the aipproval of the President the approval of the, President
that a cotton loan plan would be put into immediate operation on the 1935 crop which would assure cotton producers an
verage return of not less than 12 cents per pound on cotton grown in 1935. The Agricul tural Adjustment Administration will make payments to cotton armers to equal such difference, if any, as may exist be rice of $7-8$ inch middling cot on as. reflected in the 10 spot markets during the period from September 1 to January 1, this the harvest months, such payments as may be made will be imited to the individual pro the amount of his Bankhead the amount of his Bankhea
Allotment. The commodity cre dit corporation will offer a loan of 10 cents per pound at the farm, without recourse on the
borrower, on 13-16 inch low middling cotton or better. This loan will enable any grower cooperating in the adjustmen once, and will permit him to market his cotton in an order ly fashion throughout the year.
The rate of loan is obviously substantially below the presen or prospective price levels
These offers will apply only to those producers who are en operating in the 1935 program
and who agree to cooperate in the 1936 program. It was stated at the Agricutural Ad
