

#### Soaps Help House Cleaning

Brust and mops and dust cloty and vacuum cleaners will take of the thick of the winter's grime when house cleaning time comes around, but the housewife who wants her home spic, span and spotless will add the final polish with soap.

The modern housewife, moreover, is a good judge of surfaces-she knows that different sorts of surfaces demand different sorts of soap. Woodwork and walls need one kind, floors another.

She washes woodwork and other painted surfaces, for example, with lukewarm suds, being careful to use only a pure, mild soap, like Ivory, because stronger soaps tend to scratch the paint or even take it off along with the dirt. A cloth or sponge wrung out of the lukewarm suds will remove dust and surface dirt, but for stubborn, badly soiled spots it is a good idea to rub the cloth over a bar of soap before applying. This puts concentrated soap right where it's needed most. A clear water rinse, with a separate cloth or sponge, leaves the woodwork cleansed and shining. For walls, which may be dirtier, a second rinse with light suds is a good idea before the clear water rinse.

For bathroom floors, porcelain fixtures, and similar surfaces, an abrasive soap, such as Lava, is in order. This gets into the cracks and crannies with the maximum of efficiency, softening the encrusted dirt without cratching the smooth surface. face.



#### SALMON TREAT

JUST how are you going to prepare that canned salmon that you are buying or that you bought during National Salmon Week— February 28 to March 7? Salmon is too fine a fish not to pay special attention to the way you cook and serve it. Decorative and delicious, it is worth the extra trouble. So here are some timely recipes for serving that succulent fish.

#### A Large Recipe

Molded Salmon: Soak four tablespoons gelatin in one-half cup cold water for five minutes. Mix together in the top of a double boiler four teaspoons salt, four teaspoons mustard, a few grains cayenne, two tablespoons flour and two tablespoons sugar. Add eight egg yolks and mix well. Add slowly six tablespoons butter, three cups milk and three-fourths cup vinegar. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add the gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool. When about to set, add the contents, broken in pieces, of four 1-pound cans salmon. Pour into large wet fish-shaped mold, or into indivi-dual molds, and let harden in a cold place. Serves twenty-four or twenty-five.

#### A Small Recipe

This is the same recipe, made by the same method as that above, but the ingredients are changed to one tablespoon gelatin, two tablespoons cold water, one teaspoon salt, one teaspoon mustard, a few grains cayenne, two egg yolks, one and a half tablespoons butter, three-fourths cup milk, three tablespoons vinegar and the contents of one 1-pound can salmon. This smaller recipe serves

larger quantity hold its shape nicely when unmolded. The sugar in the larger recipe may be omitted, if desired. A small amount of \* sugar may be added to the small recipe. The slight effect on the finished flavor is not sufficient to make its omission noticeable.

#### To Many Dishes

HOT stewed corn is such a good dish all by itself that some housewives continue to serve it year after year, and fail to realize that corn can be combined with many other ingredients in dishes that add desirable variety to the menu and taste equally good. Try it, as an ingredient, in one of the following dishes and you'll soon find yourself inventing other combinations.

Corn and Rice Fritters: Beat four egg yolks well and add one cup creamy canned corn and onehalf cup boiled rice. Add onefourth cup milk and then one and two-thirds cups flour, one teaspoon salt and two teaspoons baking powder sifted together. Fold in four stiffly-beaten egg whites. Drop by spoonfuls into hot deep fat-375 degrees-and fry until a rich brown. Serve at once with maple syrup. Makes about two dozen fritters.

#### This Tastes Like More

Baked Spaghetti with Corn and Lima Beans: Combine four cups cooked spaghetti with one cup



canned creamy corn and one cup canned lima beans. Add two cups milk to three slightly-beaten eggs, add one and a half teaspoons salt and one-fourth cup chopped parsley, and pour over. Sprinkle with one-fourth cup grated cheese and bake about thirty minutes in a moderate oven. Serves eight.





F. D. R.'S "CROWN PRINCES"

Because of the personal nature of the second Roosevelt's administratin, much speculation is rife as to possible successors of the Democratic Party's second president of the century. For it has been long apparent that should anything happen to President Roosevelt, the New Deal would collapse of its own complexity and of the internal party opposition to its principles.

Washingtonians tacitly admit that while John Garner may go down the line on Capitol Hill for his Chief's pet measures, he would scarcely continue half of the New Deal should he suddenly ascend to the presidency.

The result is that currently much attention is being focused upon several Roosevelt lieutenants, each of whom is a potential "crown prince" for 1940. They are men who have assertedly mastered the "complexities" of the New Deal program and would be capable of administering and continuing it. They have endorsed the President's policies one hundred per cent, both publicly and privately.

This is, of course, an early date to be speculating on possible successor's to President Rosevelt, with his second ter mscarcely underway, but it is not at all improbable that one of the personalities we shall herein discuss may be the Democratic standardbearer for 1940.

On the basis of current news value and importance in the national political scene, six Democratic office holders may bear your attention in the months and probably years to come.

The best known, but not necessarily the most politically potent, is JAMES ALOYSIUS FARLEY. Postmaster General and Democratic National Chairman.

#### TENANT CO-OPERATOR OF COUNTY TELLS OF TERRACING

Gatesville, Tex .- "Planting of Strip Crops on the contour in the field just above my house has been responsible for the elimination of small guilles and also protected the farmstead from flooding." says Gus Koch, a tenant-cooperator with the Gatesville soil conservation camp. Mr. Koch farms land belonging to C. C. Powell.

"For the past two years I have stripped the field with spring wheat and in the late summer with sorghum and peas. At no time has the water from the field come down through my carm yard, even after very heavy rains," Mr. Koch says. "The closegrowing strips spread out and hold the water on the field so it soaks into the ground."

Although Mr. Koch is not farming his own land be says that he can materially profit in his farming operations by conserving soil and moisture, and he feels that he should leave the farm in as good or better condition than it was before he rented it. "There will be generations after me that can profit from soil conservation measures and methods started now. I find also that the land is easier cultivated on the contour rather than up and down hill, which has the method I used before signing a cooperative agreement with the Soil Conservation Service."
