She washes woodwork and other
painted surfaces, for example, with painted surfaces, for example, with lukewarm suds, being careful to use only a pure, mild soap, like Ivory,
because stronger soaps tend to scratch the paint or even take it off along with the dirt. A cloth or sponge wrung out of the lukewarm
