### Commissioners Favor Highway Righ-ofway

Commissioners Court Monday of this week, the matter of granting, rather, guaranteeing the right ofway across the county on the north side of the Santa Fe Railroad, for Federal Highway 600 or State Highway 33 was taken up and disposed

When the vote on the question was called the following vote was recorded: Ayes, Alexander and Schlenker. Nays. Paul; not voting. Thompson; showing a vote of two to one in favor of the proposition from the commissioners. While County Judge Lander was not required to show his preference in the matter. he requested that, nevertheless, his name be placed upon record in favor of granting or guaranteeing the proposed right-of-way as stated above.

Since the highway proposition has been a matter of centention with the commissioners court, Judge Alexander has been a staunch suppor ter of the proposed change in the location of the right-of-way and it was well understood that he would still continue that support at any time the question was brought up for consideration and he proved true to

his trust with his vote. The newly elected commissioner. Judge Schlenker, was practically elected on such a platform and his supporters fully expected an affirma-

tive vote on the matter. Judge Thompson's position and ac tion in the matter is considered fully justified in his refraining from voting either way. Extraordinary new uses for Aus tralia's wool are being discovered. By a new process soft and durable leather has been made from it. Even the shiny surface of patent leather is being produced from the fibers, interwoven and specially treated.

Experiments are being made in the use of wool for wallpaper, and it is being tried as an insulating material for electric cables.

Perhaps the most astounding woolen excavator which has been used con- end. stantly for more than two years. A shopkeeper knew little about the source of his merchandise. This tunic he bought from a trader, who said it came from Byzantium. So he sold it as the latest Byzantian style. If he guessed wrongly, or his judgment was poor, it was HIS hard luck.

A signed advertisement is, in a way, like a promissory note. The advertiser has made a statement, and affixed his signature as a sign of good faith.

So, read the advertisements before you start out on a buying trip. Make this habit, and see how much you save . . . in time, in temper, in money, in shoe-leather.
