## Coryell County Annual Meet Draws Youngsters in Drove

### Fifth Anniversary of SCS to Be Observed at CCC Camp Apr. 4

Visitors who attended the open house observance of the Gatesville CCC camp which will held April 4, 1938, to commemorate the 5th anniversary of the Civilian Conservation Corps in the U. S. will see 103 typical soil conservation conditioned farms under agreement with the Soil Conservation Service in the camp area. Mr. Monroe Blankenship secretary of the local soil conservation association announced today that those farms will be included in the tour of inspection to be conducted April 4th, as a part of the CCC birthday celebration.

Because there is a definite relationship between the prosperity of the people and the land on which they live, farmers in adjoining areas have been invited to make the tour and see how cooperators with the Soil Conservation Service have halted erosion on their farms. Because the prosperity of the town depends to a great extent on continued agricultural production, all residents of Gatesville also have been invited to make the tour and visit these farms. Transportation will be provided for those who do not have their own cars.

The tour will start at the camp at 2:10 p. m. o'clock, Monday April 4th, and will take about two hours to complete, Mr. Blankenship said.

The 103 farms cooperating with the Soil Conservation Service comprise a total of 22,000 acres. The local camp is one of 361 CCC camps in Region 4 consisting of the states of Texas, Louisiana, and Arkansas, doing soil conservation work on 8,495,000 acres.

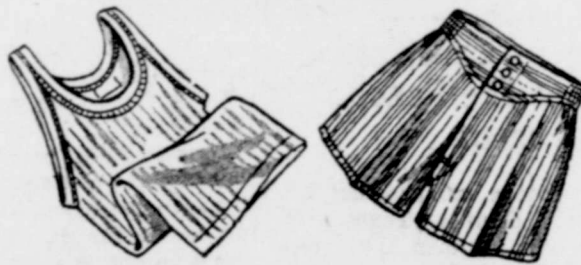

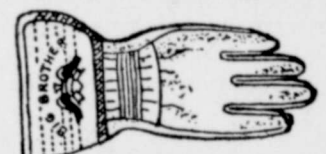

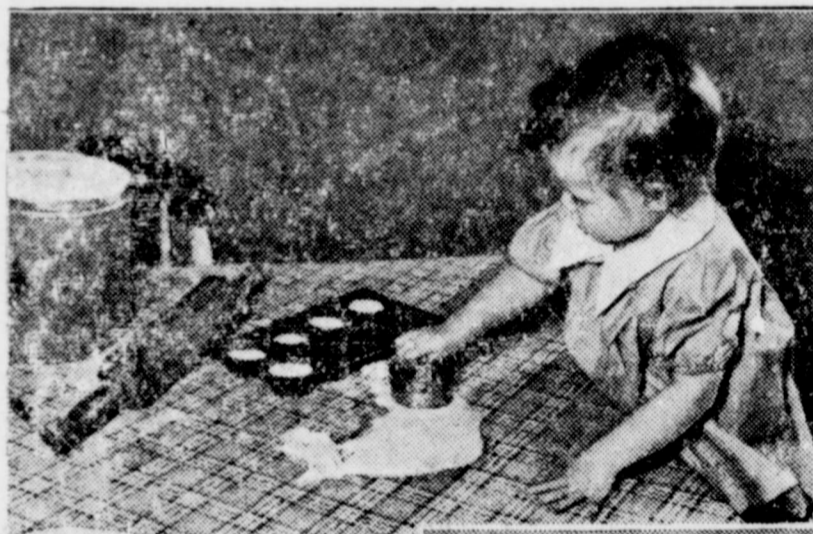

## WORLD COMMENT



Joe Burns

In 1914 Harvard Professor Albert Bushnell Hart predicted that the United States would enter the World War and that the Allies would win. In a recent interview with the United Press he forecasted the next developments in the current European crisis.

We consider his observations so pertinent that we shall quote from Professor Hart's statements:

"The United States will not enter into any war unless it is clear that our national existence is threatened," he stated.

"He believed that Hitler, dreaming of a new and greater German empire will stze Czechoslovakia perhaps within four weeks—at least within four months".

"No military force that can be raised could prevent Germany from taking Czechoslovakia," he said. "The Czechs could not hold out for four days. There would perhaps be one battle—a show-down."

