## Europe's Deaf Ear

Third Term for Allied?
Secretary of State Cordell Hull's suggestion to European statesmen that they get together and settle their differences at a conference like the recent PanAmerican conference at Buenos It is true that the dismal failure It is true that the dismal failure of the World Economic Confer-
ence in 1933 to take any worthwhile steps to alleviate the international financial crisis meant the doom of all efforts at cooperation by world or European powers, but if Europe's statesmen were to assemble in a true spirit of cooperation, there is reason to believe the tense atmosphere now prevailing in all nations mght be dispelled.
It may be said with all tainty that the common people of the European nations want no w.r. It is also true that the macses wanted no conflict in 1914. But it is not a warlike spirit on the part of the masses. nor is it solely the blundering of statesmen that brings on war. In 1914 it was a world-wide spinit of FEAR which engendered the conflict.
Frenchmen and English were
aroused by fiery patriotic and in whose making they had diplomats against the Teutonic
peoples; Russians were imbued by government and church with fear and dijtrust of Germany and Austria; the Kaisers of the latter two powers preached the danger of Pan-Slavism and the glory of their own empires.
Armaments were built upat an apalling speed while the seeds of hate were sown. Then the
fateful moment come. The bilization of the Czar's hosts was pictured as threatening the security of Germany-and Germans marched happily to battle The rel the aggressive Russia. The same story, with slightly altered conditions, is being repeated in all its gruesome intensity today. European workers and farmers do not want to
fight.
But the Frenchmen are told hat the Boche are reaning for Germans are portray Rhine! young Russian Communists the hereditarp enemy of the fatherland: Hitlerfo Naziks shout with unendnng zeal that Communist hordes are preparing to in vade western Europe. and so the story goes
Again the seeds of hate are being sown. And again they will be reaped. Eurpoen diplomats fear war; thein peoples oppose
it: but another Sarajevo will come. and with each nation literally bursting with guns, there will be another fight.
As before, statesmen of the major powers will find themselves embroiled up to their necks in oblibations to other powers who are entangled; the
people will go to war, to a war
