### COUNTY REPORT OF UNEMPLOYMENT AGES 25-34.

In the recently completed Census of Partial Employment, Unemployment and Occupations for Texas, in Coryell county, the bad ages for getting or holding jobs is between 25 and 34. There were, when the census was taken 176 in this classification who were unemployed.

Other ages unemployed were as follows: 15-19, 121; 20-24, 147; 35-44, 119; 45-54, 75; 55-64, 58; and 65-74, 5.

There were 291 emergency workers and 534 partly unemployed.

Thruout the list, it seems the bad ages for employment in older people, that is in the pension age but at the young ages of 25 to 34.

There are 491 men to 217 totally unemployed, 241 men to 50 women emergency workers and 478 men to 56 women partly unemployed.

### LOUIS HODGES AND BILL SEALES DIE AFTER TERRIFIC CRASH

Louis Hodges and W. E. (Bill) Seals died Wednesday of almost identical injuries sustained in a head-on truck collision on Highway 7 Wednesday morning about 11 a. m. Seals died enroute to the local hospital, and Hodges never regaining consciousness, died at 2:30 p. m.

Both were working for Cage Bros. Constructing Company and were driving gravel trucks, and traveling on the same side of the highway met on a bridge about 3 miles east of here, both trucks being practically demolished. At the scene of the accident, no sliding tires was found, and it is supposed both thought the other would turn out of the road for the other, and attempts to stop were futile both started turning out. The trucks met just a little to each truck's right front wheel. Motors, radiators, front chassis were all demolished. Gravel was scattered so badly it was nearly impossible to determine which truck hauled the load. Practically all left of the two trucks were the rear wheels and axles and the dump bodies.

Both men were badly bruised and scarred with gravel and both had fractured skulls and right legs broken at the same place, indicating both had attempted to apply the brakes.

Seals leaves a wife and four children. His home was in Oglesby. Information has not yet been received as to funeral arrangements for him.

Louis Hodges was buried yesterday at 4 p. m. in the city cemetery, Rev. Ben Reynolds assisted by Rev. C. M. Spalding officiating.

Louis Robert Hodges was born September 11, 1909, leaving his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Gene Hodges, and a younger brother Clyde, at his immediate home.

# stumpin' the state

BY BRACK CURRY

Nineteen hundred thirty-eight marks the third biennium in which The News presents the column, Stumpin' The State, for the purpose of informing the voters as to the platform, qualifications and personalities of the various candidates for State office.

These facts will be presented by the writer in a strictly impartial manner. The interests of no individual candidate will be sponsored in this column, but information and pertinent facts pertaining chiefly to the candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general and railroad commissioner will be included with equal space given to each candidate.

The action of the state Democratic Executive Committee in eliminating Vernest O. or V. O. Thompson of Dallas as a gubernatorial candidate will be applauded by most right thinking Texans. On the basis of the facts as published hitherto, the State authorities of the Democratic party are abundantly justified in ruling that the name Vernest O. Thompson shall not appear on the primary ticket.

The candidacy has been handled so as to leave the voter very much in the dark as to who Mr. Thompson is, what he stands for and why he wants to be governor. Much discussion had revolved about Thompson's petition for a place on the ballot as a candidate for governor because of the similarity of the name given on the application to that of Ernest O. Thompson of Amarillo, another gubernatorial candidate and a member of the state railroad commission.

The Dallas Thompson, a garage operator, originally filed as "Vernest O." but later a man purporting to be his manager, James Wright, sought to withdraw the original application and to substitute that bearing the name "V. O." Thompson.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee at Austin protests were heard against the name of the Dallas Thompson

appearing on the ballot. They came from Committeeman Everette L. Looney from Dallas, the published resolutions of the Dallas Voters' Group demanding a clear cut opportunity for voters to register their choices, and from William McCraw gubernatorial candidate thru his personal representatives former assistant Attorney General Dick Holt, and Senator W. B. Collie of Eastland. No protest came from candidate Ernest T. Thompson.

The subcommittee appointed to examine applications consisted of Judge Beeman Strong, Beaumont chairman; Bert King, Wichita Falls; Sam Fore, Floresville; Charles K. Devill, Mount Vernon; Charles C. Curry Breckenridge; Dudley Harris, Ennis, and Charles E. Dansby, Valley Mills. The subcommittee, after receiving protests, rejected filings for governor as "Vernest O. Thompson and as V. O. Thompson on motion of King.

Looney presented to the committee reproductions of Dallas city directories of various dates a page from a deed record, news paper photographs and a page of The Dallas News of Feb. 20, 1917, containing an announcement of the marriage of Vivian O. Thompson. Looney said a search of directories of the corresponding dates failed to disclose a Vernest O. Thompson living there.

The committee took the position without a vote that Vernest Thompson on the face of it was nonexistent and there had been no controverting testimony. They held that "V. O." Thomson could not therefore avail himself of a fee paid by a nonexistent Vernest Senator Collie said Attorney General McCraw was not in favor of the committee accepting the Vernest Thompson filing and believed in a legitimate candidate getting all the votes he would with no subterfuge.

The Dallas News commented up on the controversy in these words:

"The question of the legal name of the not widely known candidate Vernest O. Thompson is of considerable importance. Any citizen is entitled to offer for place—it is up to his party first and the electorate in case of a primary victory to accept or reject him. The mere fact that his name is similar to, or even identical with that of another and better known candidate can not justly preclude voluntary candidacy, however embarrassing the circumstances may be to the other fellow.

"Obviously, however, if Vernest O. Thompson's legal name is Vivian O. Thompson, it is mandatory for the Democratic authorities to employ his proper designation on the ballot."

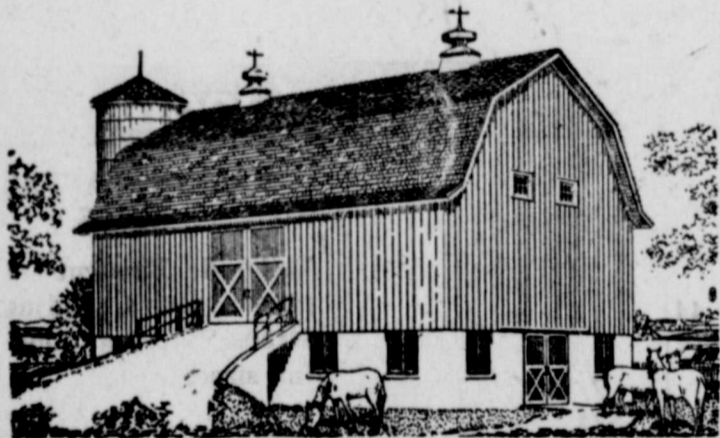