Next—or perhaps before—Hitler will annex Poland, Hart predicted. I had expected him to take over Poland before this, even before Austria he said. His international defense for such a step would be stronger than for taking Czechoslovakia, he added.

"The people of western Poland the aristocracy are either Germans or German speaking. And of course, if he were going to move into western Poland he would take over the whole country".

The Baltic state—Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, and Finland—likewise will fall into the hands of Germany, probably in bloodless revolution, Hart believed.

"Britain and France will be forced to side with Russia, and it looks as though Italy would side with Germany. Right now Germany is patting Italy on the back and telling her 'don't be scared'."

The only thing that can stop the expansion of the German empire, barring Hitler's death by illness or assassination is Russia, Hart said.

"The peace of the next few years depends on Russia," he said. "If Russia thinks Germany is setting up too powerful a state in western Europe, she may jump in and break it up. But Russia apparently is unwilling to go to war just yet."

Once Great Britain and France have declared war on Germany Hart said, Hitler would occupy the Netheland within 24 hours to gain control of the Dutch seaports. Norway, Sweden and Denmark would be forced into this next war, he predicted.

On the south, Germany would occupy Switzerland because of its strategic military positions, Hart declared.

"Probably the future of the next war could be expressed in terms of barrels...of oil" he said "And neither Germany nor the nations marked for the new empire have any source of oil."

Hart said Germany for years has been importing and storing oil against just such an emergency, but contended that a year's warfare would exhaust the supply.

"Germany is getting most of her oil from the United States"

he said. "And if we don't want to get mixed up in the next war we ought to stop sending supplies to probable enemies".

The remarks of Professor Hart, dean of American historians, are pertinent and somewhat of a revelation to any credulous person who might believe Hitler will stop with the conquest of Austria.

Poland and Czechoslovakia are also to fall under the iron, merciless hand of the swastika, Professor Hart relates, indicating, if true, that Hitler has dreams of an empire embracing all of central Europe and probable including the rich Russian Ukraine. Should these two states fall to Hitler, adding some 45,000,000 people to his realm, there is no reason to believe the Danubian states would be spared. The rich wheat field of Hungary, Jugoslavia and Rumania would be tempting to the hungry Nazis and the German war machine would seek to control the oil fields of Rumania.

No sane person can believe that all Europe is to capitulate before Hitler, as did Austria, without a fight. Even if one victim of the Nazi wrath—the Czechs for example—should resist a German invasion, war would ensue and all Europe would soon be wrapped in flames.

## DR. WHEELER INVITES YOU TO VIEW ANTIQUES SUNDAY

Guests at an open house affair at the home of Dr. J. S. Wheeler Coryell City, next Sunday afternoon from 2 to 7 o'clock will see antiques from 100 year of world history, collected since Dr. Wheeler participated in the Spanish American war, he announced here Tuesday night.

Among the collection which decorates the Coryell county man's residence building, are the skin of a boa constrictor, which he killed hunting in Brazil skins of a South American tiger a lion, and an alligator nine and one-half feet in length.

Dr. Wheeler has an ox yoke once used by Will Bruce, he said while Bruce had charge of a plantation in South Carolina 40 years ago. He also has many varieties of guns, swords and ammunition in the collection.

Wheeler is also a veteran of the World war.

This has been one of those weeks when everything breaks loose at the same time. We have had six straight days during which the sun has never peeped out—a cold drizzling rain almost all the time. It makes one want to see the Texas Spring. Mrs. Poage and I have just come from a full morning at the hospital and find that she must have an operation on her leg which was broken five months ago and has been in a cast ever since. We had hoped that she would now be able to get around without a cast, but when the doctors took it off they discovered that the bone had not united and that they must cut in and bring the ends of the bone together with plates and start the whole process over from the beginning.

There are several people here from home who came to Washington looking for jobs and several more whose jobs have played out. I have been doing all I can to get jobs for them and for hundreds of friends at home who want Federal places but it is a very discouraging undertaking

as practically every government agency is reducing its force.

