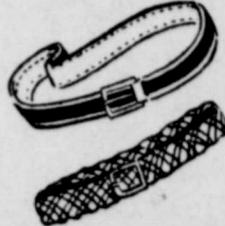

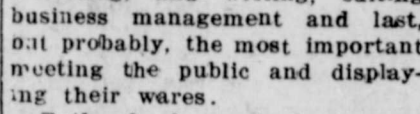
"30" IS WRITTEN ON TWO HIGH SCHOOL PAPERS

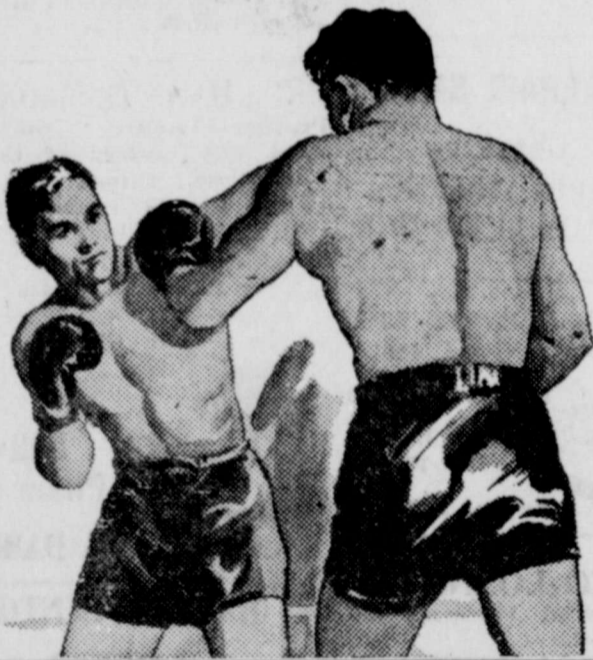

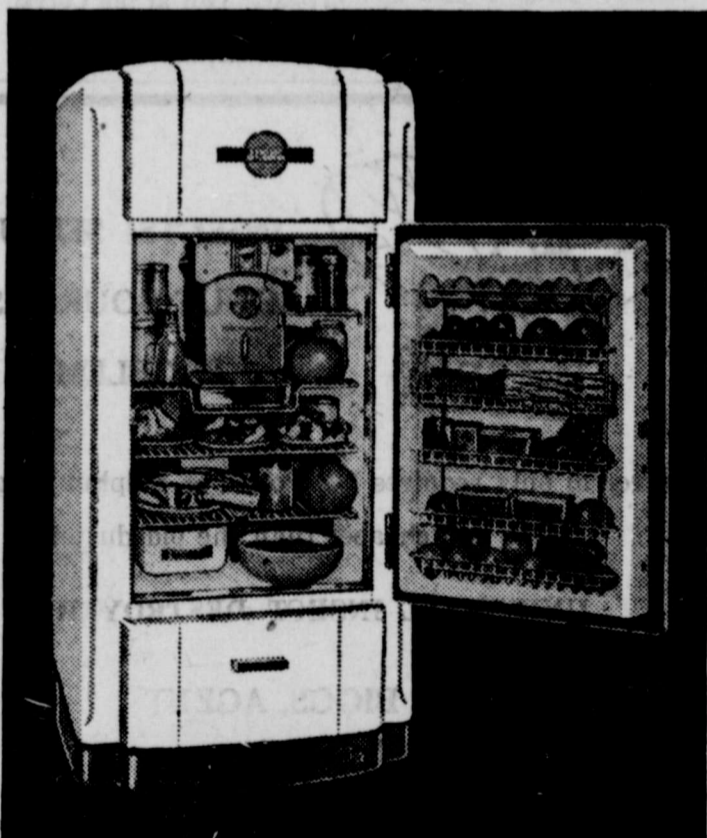

If you have been neglecting fish as a source of fine-flavored dishes and of economy as well use Lent as an excuse to feature this important food now. Study your food advertisements and you will find some splendid buys and if you live in communities that sell fish the year around this is a great opportunity to serve fish in great varieties.

SCALLOPED FRESH OYSTERS

- 5 tablespoons butter
- 4 cups soft bread crumbs
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- Pepper
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 pint oysters

Melt the butter, add crumbs and seasonings and mix well. Drain oysters and arrange in alternate layers with buttered crumbs in a greased baking dish. Bake 20 minutes in a hot oven.

