## BRAZOS RIVER PROJECT

We smell Pork - and why not: Since the Brazos River Priject has finally been approved, it's some "hog," and we don't see why all of us don't get a piece of sirloin.

Seems like a lot of the counties are getting dams. which means a lot of the money will be spent in those counties,. We haye the Leon, which is to be dammed by Bell County, so why shouldn't we dam it?

This is certainly something for service clubs, chambers of commerce, politicans, "big shots" and everyone to work on. We just might as well have a dam over the Cow House or Leon as any other county. It means lots of this "pork" would be spent here, and we certainly should come in for some of it.

Thirteen flood controi dams are to be built on the Brazos and its tributaries which are to conserve soil and control floods, and are to be used for vast industrial, agricultural and recreational uses, in addition to the important flood control and water conservation work.

This is all very good, and not quite as rediculous as making the Trinity navagable to Dallas and Fort Worth, but still it's a fine gesture by the present party in control to "pass the pork."

However, we believe, the south and southwest should not kick about these patronage measures, and with the G. O. P. in power so long, many other projects just as silly have ben worked out as a handout for Republican states, and for many other years, before the Democrats had a chance at the handouts.

With Coryell county nearly in the center of this project, certainly some of the money should be spent here on flood control, erosion work, recreational work or for some other purpse, so, it's past time for us to get busy and get some of this done here.

## "PILL Rollers"

That's the moniker for the Pharmacist. Lots of us think he's a glorified "drug store cowboy" or "skeet." Stop and think!

This pharmacist now, must have a pre-medical course, including practically the same courses the glorified doctors have. Then, a three year college course before he's a full fledged pharmacist. Requirements are growing tighter all the time.

We ask him to prescribe for everything under the sun, and then he must concoct something that will get us well in, a jiffy. Too, the doctor writes his prescriptions and sends it to the pharmacist to fill. Mistakes cannot be made by the pharmacist, as his unglorified work of weighing and mixing medicines is quite as important as the work done by the one prescribing. This is a coming profession, and one which soon can't be acquired in one of the quick schools, but will require full university work before one may qualify.

So, in this NATIONAL PHARMACY WEEK, we pay tribute to one of the professions which has so long been regarded as not a profession, but just a "job at the drug store."