Several representatives of the Brazos District arrived in Washington this morning and I have been in conference with them. Months ago we received a letter from the President promising \$4,500,000.00 for the construction of the Possum Kingdom Dam. No mention was made of turning any part of the work over to the Federal agency and in fact it expressly required that any power machinery be installed at cost of the district and that the district should pay for all land and lake site. Of course, the income from the sale of any power would belong to the district to be used to finance the purchase of land and machinery. The bids for erection of the dam were all in last month and must be acted on within the next two weeks. On the nineteenth of this month the W. P. A. decided that the district must get a license from the Federal Power Commission and turn over all power to this Commission or W. P. A. won't go on with their obligation to put up the \$4,500,000.00. Of course, we think this the direct breach of our agreement with the President. We are willing to agree that the Federal Power Commission shall pass on any sale of power that we make but we feel that the proceeds belong to the district. If we don't get the money we can't go on with the program of new dams we planned. I have already had the matter up with the W. P. A. officials and in the morning I shall go with the Representatives of the District to formally protest.

The House has been discussing the increased Naval Appropriations this week. This bill provides for substantial additions to all branches of the Navy to give this country adequate protection on both oceans. It is not intended to create a great offensive agency but each day we see the dictators striking down the liberties of every nation that is not adequately protected. This nation must protect itself on both the Atlantic and Pacific at the same time. To do so, in a world of super armaments we must have a first class navy. An effort was made yesterday to strike out all appropriations for new battleships (three are provided) The naval experts say that battleships are still the backbone of any defensive fleet so I voted against the amendment. Today an effort was made to strike out all appropriations for lighter-than-air craft construction (dirigibles). I know that we have not been very successful with these craft but had we quit building airplanes because we had some wrecks we would have no airplanes today. I think we must go on and I voted to continue our efforts to develop the most efficient defense in the world. We will not vote on the entire bill until next week.

We presented our play 'The Minister' New Car, on Tuesday night, March 22 at the school auditorium.

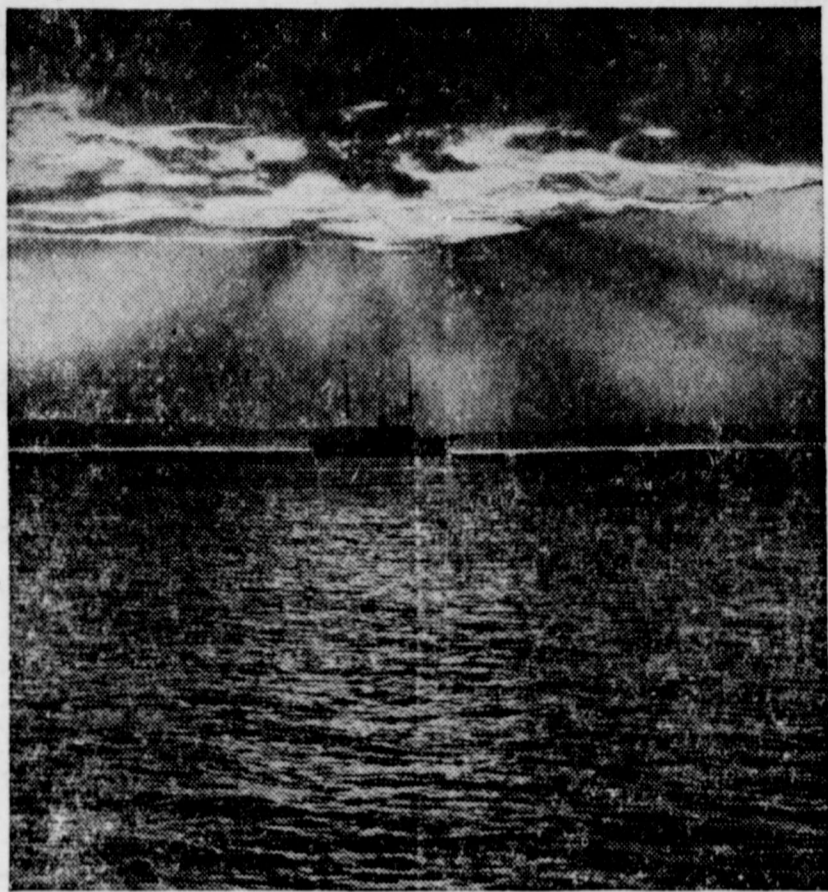

# The SNAPSHOT GUILD

WATER POEMS

THE moods of water, tumbling, bubbling, gushing, spouting, dashing, splashing, trickling, rolling, rippling, dripping, glad, angry, smooth, rough, serene, peaceful, make adjectives for poets. For the amateur photographer with any poetry in his soul whatever, they make themes for beautiful pictures and the subject of a delightful picture hobby.

