## FEED 'EM AND SELL 'EM

Texans, with the enormous feed crop that seems inevitable this year should NOT be wondering what they are going to do with it. If it's thrown on the market, the market will become gorged, and the price will be nothing-Whereby, hangs a tail.

This "tail" should surely be on hogs, cattle, sheep and other animals gown on Texas farms, which can be fed with the surplus feed crops of this year, and the abundant pastures which we have.

For many years Texas has been sending about million head of range-raised calves and yearlings to the corn belt every year to make a market for the corn belt farmers' feed and to put the fertility back on corn belt farms. Also, a million or more lambs went to the feed lots of those states. Beginning in 1928, a concerted el Cort was made by the Breeder-Feeder Association to en-
courage the feeding of as many of the Texas raised calves, yearlings and lambs as possible on Texas raised feeds. Since that time it has been definitely proved that Texas farmers can feed Texas cattle and lambs to as good finish on Texas grown feeds as they can be finished anywhere.

During the past two years, there has been practically no feed in this section, but now, after the barns are full, and some is sold for money, which most of us need so sorely, why not HOLD part of the surplus and stuff these farm animals for the markets, instead of letting the corn belters get the benefits of our cattle, lambs etc., and also add fertility to their lands, as well as holding up the price of their corn. We venture to say that the local farmers could stand some increase in prices of feed stuffs, as well as increased fertility of their lands, and too, for their fat cattle and sheep, reap the benefits of a BUMPER feed crop, even tho the prire may be forced down by the surplus.

This reasoning is not at all local, but state wide, since Farm and Ranch, and F. P. Holland, Jr., president of the Breeder-Feeder Association, and H. H. Williamson, Director of the Extension Service, A. and M. College and representatives of a number of other organizations are urging this idea of utilizing the surplus, insofar as possible in the fattening of cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry.

We ask you, readers, to think this over, and by stuffing our farm animals, you may be able to further stuff your pockets with that good old "U. S. Silk" that exchanges for anything, and will take you places and buy you things.

## GRADUATE SCHOOL

State papers are raising quite a furor about graduate school. Seemingly, this does not effect us in one way or another. However, some of our students go to graduate schools, and like the dailys, we see no reason why they should go to the effete east, north or anywhere else for graduate work-if it could be had in Texas.

The University of Texas has a graduate school and with the physical equipment and money this school has, we see no good reason why it should not have better recognition, except for the fact that habit, prestige and general educational ideas have made eastern and northern schools more selected and more in demand for gradu ate work. This "prestige" business has lots to do with where the graduate goes for graduate work. Also, faculties have a lot to do with it, but the faculties can be obtained with money, and the "prestige" must be built up by years of patronage, and some good advertising by research and by word of mouth.

Certainly, this is a commendable idea, and one which should be followed up that of a Graduate School, at least somewhere in Texas that will compare favorably with those mentioned above.

Instructor in Vocational Agricultu

DUTIES OF V. A. TEACHER Do you know what a vocational agriculture teacher musi do in order to "get the job
done" in the community he done" in the community h
works? Must a vocational agr works? Must a vocational agrimerely teach in the class room? It the day's work over when the bell rings at four o'clock in the afternoon? Just what does a vocational agriculture teachor do anyways?
Space will not permit us to mention all the things that a teacher of vocational agriculture must, or shouid do, in orcommunity. Teaching classes in the all-day school in the high school is only a part of the teacher's program. In addition to the all-day classes in the high school, each teacher o vocotional agriculture in Texas is expected to conduct at least three evening school classes fo adult farmers, or two evening school classes and one part-
time for boys between the ages of 18 and 25 years who are not in school. These classes are usually held at night and run for periods of 12 to 15 weeks. Then the teacher is ex-
