FIRST CASUALTY OF YEAR FOR CORVELL COUNTY IS CRASH IN REAR OF TRUCK PARKED NEAR McGREGOR.

MeLennan County's sixth highway traffic victim and Coryell County's first for 1937, was Marvin Lee Harris, 24, of Levita, who was fatally injured as the car he was driving crashed into the rear of a truck parked on the left side of the road five miles east of McGregor at 2:30 a. m. Sunday morning. Monroe Herring of Levita also, riding with Harris, was seriously in_ jured, and is suffering from severe shock, and Monday afternoon was reported resting well at a Waco sanitarium. His left arm was crushed, he was cut and bruised also.

Medical Aid Delayed

Two and a half hours elapsed from the time of the collision until an ambulance picked up the two victims, Harris already dead. Delay was caused by a second accident to the car driven by W. E. Seale of Oglesby, who was carrying the men to Waco. A wheel ran off his car. Anothe motorist passing was told of the situation and called an ambu_
