NEWSPAPERS OF ANCIENT VINTAGE BROUGHT BY MRS. McCLELLAN

In our window and very much in line with the Rodeo and Frontier Celebration is a part of a collection of ancient newspapers owned by Mrs. Jim McClellan. Two Gatesville "Suns", printed on July 15 and July 22 1881 are the two Gatesville papers that appear in our window. This paper was edited and published by C. E. Gass and C. E. Gass.

ments are those of antiquated patent medicines, who were the originators or newspaper advertising. Another paper on display is an old one-page edition of the Turnersville "Effort" which was edited by J. B. Cranfill, who later became a Baptist Minister. There is also an old Waco Record.

One of the most interesting exhibits is the collection of obsolete money owned by W. T. Brumbalow of Leon Junction. This collection contains ancient coins and bills issued in the 70's and 80's. There are bills issued by the Dominion of Canada, Mexico and the Confederate States of America. There are also many fractional bills, worth 10, 15 and 25 cents issued by the U. S. Government during the Civil War when all hard money was taken out of circulation.

There are two bills issued by the old Massachusetts Bay Colony in 1761, several issued by the state of Georgia, one by the state of New Jersey and one by the state of Texas.

In the City Drug window is a picture of a "hanging" that took place on September 19, 1881; and a collection of antique firearms and a miniature pair of cowboy boots.

The proprietors of the Buckhorn Domino Hall have an old hitching rail constructed in front of their establishment, while an old sign which reads "WHISK-EY" is hanging in the window of C. C. Davis' Ice Cream Parlor. This sign was used at the present location of the Ice Cream Parlor 45 years ago.

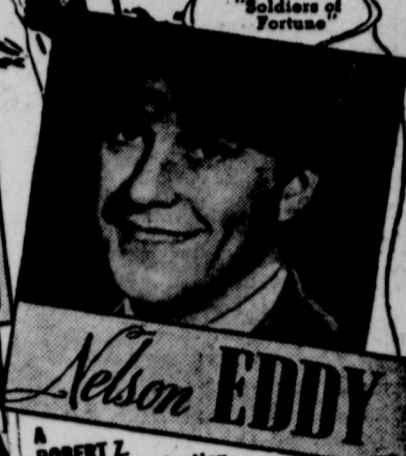
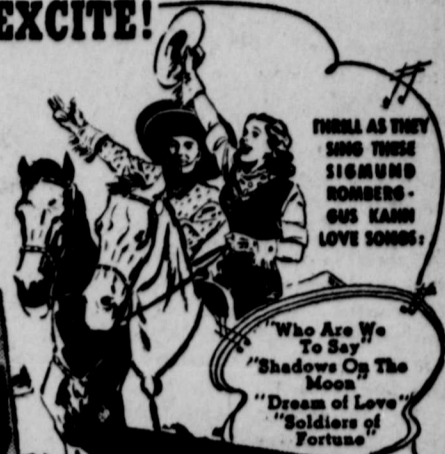

they would move the church to the present location they would deed the church and did so.

Then plans was made and this church was built about 1883. Not many years after the church was organized, Mrs. Days and Mrs. Wyatts, brother Alex Haaser and wife became members of this church and Alex was made deacon, so from the charter to the present, there has always been some of this family members of this church.

For thirty seven years there was church at eleven o'clock on Saturday also on 4th Sunday. On Saturday the members were corrected for cursing and dancing or any other wrongful deeds they knew about. If the members didn't get right then they were cast out. The old members were very faithful to each other especially in sickness. In the year of 1886 Rev. John Wrister little child fell asleep and was laid to rest at Bethel cemetery. The next year Mr. Quillen was laid to rest there. Now there are 125 graves.

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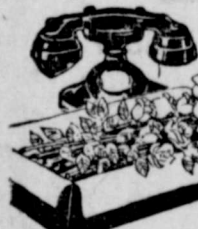

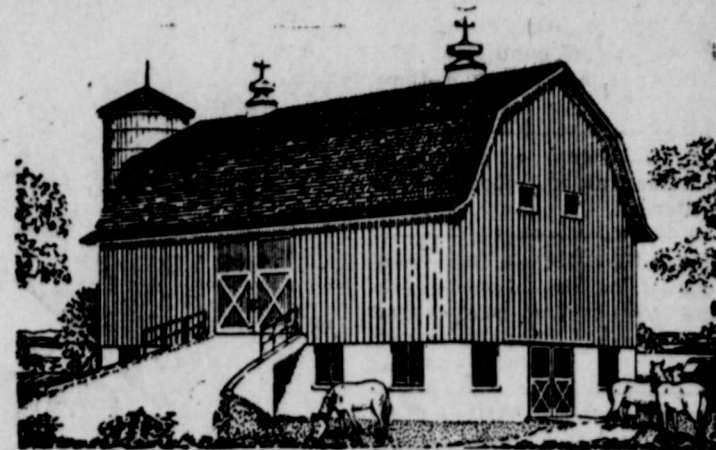
