GATESVILLE'S FIRST "DAIRY DAY" TO BE HELD SATURDAY, APR. 23

Dairy Maids, dairy farmers dairy interests, business men and all other interested parties will be pleased that the First "Dairy Day" will be held in Gatesville Saturday, April 23.

High lights of this Dairy Day will be the showing by dairy men and farmers of their better dairy cattle and according to letters sent out by County Agent Guy Powell, the cows may be grade or purebred. All bulls must be registered.

This method of classification is entirely new to this section in that cattle will be classified in groups. Those classified in the blue ribbon class will be issued a certificate of recognition from the Dairy Department of A. & M. College.

Cattle judging will start at 10 a. m. and it is necessary that the entries be on hand at time. Recognized judges will be in charge of the classification.

A program from 10 a. m. until 3 p. m. will deal with milk, cream, butter and dairy cattle.

TWO CAR ACCIDENTS MAR EASTER SUNDAY TRIPS HERE

Colt Class. Two years or under. A. Saddle. B. Thoroughbred. Four prizes, all ribbons.

Five Gaited. Gelding or stallion. any age. Judged on conformation, substance, finish style beauty, manner and way of going. Gaits required: walk, slow gait, (choice of running walk or stepping pace), canter rack, trot four ribbons.

Plantation class: Any age. Gaits required: walk fox trot and canter. Four ribbons.

Fine harness class: Judged 40 percent conformation and finish, 60 per cent, performance. Four ribbons.

Pleasure class: Any gait. Four ribbons.

Model class: to be shown in hand. Judged on saddle qualities. Four ribbons.

Junior Five Gaited class: (Stallion-mare or gelding 4 yrs. old and under) Judged on conformation, substance, finish style beauty, manners and way of going. The gaits required: walk, slow gait canter, rack, trot, . . .

Five Gaited stake: (Stallion, mare or gelding and age). Judged on performance of gaits, manner, conformation, brilliance and soundness. Trophy first; Second third and fourth, ribbons.

Ladies class: Five Gaited. Four ribbons.

Exhibition: Jumping.

Exhibition: Clown.

Exhibition: Digby Horse.

Reining class: (Cow boys).

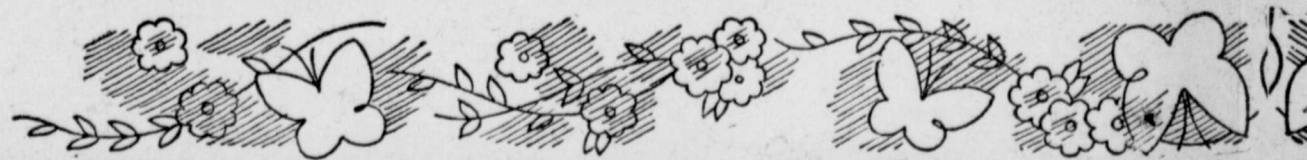

Coryell County Baseball League; Suggested Constitution and By-Laws

President, secretary, and board of directors to be named by a representative of each team entered in the league.

1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in the Board of Directors. Each league member shall be entitled to one vote. (b) The duties of the president will be to preside over all called meetings, and vote only in the case of tie. (c) The duties of the secretary are to keep all records and furnish teams with eligible players names.

2. The season to be played will start May 1, (Sunday) and continued thru August 14, after which time, a 2 out of 3 game series, between the two leading

teams will be played to decide the championship of the league, within two weeks after August 14.

3. Be it hereby understood that a team may consist of eighteen players, and these must be drawn or taken within a radius of 10 miles from town that he plays with. (On nearest traveled road).

4. After May 1, a player must be listed with the Secretary of the league two Sundays before he is eligible to participate in any league contest. (b) In order that a player may be eligible to start the season, his name shall be recorded with the secretary not later than Saturday, April 30, 1938.



BASEBALL CHATTER By Post

Baseball is on the upgrade in Coryell County. This was shown definitely by the result of the meeting held in the News Office Saturday afternoon. Plans were laid for the founding of a Coryell county Sunday baseball league with four teams tossing their hats into the ring and three or four other prospective entrants lined up. Coryell City, Jonesboro, Mound and Blackfoot all expressed their willingness to co-operate in the forming of a circuit and they laid out a tentative set of rules by adopting (with a few amendments) the constitution and by-laws of the Cowhouse Basin Baseball League which has operated successfully for the past three years.

All communities who wish to make their entries into this league are urged to send a representative to a gathering to be held in the News Office Thursday night, when all preparations necessary for the opening of the

league May 1 will be made. This convention will adopt finally a set of rules, will select a President and secretary, and will elect a Board of Directors who will make decisions on all important matters.

