# **Ethel Johnson Case of State-Wide** Import Opened; Six Jurors Chosen

Six jurors were chosen yesterday for the case of Mrs. WPA Highway Project Ethel Johnson, charged with the murder in the killing Mrs. Bernice Blankenship and her husband on a ranch near Copperas Cove in August, 1934.

Jurors selected so far are Carl Davis, E. J. Pierce, Clovis Voss, Weldon Mooney, V. C. Bomar and J. T. Weaver.
