DR. W. B. BAGBY OF BRAZIL SPEAKER AT BAPTIST CHURCH SUNDAY

Dr. W. B. Bagby, called the greatest statesman of Brazil, and former Coryell county boy. is to be the speaker at the First Baptist Church Sunday evening, according to Rev. C. A. Morton, pastor.

Dr. Bagby was born at Eagle Springs, in the southern part of the county, received his education at Baylor University at Waco, and for the past fifty years has been a Missionary in Brazil.

Brother Morton states that Dr. Bagby was the first Missionary to Brazil over fifty years ago when there were very few Baptist in Texas and over a million now. Dr. Bagby is on his farewell visit to the U. S. and is coming to his home-Coryell county and Gatesville for a farewell visit prior to his return to South America.

This "prestige" business has lots to do with where the graduate goes for graduate work. Also, faculties have a lot to do with it, but the faculties can be obtained with money, and the "prestige" must be built up by years of patronage, and some good advertising by research and by word of mouth.

Certainly, this is a commendable idea, and one which should be followed up—that of a Graduate School, at least somewhere in Texas that will compare favorably with those mentioned above.

In London, the Cabinet advised British missionaries Ethiopia to leave the country. It was announced also that the Government would permit the exportation of arms to Ethiopia-good news to the Africans ments to the African kingdom out of respect to Premer Mussolini.

A STATE-WIDE uprising in peasants in Tamaulipas province, Mexico, forced the resignation of Gov. Rafael Villarreal Tues-The Government of President Lazaro Cardenas is said to be backing the revolt, ousting the Governor because of his pro-Calles sympathies. Calles was recently ousted as proxy-President and leader of the dominant National Revolutionary party by his former protege, Cardenas

About 20,000 peasants allegedly surrounded Villareal's palace and forced him to resign.

The control of Thomas Carrido Canubal, former Secretary of Agriculture, is expected to be broken over the State of Tobasco as a result of the revolt in the neighboring state. Canubal is also a friend of exPresident Calles.

Following an investigation of his rule in the Virgin Islands as Governor, Gov. Paul M. Pearson was removed and replaced by Lieutenant-Governor L. M Cramer of New York. Pearson was transferred to the housing administration in Washington and Federal Judge T. Webber Wilson, who was also charged in the Senate-conducted investigation with misconduct, was transferred to Board of Parole.

Thus end an investigation that threatened to end all civil rule in the Virgin Islands. If further disclosures has been made, it was expected that the islands would be returned to the control of the navy.

GREAT BRITAIN is definitely abandoning the 5-5-3 naval with the United States, Japan. France and Italy at Washington in 1933, preferring to achieve naval limitation by bilateral agreements, such as the recent 100-35 naval ratio agreement reached with Germany.



ENTRANCE DAY AT WEST POINT

"Halt, Mr. Dumbguard! Drop that suitcase! Pick it up! Drop it! Now, who are you and where are you from?"

"My name is Johnsonfrom Virginia."

"Oh! No, Mr. Doowilly, you are new Cadet Johnson from now on, and say 'Sir' when you out and form a hollow square speak to an upper classman. Understand?"

In a manner such as the foregoing every candidate for West Point is received into the institution which for the next four years is to be his home. For over a hundred years the "plebes," as the new cadets are called, have been subjected on their entrance to the most rigid discipline administered by the gin to shine their shoes and upper classmen. A lie an engagement to serve in Third-Classman, or "Yearling," the Army of the United States usually has to demonstrate the for four years after graduation process to the new cadet at first: but after the first lesson a plebe knows what to do when he hears the gruff command, "Move those shoulders back! Pull your chin in! Stretch up from the waist! Stand up hard, Mr. Ducrot!"

Hardly has the lesson in "bracing" been learned before some upper classman demands, "Have you made three trips to the Cadet Store and a trip to the Barber Shop?"

"No, Sir!" "Well, speed out to the Cadet Store now. Run! Step out, Mister! Speed!"

