30 feet in circumference, Wil-
liams says. The hole has been illed with large rocks, which Williams has partially removed. so doing he encountered the ones of several complete skel tons, he says. At a depth of bout six feet from the surface. unning in the four directions of the compass, are four tun-

The International Association of Chiefs of Police has been meeting at Atlantic City. Attorney Genral Cum mings made the opening address and next day J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, gave what was said to be "the bluntest talk on crime ever uttered by a public official."

Disregarding suggestions from lawyer friends that he go easy on the profession, Mr. Cummings spoke scath ingly of the "lawyer criminal"-crooked lawyers who plot with the underworld. These he intends to drive out of the profession and put them in jail. Mr. Hoover was even more bitter in his remarks. His epithets included-"shyster lawyers," "legal vermin," "crooked politicians," "sob sister Judges," "criminal coddlers," "lawyers-criminal, who bribe witnesses, dissemble evidence and when possible convert Judge and jury to a miscarriage of justice.'

Beyond this, there is the legal shyster in lawmaking, who, in meetings of bar associations and Legislatures cries out against every statute which aids the law-enforce ment of ficer and works with fanatical zeal for laws which will hamper him. He orates loudly and blatantly upon the preservation of the constitutional rights of the criminal jackal and totally ignores the sacred and human rights of honest citizens. He is backed by the politician crooked and otherwise, who is willing to trade the property, the well-being, the security and even the lives of law-abiding persons for ballots spawned in prison cells and the support of gutter scum.

It is really quite shocking the way these lawyer speak of some of the members of an honored profession No layman would dare to do it. Mr. Cummings even spoke of having "got rid of fifteen members of the legal profession in the southwestern part of this country."

Surely he did not mean Texas! But can it be that Mr. Hoover explains in part why it is so hard to amend our statutes respecting crime, or to pass a State Bar bill?