We know of one amateur photographer who used his camera to picture the grand circle water makes in its journey from land to sea to the clouds and back to the land again. This picture epic of water began with a photograph of a tiny woodland spring, then pictures of a rivulet, a brook, a river, a mightier river with its waterfalls and cataracts, the bay through which it flowed into the ocean, the ocean itself, a cloud and sunbeam picture over the ocean, thus picturing water being caught up for its return journey, and finally rain.

This idea far from exhausts the possibilities of poetic water pictures, especially when human interest is added. The majestic sweep of water over Niagara Falls is a poem in itself but a honeymooning pair in the foreground adds romance. A fair swimmer in clear water on which sunshine is shimmering creates a poetic pattern of life and light. A pseudo-moonlight picture over a placid lake of a youth and a maid in a canoe is shot into the water and with a camera lens...

waters stilled at even." Foam at the prow of a careening yacht or its churning wake over the stern depicts the poetry of motion.

Verses may be illustrated. "Where the breaking waves dash high on a stern and rockbound coast" is a place for photographs of one of water's most inspiring moods, and then, from the hilltops "there is not in the wide world a valley so sweet, as that vale in whose bosom the bright waters meet."

Endless are your opportunities for making delightful photographs of water scenes. But there's a trick to successful water photography. It's largely a matter of shooting so that the pictured water has the right "feel" or texture.

For example, it's possible to shoot spray too fast, so that it has a hard, brittle look, thereby losing its essential sense of movement. On the other hand, rippling water should be shot fast enough so that the ripples are distinct, each with its own highlights.

Another point is lighting. Choose the angle that gives you the maximum "texture," the characteristic interplay of light and shade. No one can tell you exactly how to go about this; a little experimenting will tell you better than volumes of words. But keep this in mind. Any fair-sized body of water reflects a lot of light. Your exposures, therefore, can be faster or, preferably, your "stop" smaller than for a comparable landscape.

## Gatesville Takes Pearl 76-41 In Dual Meet At Pearl

The Hornets won their initial track and field from a competent squad of Pearl Dragons 76-41, Friday. There was not much to choose between the two track teams, but Gatesville took a wide lead in the field events. Out of six field events Gatesville scored 48 points to Pearl's 12 and therein lay their margin of victory.

Jack Petty, Pearl's captain, was the individual star of the meet. He ran off and left his competitors at the post and coasted in to victory in the 100, 220, and 440 yard dashes, and gave the Dragons a wide lead on the first lap of the mile relay that they never relinquished. That, combined with his second place in broad jump, enabled him to score 19 1-4 points.

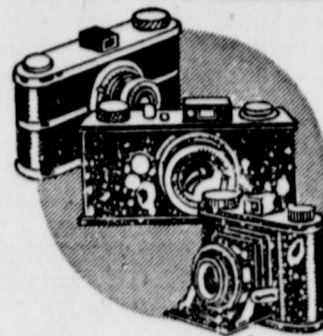

### Hornets Edged Out In Dual Track Meet With Bulldogs

The McGregor Bulldog track and field corps edged out a one point victory over the Gatesville team in a dual meet Wednesday. The strong Hornet field team ran away with the field meet, 39½ to McGregor's 20½, but the Bulldogs track outfit outpointed Gatesville's by 20 markers, there by leaving the final score 69½ to 68½.

Brooks, lanky Bulldog speedster captured scoring honors 20½ tallies marked up to his credit. He copped first place in the high hurdles, first in the low hurdles tied for second in the high jump first in the broad jump and second win the shot put. Joe Ned Brown, Hornet star was the runner up in the individual with fourteen markers. Bulldogs Shirley and Collens scored 10½ point for third-place honors.

The race tapered down to the mile relay with Gatesville leading one point. Brown, who led off the Hornets, took a twenty yard lead on his man, and Hearn the next runner increased it to 30. Shirley, however was only

fifteen yards behind Hinsley and the end of the third lap, and Collens who had previously won the 220 and 440 yard dashes, outran little Weaver in the last quarter mile to give McGreg, or a victory in the relay and the meet.

