Fox Hunters to Gather Groesbeck Labor Day For 7th Convention

Ten thousand visitors are expected to be in Groesbeck, Monday, September 6, when the Limestone Fox Hunter's Association meets in its Seventh Annual Convention, according to Jack Hawkins, Editor of the Groesbeck Journal.

Groesbeck is for the first time entertaining for the fox hunters, and is planning to make the day the biggest and best in the history of the Association, and has collaborated in arranging an all-day program which will attract Labor Day Crowds from all over Texas.

Among the principal personages who will be present will be Hon. James E. Ferguson, who will speak on the lawn of the City Hall at 10:30 a. m. Music will be furnished by the Gulf Cowboy Ramblers.

With J. M. Arendale as Master of Ceremonies, the afternoon session will be in a horn blowing contest, speaking, music and other events.

At 6 p. m. a big barbecue will be held, with plenty of bread, coffee, meat, etc., but all who will be invited to bring well filled baskets.

Following the supper, Judge L. M. Seay will take the "mike" and introduce the several distinguished visitors who have agreed to be present. Major J. M. Bradley, will give the address of welcome in behalf of the city of Groesbeck.

Beginning at 8 p. m. the Bench Show will be held and awards will be made to the prize winners. Hinkle Shillings of Center, Texas, being the Judge, at 10 p. m. the climax will be a fox chase with a live fox turned loose for a free for all chase on the grounds. President Jack Jenkins states that that this will end the official program, but fox hunters wanting private races for the balance of the night will have no trouble in arranging them.

State Superintendent L. A. Woods and other members of the State Department of Education will be present, and will have parts on the program.

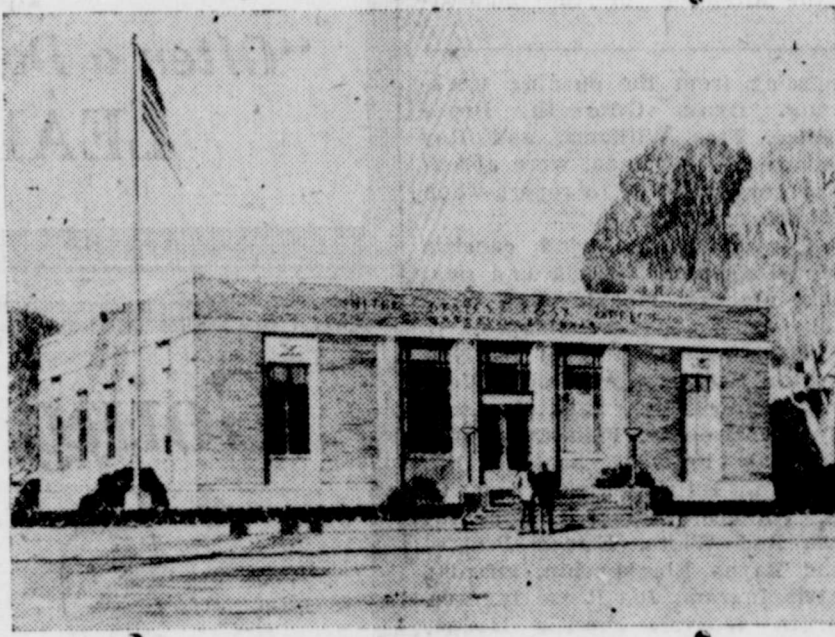
Deputy State Supervisor A. M. Tate who has been assigned to this district will also be present, and, on the program.

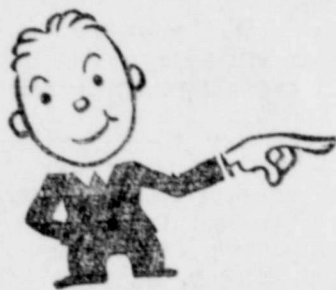
Several veteran linemen were

WORLD COMMENT



Joe Burns

The past week witnessed five utterances by politically potent figures which gravely reflect the present state of affairs in the Democratic Party.

