The Buff's first score came on a 26-yard pass play from Quarterback Homer Robison to Right End Billy Kirkham. The TD ended a drive that covered 58 yards and used up 8 plays. Baird came back for it's lone

TD early in the second period when Fullback John Bullock romped off takle behind good blocking in the line which cleared him for a 60-yard gain and the score. Paul Jones passed to