All concerned are eager for and expecting a brisk season.

The high school baseball league has already gotten under way, with Jonesboro and the State Training School capturing the inugarals. The Eagles with Watson and Walsh in the box, outslugged the Ireland Cardinals 16-6, while the State boys slammed their way to a 12-7 verdict over the Gatesville Hornets.

5. Each team shall furnish one umpire for games played leading to championship games, and furthermore in all play-off series of the league, the umpire shall be neutral appointed by the president of the league. Note—All umpires shall be agreed upon in advance of each contest.

6. No appeal shall be made from the umpires decision unless the rules of the league have been violated by him. In other words all public opinion and judgement ceases, the umpires decision shall be final.

7. All playing rules of this league shall be governed by the Texas, National or American league rules of the United States.

8. The home team shall furnish (2) two new balls for each league game played.

9. BALL, Regulation, baseball.—?

10. The visiting team shall be allowed a minimum of 15 minutes to "warm up" before scheduled time to start the contest.

11. All of the games of this league to start at 3:30 p. m.

12. All rained out games between teams shall be played at the next scheduled meeting of the two teams. Note—The last game of a double-header shall be 7 innings unless a tie.

13. A player that has been signed by a league member cannot transfer from one team to another of this league unless he makes a complete change of residence.

14. No person shall be required to pay more than 10 cents to see any game at this league played.

15. The schedule shall consist of—(to be decided after all teams have entered) games played by each team meeting each

member of the league—times thruout the season.

16. The Play-off shall be played to defray expenses of the secretary, and shall consist of the two leading teams at the end of the season ending August 14.

17. When two managers of opposing teams agree in advance on any one thing regarding the contest to be played it shall be regarded as lawful to do so by the Board of Directors of this league, provided that none of the rules and By-laws of this constitution of the league have been violated in so doing. (b) This rule means bats, bases, ground, change in schedule of game to be played, in case of rain, funeral, etc., the managers of the opposing teams may agree in advance on such matters.

18. The Board of Directors

may amend or repeal any part of this constitution at any one of its called meetings thruout the league year.

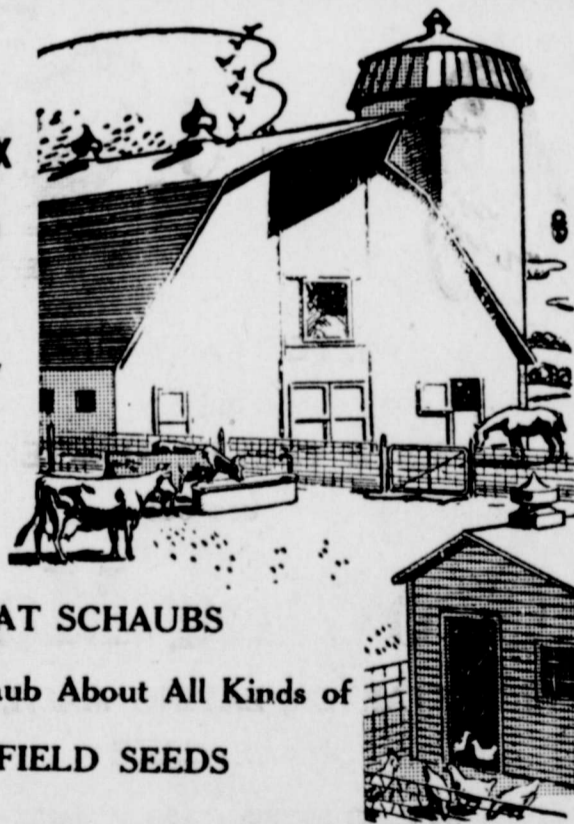

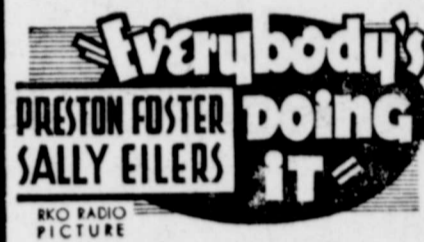

FIFTY-NINE HIGH SCHOOLS HAD JOURNALISM CLASSES

AUSTIN, Tex., April 18—Journalism courses are being offered this year in 59 Texas schools to 2,527 students, a gain of about 60 percent both in the number of schools and enrollment over 1935, according to D. C. Reddick, assistant professor of journalism at The University of Texas and director of the International League Press Conference. A survey made three years ago showed that 36 schools offered journalism courses to about 1,500 students.