Topping the list was President Roosevelt's Roanoke Island address which sounded a death knell to those who have hoped for a reconciliation of the divergent elements within the party. Those in opposition to the Roosevelt program of social, economic and political readjustment of this nation's institutions were branded as "Lord Macaulays." Lord Macaulay was represented as a British Tory advocating class rule. A call for "democracy, more democracy" was issued and with it a plea for the preservation of majority rule.

There are several interesting points to be noted in the Roanoke Island speech. In the first place, the call for "democracy, more democracy" was highly inconsistent in view of the record of the Roosevelt tenure of office. Never in the history of this nation, where democracy is believed to reign supreme, has a chief executive been endowed with such extraordinary powers in peace as President Roosevelt now wields. In 1933 action was needed to meet the conditions resulting from the economic upheaval, but five years from that date we find more demands for power emanating from the White House and now willingness on the part of the President to relinquish the powers granted to him in 1933.

Mr. Roosevelt cries out in passionate words for "democracy, more democracy," while from February to July of this year he refused to consent to refer the Supreme Court expansion program to the people. What could be more democratic than to ask the voters of the republic whether a fundamental institution of their government—one which has consistently upheld the rights of majorities, the rights of minorities, the rights of the layman—was to be altered and subjected to the dictation of the executive branch which, according to the present occupant of the White House, was under the thumb of the vested interests from 1920 until 1932? Certainly the people of America did not vote on court reorganization last November, although the rabid new dealers prefer to feel that the "mandate" gave Mr. Roosevelt free hand to scrap the Constitution and remake it to his own designs.

Englishmen early and Americans somewhat later found that the pillars of democracy are freedom of speech and of thought. In the Roosevelt area, those in opposition to the majority program are branded as Tories, reactionaries, and un-American. If you disagree with Roosevelt (in Russia if you disagree with Stalin, in Germany with Hitler, in Italy with Mussolini), you are conspiring to block reforms for the "ill-fed, ill-housed, and ill-clothed" and in sympathy only with those who desire to squeeze the last penny from the farmer and laborer.

Is it democracy to give labor agitators a free hand to seize corporation property because it happens to be run and owned by a few millionaires? Is it democracy to propose the organization of the Federal government so that virtually every employee, every bureau head, every Congressman will owe his position to the head of a gigantic bureaucracy?

These are questions which many more Americans than the 17,000,000 "reactionaries" who voted against Franklin Roosevelt would like to have answered before the bludgeoning of Con-

gressman by Jim Farley. Roosevelt & Co. is resumed in November or January.

Senator Joe Guffey of Pennsylvania supplied the second political utterance of the week which occupies our interest. On a nation-wide radio hookup, Senator Guffey, who heads the democratic senatorial committee, charged with assisting the reelection of Democratic Senators against Republican opponents, attempting to read out of the party three men who were in opposition this year to the Supreme Court packing plan, namely, Senators Wheeler of Montana, O'Mahoney of Wyoming and Burke of Nebraska.

Senator Wheeler has been in the Senate throughout the Roosevelt administrations and prior to this year supported virtually every Roosevelt-sponsored measure. Due to his opposition to the court bill, he now finds himself ostracized by the leadership of his party and faced with the possibility of Senator Guffey and others of the new deal leadership entering his state in 1940 to campaign against his reelection.

Senator O'Mahoney was elected as a new dealer in 1934 and fulfilled his obligations to the Administration in the ensuing years by going down the line for new deal measures. He also is branded as "un-American" and a Tory and is now outside the charmed circle of Administration supporters.

Senator Burke's record is equ-

ally good in regard to support of new deal measures in the halls of the upper house of Congress. The Nebraskan campaigned for Roosevelt in 1936 and was instrumental in swinging his normally Republican state to the Roosevelt-Garner ticket. This year he simply refused to go along on such measures as court reform, wages and hours, etc., which he believed would bring revolutionary changes in the traditional political and economic systems of the country. Senator Burke is now "reactionary" in new deal parlance.

Senator Guffey's resignation is imminent as director of senatorial campaign efforts on behalf of incumbent Democrats. The blundering which has characterized every Administration move since January culminated in this latest move which further antagonizes those insolent enough to oppose the President. Each week we find prospects of reuniting opposing Democrats farther in the distance.

