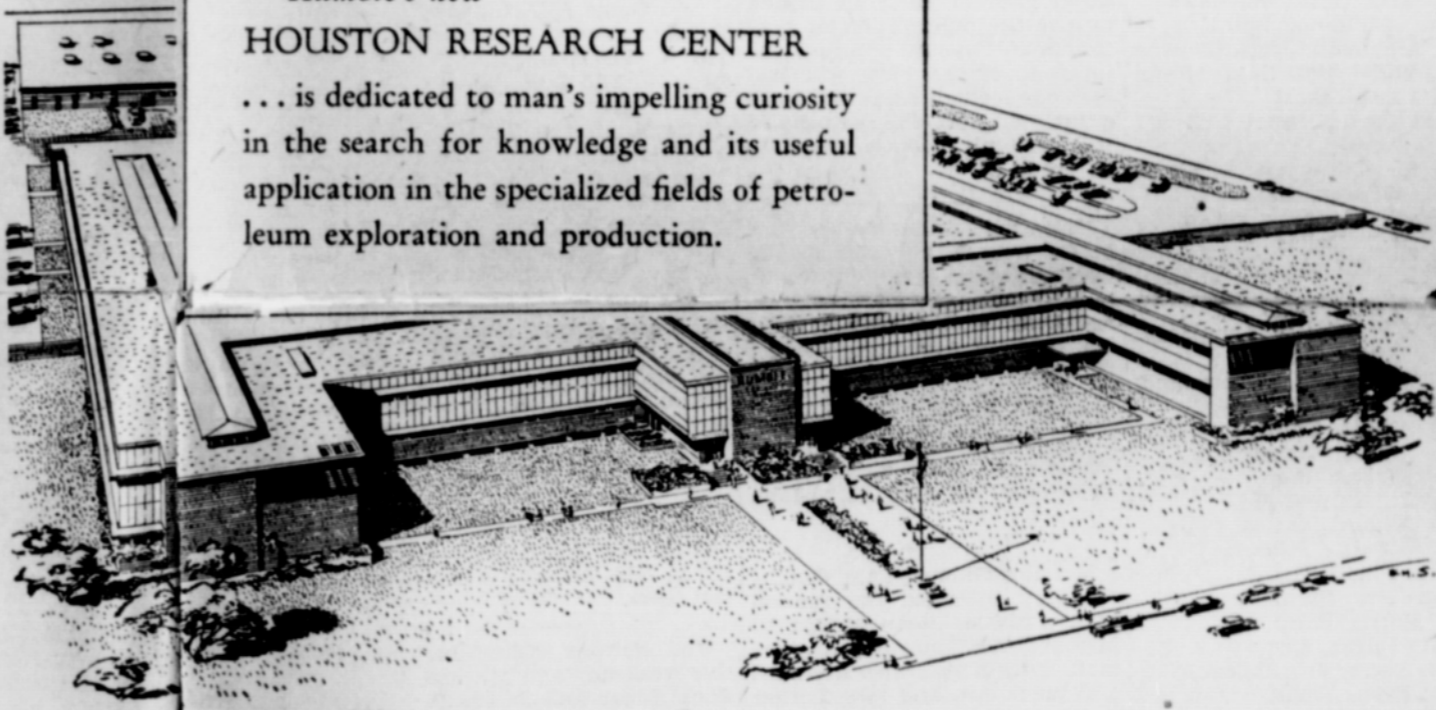

BLACK'S RECIPE OF THE WEEK
By Mary Lee Taylor
Glazed Ham Slices

1 large slice ham (1 lb.) (ready-to-eat kind)
2 Tablespoons brown sugar
4 teaspoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
few grains pepper
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup Pet Evaporated Milk

Trim off fat from ham. Cook fat in skillet until crisp. Then take out bits of fat. Sprinkle both sides of ham with brown sugar. Cook ham in fat in skillet over low heat until both sides are well glazed. Remove to warm platter and keep hot. Drain off all fat in skillet. Then put back 1 1/2 tablespoons fat. Blend in the flour, salt and pepper. Stir in water gradually. Boil and stir 2 minutes. Then stir in milk. Heat until steaming hot, but do not boil. Serve hot with the ham. Makes 4 servings.