SARDINES WITH SPICE SAUCE

- 1 can sardines
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1 tablespoon chopped onion
- 1 tbsp. chopped green pepper
- 1 tbsp prepared mustard.
- 1 tsp dry horseradish
- 1 tbsp water
- 2 tbsp salad oil
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp celery salt
- 1/2 tsp paprika
- 1/2 tsp black pepper
- Juice 1/2 lemon

Arrange the sardines on a platter. Place sliced lemon, tomato and pickle on the platter as a border.

Crush the garlic in a mixing bowl. Add the chopped onion and the green pepper crushing these with garlic. Add the mustard dry horseradish (mixed with the water) and the salad oil. Mix thoroughly. Add the remaining seasonings. Blend well and pour over the sardines.

Cook together until bubbling 4 tablespoons of butter and 3 cups of flour; add milk allowing 3-4 cup to each cup of flaked fish and simmer over hot water until thickened. Season sparingly with salt and white pepper, then add the fish, 1 pimento cut in strips and 2 hard cooked eggs cut in eighths lengthwise. Simmer over hot water 10 minutes serve on fingers of toast and sprinkle with finely chopped parsley and paprika.

CURRIED CABBAGE AND SHRIMP

- 4 medium onions pared and thinly sliced
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- 2 tbsp butter
- 1/2 cup top milk
- 1 tsp curry powder
- 3 cups cooked cabbage
- 1 cup cooked or canned shrimp
- 1/2 cup shredded coconut

Cook the onions and garlic in the butter with the curry powder and salt. When the onions are tender add the top milk and first removed the black vein running down the back of each shrimp. Heat and serve, adding more salt and curry powder if needed.

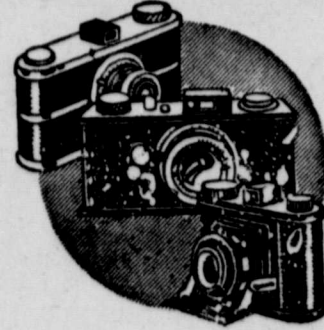

BRACK CURRY

NEW DEAL PRIMARIES

The renomination of Senator Claude Pepper over an administration foe in the Florida primaries greatly encouraged the New Deal high command and effected a change in New Deal campaign strategy.

Before Pepper smashed to an easy victory over Representative Wilcox and exgovernor Sholtz, administration leaders feared that presidential interference in state primaries might evoke repercussions against the administration. Therefore the plans were to pursue, generally speaking a hands off policy in most of the primaries of this summer and next fall.

Now, wherever a New Dealer and an anti-administration Democrat line up for a congressional seat, be it senator or representative the hand of the President will be seen publicly backing the New Deal champion.

Democratic Governor Charles Martin has played ball with the Republicans in the Oregon state legislature and has spoken vigorously against many New Deal policies and legislative proposals. In his campaign for re-election Martin will be opposed by State Senator Henry Hess, who will receive the support of the Roosevelt forces in the state. Thus the battle here will evolve into a clear cut fight between friends and opponents of the New Deal, in spite of the fact that the office involved is not of a congressional nature.

Senator Alben Barkley of Kentucky is fighting for his political life against Governor A. B. 'Happy' Chandler, whose meteoric rise to the governorship of his state closely resembles Jimmie Allred's. Chandler is a whirlwind campaigner and is due to run Barkley a close race. As Barkley is the administration's floor leader in the Senate, he is to receive the backing of the Roosevelt forces.

President Roosevelt has promised to speak in Paducah, Ky. the Senate leaders home town, before the primary. Louisville's two great newspapers, the Courier-Journal and the Times, owned by the son of the late Robert

Worth Bingham, ambassador to England, are going into action against Governor Chandler at the behest of the administration.

In Iowa, Senator Guy Gillette, conservative Democrat is running into trouble in his campaign for renomination before he has refused to support Roosevelt 100 per cent. Representatives Otha Wearin, 35 year old New Dealer is Gillette's opponent and is stumping the state with administration support. Wearin's chances are said to be good of unseating Gillette.

Another conservative Democrat who has not seen eye to eye with the administration is ebullient Senator Ellison D. 'Cotton Ed' Smith of South Carolina. Thus he finds his re-nomination chances considerably lessened by the entrance of Governor Olin Johnson, ardent New Dealer.

At least two other senators, Fred Brown of New Hampshire and George Magill of Kansas, will be publicly endorsed by administration leaders. Both Brown and Magill are due for tough Republican opponents in November although they have no intra-party opposition as yet.

The news that the administration will intervene in state primaries in support of pro-New Deal candidate present a serious challenge to the gubernatorial candidates in Texas.