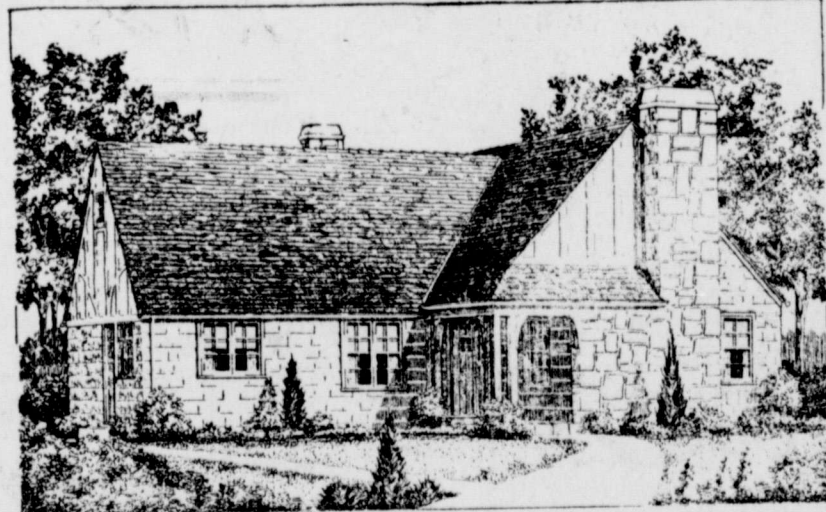

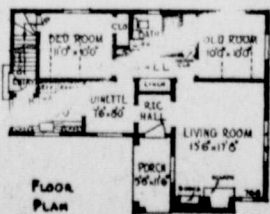

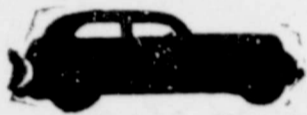

Dyeing Baby Chicks for Easter  
 Instructions for dyeing baby chicks as recommended by Geo. P. McCarthy, Assistant Extension Poultryman have been received. They are as follows:

1. Chicks may be dyed at any age but the younger the chick the easier the operation. Best colors are obtained on white chicks not carrying yellow pigment in their down.
2. Pure anilin dyes give best results although cloth dyes may be used. In using cloth dyes, care should be taken, as often these carry a mordant or "fastener" which proves poisonous to the chick if swallowed. Pure anilin dyes are not poisonous.
3. Mix dye to desired strength in a glass or porcelain container. Keep temperature of dye solution between 90 and 100 degrees F.
4. Operator should wear rubber gloves. Hold chick by down on head and immerse in dye solution with one hand, rubbing dye into down with finger of other hand. After body is colored rub dye into head plumage with finger.
5. If pure grain alcohol is obtainable, a 20 per cent solution cuts the oil in the down and makes the process faster and easier.
6. Chicks should be taken from a temperature of around 90 degrees before being dyed. If removed from to high a temperature the chilling effect of becoming wet will cause a high mortality.
7. After a chick is thoroughly colored, place immediately in a temperature of 100 degrees for drying. Leave there until completely dried and fluffed out. Then handle the same as any other chick.
8. Place on wire for drying. Chicks placed on a cloth lose most of their color, the dye being absorbed by the cloth.
9. Do not mix chicks of different color while still wet, as they move around and rub each other destroying the color effect. One color only to a tray or compartment gives best results.