Thus the plebe tears out across the area of barracks to the Cadet Store to draw his first issue of clothes and equipment. Two more trips are necessary before the new plebes are ready to start arranging their rooms. Each one must also get a hair cut before he can start his cadet training in earnest.

These errands complete the plebes fall in to draw a gray shirt and pair of gray trousers. This suit is their first uniform and is the one they will wear most of the time during their first two months' training.

Within an hour after their selves in the area of barracks learning how to drill. In a surprisingly short time they can do the facings and the squad movements. After what seems an eternity dinner arrives. Their first meal as cadets! Disappointment, however, is the lot of those who expect a restful meal, for at the tables the plebes must maintain a rigid posture and observe punctilously the table customs imposed on Fourth Classmen. For instance, they are forbidden to talk, they cannot gaze away from the table, they must see that the upper classman is served first and they must not eat if the upper classman who is seated at their table, orders them not to.

After dinner, the plebes run back to their room and begin to mark their name on their clothes with indelible ink. Every article must have a name on it. In the middle of this work a bell rings, and the plebes are brought down stairs by a yearling's bellowing, "You plebes start turning out!" Then follows another drill period. Drilling and work on equipment continue until 5:30 p. m. when the plebes, wearing their gray shirts and trousers and one white glove on the left hand and carrying the right

discharged by proper authority. This formality completed, the plebes go back to their rooms and continue to work on their equipment. Finally, comes Taps at 9:30. As the peaceful tones of the bugle die away, the plebes thank whatever Gods may be that the first day is finished.

Canned Foods Met All Tests

Proved Lifesavers on Voyage Around the World

OW the crew of the "Seth H Parker" fared on an exclusive diet of canned foods for more than seven weeks, and ate them all around the world to Samoa, has been vividly told by Captain Constantin Flink, the ship's navigating officer. The "Seth Parker" famous four-master which sailed last year under the command of Phillips Lord who created the radio character after which it was named.

The ship's voyage took it through the furnace heat of the equator and the freezing cold of the North Atlantic in midwinter, but the canned foods it carried stood up through all changes of temperature and proved lifesavers throughout the

Seven Weeks Without Fresh

"We expected," said Flink, who has been on sailing ships for over thirty years, "to sail the seven



hundred miles from Panama to the Galapagos Islands in about a week, but like the Ancient Mariner, we were becalmed in the doldrums, and it

was well into the ninth week before we reached fresh food was exhausted, and we had to rely exclusively on our canned supplies.

"Fortunately we had brought along some canned loganberry juice and canned tomato juice. There was never a sign among our crew of that dread scourge of the seas, scurvy, which was sisted largely on canne so prevalent in the old days of during the entire voyage.

sailing vessels that British ships were called 'lime juicers' because they were required by law to serve lime juice to the crew to ward off this disease.

"But even if we had not had the loganberry and tomato juice, we would not have feared scurvy, as we had a plentiful supply of canned spinach, beans, carrots. peas and other vegetables which are equally good preventatives. We also had such meats as canned corned beef and frankfurters, and such fish as canned clam chowder and codfish cakes. These latter foods were luxuries because you can't catch fish at sea, you know, except once in a long while a stray dolphin.

And Then Mostly Canned Foods

"At the Galapagos Islands we caught a big haul-two tons-of fresh fish, but we couldn't get much there in

the way of green vegetables or fresh fruit. We got a large supply wild lemons, but that was all in the way of fruit, and for fresh meat we killed

wo wild bulls. "It really wasn't until we reached the Marquesas about a month later that we could get a plentiful supply of fresh foods, so for nearly three months the chief part of our diet consisted of the islands. After the first two canned foods. And we all kept weeks out of Panama all of our healthy and liked it. We had some things which are not usually canned put up in tins to preserve them at sea through all the varying temperatures. wheat, for instance. And we had powdered milk and malted milk as well as evaporated milk.


