A "pitchman" is free lance who takes newly patented articles or any other clever new item to a community, puts up a table, uses the back end of a car or truck and using "barker" language, stunts, etc., sells his product to the people of that community only on busy days, such as Saturdays and First Mondays.

Now, this pitchman has to live the same as the rest of us. Granted

However, he is not a community builder. He ap pears only on the very best days, selling some kind of article, pays no taxes, or practically none, makes a nice collection of money on the very best days, and travels on

Last First Monday there were several here. Now this town is not exclusive, and welcomes new and per manent businesses, but we believe merchants, business men, and those who are the "stuck" customers of the pitchmen, would rather they didn't come, or would stay here.

One merchant said, "well, they take out the hardearned dollars from our customers, and the next day some of the same pitchman's customers come to us and ask for credit, saying they are hard up and have to have a little credit. But, the pitchmen don't do credit or pay taxes to any appreciable amount, but goes on his way merrily with the cash."

That's a just complaint, we believe. Those mer chants who furnish us credit, should also be given con sideration when there is any cash to spend.

Some cities and towns bar these pitchmen, or mak the "peddlers tax" so exherbitant that it is impossible for them to operate, thus clearing the way for the real tax paying merchants

This, at least, deserves some consideration