A dose of two bitter pills was not satisfactory to the new dealers, however. Shortly before the ten day time limit expired for the presidential signing of the lower court or judiciary reform bill, the President affixed his signature and attached to the bill a statement which was released to the press agencies.

While approving the bill which was written and steered through Congress by anti-new dealers as being a step in the right direction, the President announced

that he is still desirous of reform of the Supreme Court and has not by any means abandoned hopes of injecting new blood into the judiciary.

"Many of us," he said, "have viewed with concern the widening chasm between the people one the one side and the courts and the bar on the the other—t chasm recognized and deplored by many of our ablest and most enlightened judges and lawyers. It hardly can be doubted that our people are restive under the slow and uncertain processes of the law.

"I spoke, therefore, for an upbuilding process, not only to preserve the independence and integrity of the judiciary, but to

reinforce it and strengthen it as an essential and honored part of our institutions."

Obviously the President feels that in the case of the court reorganization bill he was thwarted by a minority. If he is sincerely convinced that he is supported by the people, why does he not consent to the submission of a constitutional amendment, a proposal which would be acceptable to the anti-court bill Congressmen and whose acceptance or rejection by the people would be expedited by the backing of both pros and anti's on court reorganization? This would be a much simpler and more rational plan than carrying the issue to the polls in the election next year, which action would serve only to accentuate the break in the ranks of the Democrats.

Two other Senators spoke their minds on events which will occupy the political arena three years now: The nomination of a Democratic candidate for president.

Senator Minton of Indiana endorsed former Governor and now

Philippine High Commissioner Paul V. McNutt of his State for the nomination. McNutt, while chief executive of Indiana, made a brilliant record for himself as a liberal governor, and has consistently backed Roosevelt. Those now in opposition to many Administration measures promptly convinced their displeasure at such an eventuality as his nomination.

Following this statement and emphasizing the trend of thought and feeling among the Democrats, Senator King of Utah issued a statement expressing the wish that a member of the party outside the circle of new deal advisers received the nomination in 1940. He specifically named Senators Clark of Missouri, Bailey of North Carolina, and Byrd of Virginia as coming in this category.

Minton's and King's pronouncements lent credence to reports in vogue since the Court fight rent asunder the Democrats that a battle royal will take place in 1940 at the Democratic National Convention between the opposing factions within the party.



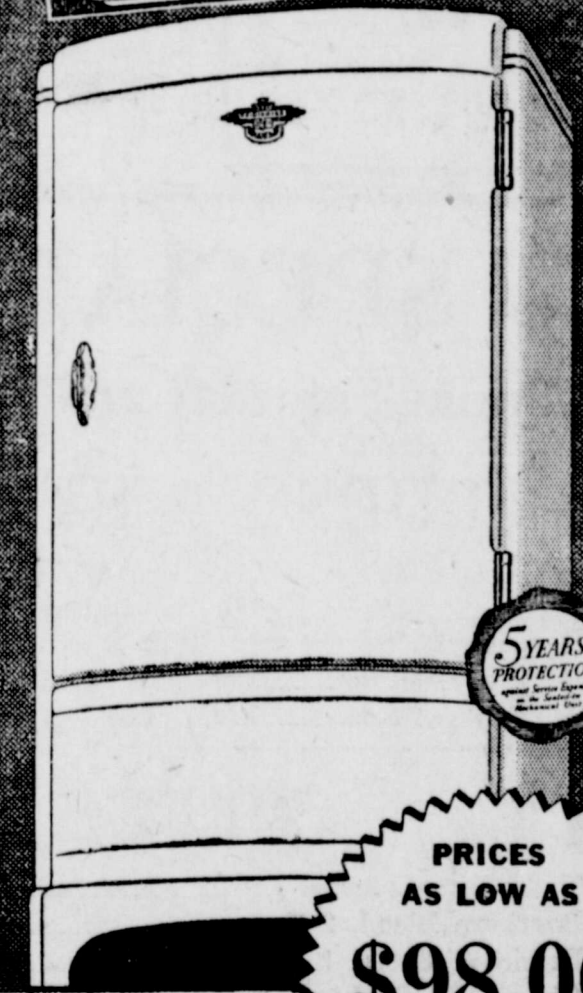