Karl Crowley resigned his position as solicitor general for the post office department to run for governor. Since he returned to Texas and set up campaign headquarters in Dallas, Crowley has circulated letters bearing the signatures of Jim Farley and other administration leaders endorsing his candidacy. Does this mean that Crowley is to receive the support of the administration and the Democratic national committee in his efforts to succeed Jimmie Allred as Texas' chief executive?

Should the administration venture into the Texas political arena and throw its public support to Crowley his possibilities of at least entering the second primary would be considerably enhanced.

Thousands of Texas are now employed by the government in non-civil service positions meaning they are open to persuasion to vote as the administration and national committee direct or lose their jobs. Should they be ordered by Washington to go to bat for Crowley, one serious deficiency in the Crowley campaign would be in large part remedied: lack of organization on a state wide basis.

Naturally this is a speculation but friends of Bill McCraw,

Ernest Thompson, Tom Hunter and other candidates for governor are closely watching Crowley's campaign strategy for signs of activities by New Dealers in his behalf, acting ostensibly upon orders direct from Washington. And, as previously stated, if the administration enters other state primaries in support of administration friends, why should it not support Crowley, unless it believes McCraw Thompson, Hunter or any of the other gubernatorial candidates would be equally friendly to President Roosevelt?

Karl Crowley is receiving much free publicity thru the remarks of friends of other candidates. There is much speculation in the McCraw and Thompson political circles as to whether Crowley will be endorsed by former Governor James E. Ferguson and his wife.

Crowley has adopted the Ferguson platform of a two per cent sales tax and ensions for all over 60 years old. This would seem to qualify him to carry the Ferguson mantle if he so desires but nothing has been heard of a Ferguson endorsement at this date.

About the first of the year, when re-publication of the Ferguson Forum was begun, Jim Ferguson announced that The Forum would endorse some gubernatorial candidate who would adopt the Ferguson political platform.

Therefore an announcement from the Fergusons would appear to be in order.

Physicians' New Charges

April 28, 1938

In a meeting held last night the undersigned Physicians of Gatesville agreed upon an altered price schedule and some changes in the general policies of handling business, the most important are listed below. These policies are prepared for publication for the information of the public and in order to create a more uniform charge for medical service. The undersigned Doctors have agreed to adhere strictly to the basic charges as given. This schedule is to be in effect beginning June 1st 1938.

CALLS WITHIN THE CITY

The charge for calls within the city will be \$3.00 straight.

COUNTRY CALLS

The charge for calls to the country surrounding Gatesville will be \$3.00 plus \$0.50 per mile for each mile from the Courthouse square after the first mile.

NIGHT CALLS

Calls received between the hours of 9:00 p. m. and 7:00 a. m. are designated as night calls and an additional charge of \$1.00 will be made on town and country calls alike received between these hours. This does not apply to maternity cases.

MATERNITY CASES

The standard charge for Maternity cases in any location will be \$30.00. This includes the usual care during the prenatal period of the uncomplicated case. This is to be cash at the time the case is concluded and should place a burden on no one since there have been several months time in which to make the necessary preparations for this payment.

OFFICE CALLS AND OFFICE HOURS

The standard charge for office calls between the hours of 7:30 a. m. and 6:00 p. m. is \$1.50 and up depending upon the nature of the case. Office calls outside the limits of these hours will carry a \$1.00 extra charge. Re-writes on prescriptions with no examination necessary will be \$1.00 during regular office hours; \$2.00 outside office hours

DISCOUNT FOR CASH

Any bill exceeding \$10.00 is subject to a 10 per cent discount for cash payment on the spot. This does not include maternity cases or special surgical procedures.

A copy of this schedule will be placed in each Doctors office and will be followed explicitly.

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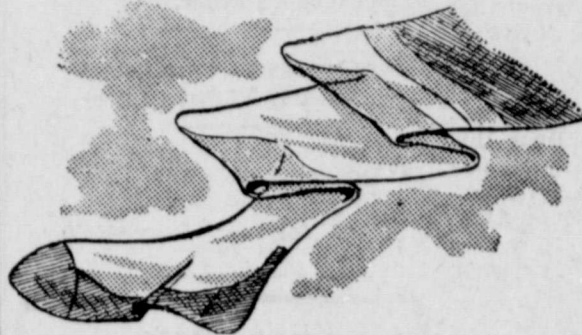
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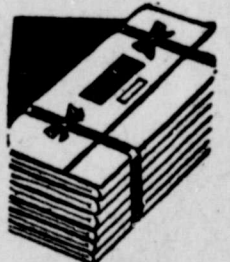
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
