### MANY CITIES MADE HISTORY OVER WITH IMPORTANT EVENTS

Austin, Mar. 2 .- One hundred years of Texas freedom, conceived in the martyrdom of the hallowed Alamo and born in the surging victory at San Jacinto, was reached by the Lone Star State on March 2nd when millions of Texans paid humble tribute to the past.

While Travis, Crockett, Bowie and 180 other Texans lay waiting within the sombre walls of the besieged Alamo in San Antonio, a group of determined Texans met at Old Washington-on-the-Brazos on March 2, 1936, and firmly signed the document which proclaimed Texas forever free. Four days later the hour of martyrdom struck for the Alamo defenders. They died to the last man.

William Barrett Travis, commander of the Alamo, had given their solemn pledge to die. Ten days before the fall of the Alamo, the 27-year-old Texas patriot dispatched the message which has come to be regarded as the most heroic document in American history. Addressed "To the People of Texas and All Americans in the

World," it read:

Fellow Citizens and Compatriots: I am besieged by a thousand or more of the Mexicans under Santa Anna. I have sustained a continual bombardment and cannonade for twenty-four hours and have not lost a man. The enemy has demanded a surrender at discretion, otherwise the garrison are to be put to the sword, if the fort is taken. I have answered the demand with a cannon s shot, and our flag still waves V proudly from the walls. I shall I never surrender or retreat. a Then, I call on you in the name of Liberty, of patriotism, d and everything dear to the American character, to come to our aid with all dispatch. eral national committees. But in these associations I am frequently nettled by one common error. It is this. When safety is mentioned, every one thinks of automobiles or