"The smallest class listed on the press conference records this year has eight students", Reddick said. "The largest, with about 165 enrolled, is at Woodrow Wilson High School, Dallas. Five high schools have more than one hundred journalism students.

SHIP OF STATE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—There are folks in the Capitol today who say Huey Long died too soon, and they don't mean that he lost a chance at '36 but that his great opportunity would have come now in 1938. It's going to be, they say, a field day for the Demagogues and they point to the resurrection of such groups as the followers of Coughlin. Widespread unemployment and millions of families existing on a 'marginal' wage which barely covers a scanty food and shelter and clothing, has made a fertile recruiting field for radical leaders.

Hence wary politicians are making no nationwide predictions on the outcome of the election this year. Undoubtedly some Democrats will be defeated. Undoubtedly a few Republicans will lose their seats. Whether or not these reversals will be a simple change of parties or whether a third party candidate will win depend on how much faith he voters put in the promises of the various candidates.

Amid the hullabaloo of passing Navy and Army appropriations, the third anniversary of the founding of the air force GHQ slipped by almost unnoticed. Our air force is admitted by international experts to be second to none in quality and according to plans, in quantity. Unfortunately only seven hundred officers are now on the rolls while the plans call for fourteen by July First. While the enlisted personnel is within fifteen

percent of planned strength, planes of twice that number.

As was pointed out by air force chiefs this week: the Navy can't wait to build ships or the Army to make guns until after a war starts but both can enlist and train men on short notice. The air force however, must not only be ready with ships but with trained men to fly them. Before Congress adjourns there will be definite action taken to provide for bringing the flying corps of defense up to effective strength.

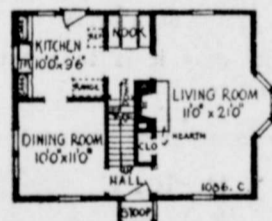

HORNETS LOSE FIRST COUNTY LEAGUE CONTEST, 12-7.

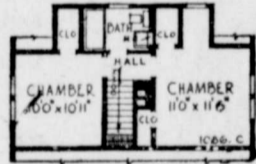

HUEY BROTHERS USE SCS ON THEIR FARMS

The spreading of interest in soil conservation practices with the tenants in the Gatesville camp area is encouraging and very instrumental in the progress and spreading of such practices. It has come to the attention of the staff in the Gatesville camp that the last several requests for survey have been instigated by the interest of the tenant operators.

E. R. Huey and Herbert Huey, living on the L. E. Burt farm and John Powell farm respectively, are greatly responsible for the interest on these two farms and also the Chas. McConnaughey farm which they operate in the Gatesville community. The operators on the R. Q. Travers farm and another of the Jake Powell farms which join the Huey brothers' farms mentioned above, have greatly influenced and created interest in the land owners to put into effect soil and water conservation practices.

The SNAPSHOT GUILD

DECORATIVE SILHOUETTES



Since the puppy is likely to move, a photographic flash bulb, which gives an instantaneous flash of light, was used in making this silhouette.

PHOTOGRAPHIC silhouettes are a source of decorative pictures—and camera fun—which every snapshotter should try. The arrangements are simple—a white sheet stretched over a doorway, or division between two rooms, with a strong light behind it and the camera set up in front.

By arranging his subjects in front of this brightly illuminated sheet, the clever photographer can construct any number of imaginative or story-telling pictures. Costume snaps are particularly interesting in silhouette, and there are possibilities for many humorous pictures of the "it-can't-be" variety.

For instance, a juggler can be pictured keeping a dozen or two balls or bottles in the air at one time, or a camper can be pictured with two skillets, flipping a dozen flapjacks at one shot. In both these pictures, the objects to appear in the air would be cut from black paper or cardboard and pinned to the sheet at proper points.

The sheet must be stretched evenly, as wrinkles will show in the pictures. Lighting behind the sheet should also be as even as possible. Five feet is a suitable distance from lamp to sheet.

Three sixty-watt inside-frosted electric bulbs will provide enough light to give good results with five-second time exposures, using a box camera with its lens at widest opening, or other cameras at lens stop f.11. To stop movement when pets or small children are appearing in silhouette, use a flash bulb behind the sheet. Or, with two or three large size flood bulbs snapshots can be taken.

When using the flash bulb, someone can flash it at the correct moment at an "okay" signal from the person operating the camera. There should be sufficient light, from unshaded regular household bulbs, behind the sheet for the "cameraman" to see the silhouetted images and to know when to give his "okay" signal.

When the silhouette is snapped, of course, all lights must be turned off in the room which contains the camera and subject. Unless this is done, detail in the subject will show, spoiling the silhouette effect. The photographer should also be watchful of stray light from windows, and mirrors which might catch light from the illuminated sheet and throw it toward the shadow side of the subject.