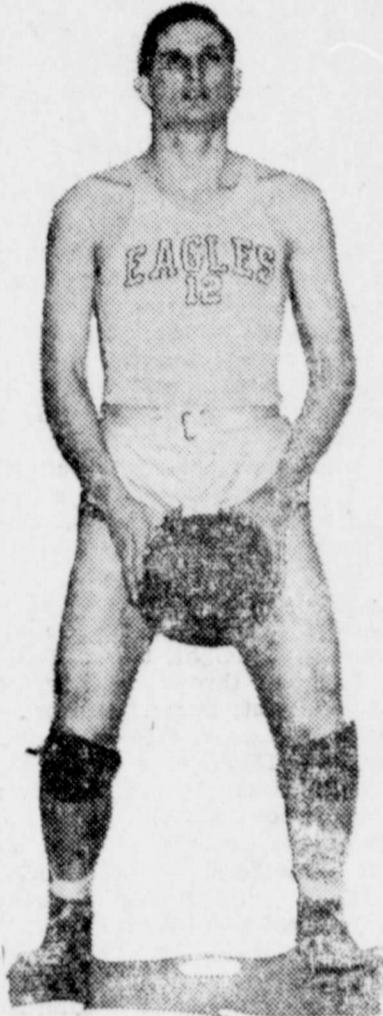

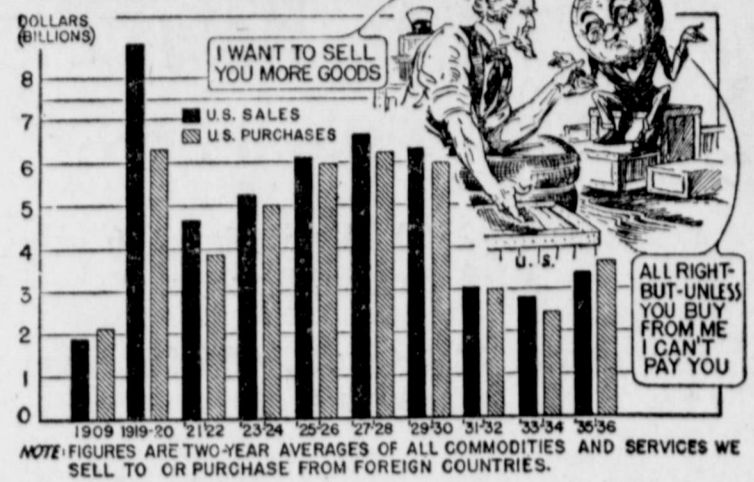

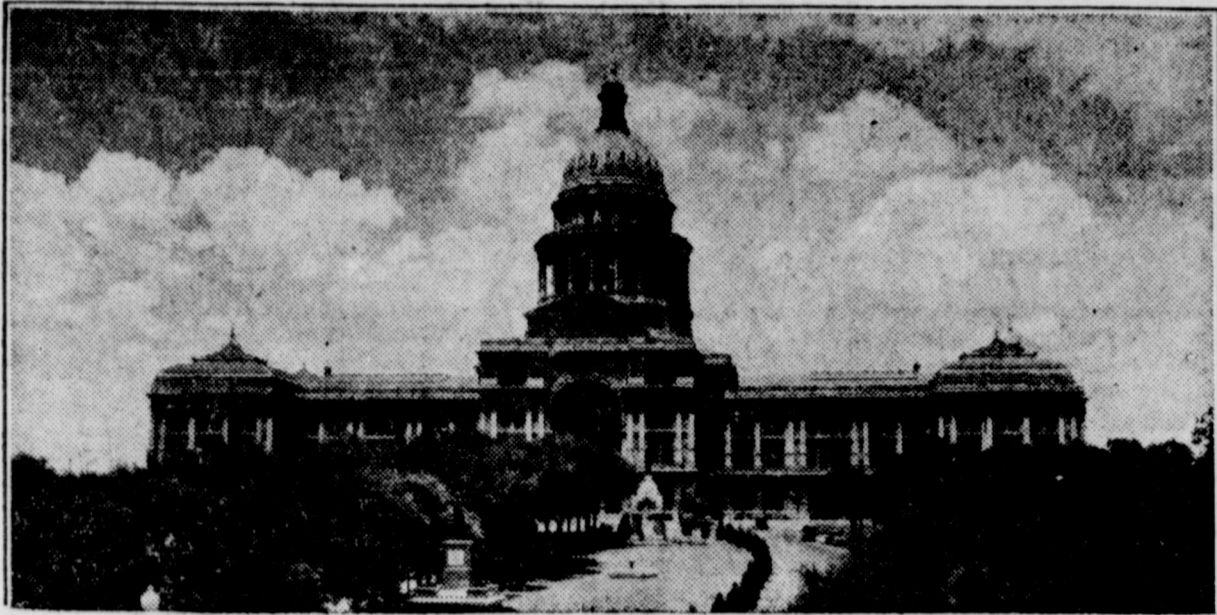
