As a result of these meas-Italian experts believed that Italy can carry on for a long time, even though sanc-tions should be vigorously ap-plied. They assert that the flow of imports can be maintained in defiance of the sanctions through a network special trade channels which will, it is expected, largely circumvent the embargo on importations. Germany, Austria Hungary, Japan, Argentina and Chila, whose trade is af strategic importance to Italy's economic needs, were not parties to the sanctions.

On the other hand, the drain on the nation's meager eco-nomic resources will be very heavy, and the gold reserve, already depleted, is dwindling away rapidly under the necessity of paying cash for the essential raw materials which the government feverishly piled up before the sanctions went into effect. Obviously, if the war in Africa is prolonged indefinitely. Italy must capitulate to the demands of the Britain and its protege the important League. A quick termination to the war is desired by Mussolini. As a step toward this Marshal Bogolio was sent to replace the aged General de Bono, who believed in slow but sure methods of conquest.

A quick conquest will mean that Italy can distate its own terms. And, as yet, the Fascists are victorious on all fronts. The strategic city of Harar, gateway to the Addis Ababa-Dibbouit railway, was evacuated by the Ethiopians, Military observers believe General Graziani's column cannot cut the railway-Ethiopia's only outlet to the sea and civilization-and affact a junction with the northern army, in which case Il Duce's northern objective of uniting his two colonies will have been achiev-

CANADA shocked British Government circles with the announcement that, whatever the Mother Country or the League may do, it does not recognize any commitment binding Canada to adopt military sanctions.

From the office of Prime Minister Mackenzie King came the statement: "The Canadian Government desires to make it clear that while the Government supports economic sanctions against Italy it does not recognize any commitment binding Canada to adopt military sanctions."

The Ottawa Government also disavied the Canadian league delegate's proposal that the League extend its embargo against Italy to oil, coal and metals, the threat of which has menaced the peace of Europe since Sunday.