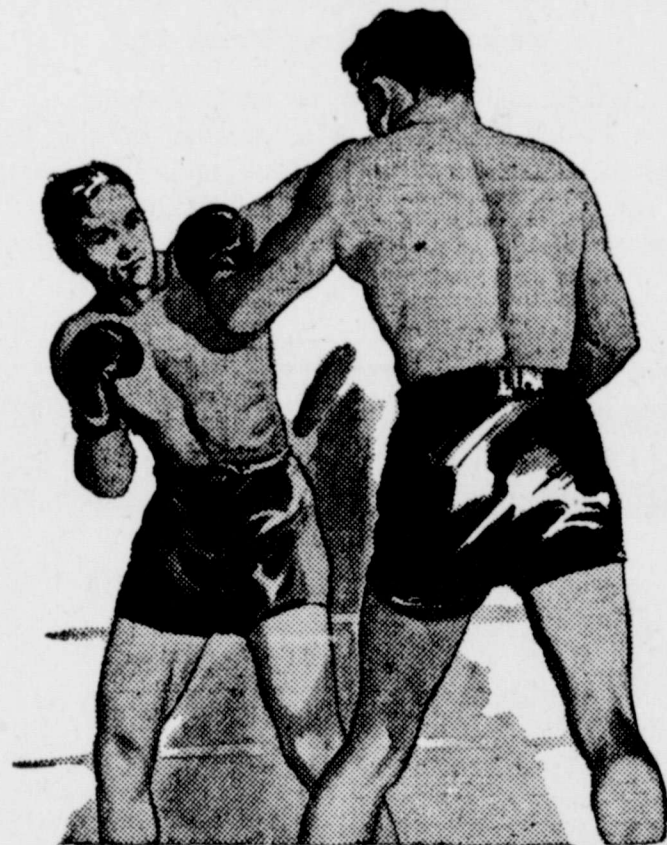

For ME 'N YOU

Do you sometimes wonder how to serve familiar vegetables so that they will seem different and more appealing? If so try these new tricks.

TOMATO AND PEANUT CASSEROLE

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup milk
- 6 slices bread
- 1 1/2 cups salted peanuts, ground fine
- 3 cups canned tomatoes
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1-8 tsp. pepper
- 3 tbsp butter

Beat the eggs slightly and add the milk. Dip the bread in the egg and milk mixture, then in the ground peanuts. Arrange a layer of bread in an oiled casserole. Pour half the tomatoes (seasoned with the salt and pepper) over the bread slices. Dot with half the butter. Arrange the rest of the bread in a second layer. Add the rest of the tomatoes, dot with the remaining butter and sprinkle with the last of the chopped peanuts. Bake in a moderate oven for 30 minutes.

ONION SHORTCAKE

- 2 cups flour
- 4 tps baking powder
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 4 tbsp shortening
- 2 1/2 cups onions sliced thin
- 1/2 to 2-3 cups milk
- 1 tbsp salt
- 2 tbsp fat
- 1 egg slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup milk

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cut shortening in with knives or rub in with finger tips, add milk slowly; mix to a soft dough. Flatten in a greased square pan to 1/4-inch thickness. Melt fat add onions and salt. Cook to a delicate brown. Cool and spread over the baking powder dough. Beat egg; add milk, pour over onions. Bake in a very hot oven 15 to 20 minutes. Cut in square and serve at once.

SCS WORK BEING DONE ON CHARLES POWELL FARM
 Complete erosion control at a minimum cost is demonstrated most effectually on the Charles Powell farm in the Plainview community. 167 acres of gently sloping cultivated land on this farm are protected by a method of half and half stripping with fall sown oats and contour cultivation of summer row crops. The only cost of installing erosion control on these 167 acres was that of running and making the original contour lines.

Mr. Gus Koch, who is operating the farm, stated recently, "I have lived on this farm or in this community for a long long time and am well acquainted with the great change that has taken place on the farms in this community during the past several years. On this farm yields grow less and less every year and gray spots began to appear in the field showing that the soil was getting thinner. At the time the place was placed under agreement with the Soil Conservation Service following any big rain, water would run off the field quickly, washing across the farmstead below

and allowing very little water to soak into the ground throughout the summer. I am very much in favor of this kind of work since it will gradually increase my yields and supply extra moisture to carry my corn and cotton through the summer drought.
 An inspection of this farm would be well worth the time of many farmers of this area since similar measures might be applied on their own farms at no greater cost than that of the ones which are proving so effective in this area.
