





Dalas gigantic Texas Centennial will reopen its doors on June 12, 1937, for a second run of five months, the closing date being set at October 31.

"We are going to reopen in 1937 with a better and more extensive world's fair," Director General Harry Olmstead said. "It will be an entirely new show, better and smoothely running by virtue of the experience gained through the operation of 1936.

The grounds of the \$25,000,-000 will be remodeled and revamped wit several new buildings, exhibits, and concessions erected. All of the large exhibitors including, Ford, du pont, General Motors and Chrysler will reopen their exhibits for the second run.

Next year there will not be any major exposition in the Uuited States with the exception of the exposition at Dalas. San Francisco's fair does not open until 1938, and the opening date for New York's exposition is 1939.

Officials of the Dallas Fair are expecting the 1936 total attendance to have surpassed the 6.000,000 mark by the closing date. At this writing the grand total is 5,404,721.

This surpasses both the attendance records at the San Dieog and Cleveland expositions. The former had a second year run. The Chicago world's fair was also extended for another year with financial success.

The recent accord between Germany and Italy may cause a complete revamping of the alliance map Europe. Already resulting from the Berlin-Rome agreement is the lose of a close ally by France.
