## District Court Finishes Dempster Mill Mfg. Co. Case; Awards \$5,937.50

### CRIMINAL CASES DUE SOON WITH SHORT DOCKET

With election worries in the bag, district court, which this week, included a corps of lawyers in the Catherine Lester-Dempster Mill Manufacturing case, got busy this week.

Mrs. Lester was awarded \$5,937.50 damages in a suit growing out of the falling of the Evant Water Tank. No other civil cases came up during the week.

Criminal cases which are due are The State of Texas vs. the following: Arthur "Red" Chapel, charged with murder, (case

set for August 15), W. T. Huff, 2 counts, charged with forgery, M. H. White, charged with alleged desertion of children; Elven Hasty, charged with burglary; Jack McCrackn, charged in 2 burglary counts; Robert Lee Franks, Alias BAI Franks, 2 counts of burglary; Chas. Kemp charged with child desertion; and Alton Armstrong charged with rape.

So far as is known, nothing is to come up for the remainder of the week.

The grand jury has made their report to Judge R. B. Cross and has been dismissed. This report will be carried in the Tuesday issue of the News as it is not available at this time.

## POAGE WIRES ICKES ON BRAZOS VALLEY DAM PROJECT

Ten days ago Secretary Ickes was quoted as stating that he had already allotted all of the money to Texas to which this state was equitably entitled. Congressman Bob Poage immediately wired him expressing the hope that he had been misquoted. Secretary Ickes replied that he was still considering the application for funds to build dams along the Brazos, but repeated the statement that Texas had had her share of PWA money. Congressman Poage then wired him asking for a detailed statement of the allocations made in Texas. This statement has not been furnished by the Secretary, but a private list of PWA projects approved in Texas shows a total of only \$15,000,000.00. This is about 1 per cent of the total PWA money available for the nation. Congressman Poage points out that on the basis of population, wealth, or any other basis of calculation, Texas is entitled to a minimum of 5 per cent of the total allocations, or at least five times as much as the private statement shows our State has received. Mr. Poage, therefore, this morning sent the following telegram to Secretary Ickes: Honorable Harold L. Ickes, Public Works Administration, Washington, D. C.

Week ago I wired you with further reference to the Brazos River project and in view of your statement that Texas had already received more than her share of PWA money requested list of all PWA projects approved for Texas that we might if possible secure withdrawal of less important projects sufficient to leave you in position to give favorable consideration to the most important project in the state that of constructing hydroelectric and flood control dams on Brazos and its tributaries. To date I have not received this in-

formation from your office but do have list prepared by a bonding company that purports to include all Texas allocations. This list only shows \$15,096,962.00. Obviously if this is correct Texas is still entitled to many times more PWA money and we could not justify a request of any of the listed sponsors to withdraw their applications under such circumstances although it is well known that many of the projects listed are not desired. I therefore again express the hope that you will instruct your office to furnish us a list of all approved Texas applications by return air mail that we may be in position to cooperate with you in securing funds for this vital work. Many Texas rivers now in flood stage emphasizing necessity of Brazos development. You have shown commendable effort to use PWA money so as to secure lasting benefits. There can be no more permanent or substantial benefits conferred on Texas than control of flood waters of greatest river system thru most fertile and populous areas with incidental development of substantial hydroelectric power.

Senators Brownlee of Austin and Roberts of Pettus Wednesday urged that Carr Collins, Dallas, be selected as chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee to succeed Myron G. Blalock of Marshall, who has held the office for the last four years. Roy Sanderford, Belton, former State Senator who was Central Texas manager of the gubernatorial campaign of Tom Hunter joined in the suggestion.

Collins was one of the chief lieutenants of W. Lee O'Daniel. Quoting Roberts and Brownlee: "Since O'Daniel is the nominee it is fitting that one of his leaders should become chairman of the State Committee, and we intend to introduce a resolution at the county convention endorsing Collins for the job."

## stumpin' the state

W. Lee O'Daniel's smashing triumph over 11 opponents for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination was not the only political surprise of last Saturday's election.

Each of the four major State races completely upset the predictions of politicians, betters and political prognosticators. Dallas' mystery candidate, Pierce Brooks, surprised his own supporters by running first in the race for lieutenant governor. Returns from 252 of the 254 counties in Texas, including 118 complete, gave Brooks 251,560 to 221,815 for Coke Stevenson, Junction, twice speaker of the house of representatives and the pre-election favorite to win. State Senator G. H. Nelson, Lubbock, who wants a one house legislature, dropped to third place. He had been figured to go into a runoff with Stevenson.

Brooks is a mystery man to most Dallasites. He is listed in neither the city nor the telephone directory. Two years ago he ran for governor and polled 33,391 votes. Early this year he debated which State office to seek. He thought of running for governor again, but finally settled on the lieutenant governor's office as his goal.

He campaigned as a businessman candidate. He patterned his campaign to some extent after W. Lee O'Daniel's but in a modified form. He used a sound truck and late in the campaign added a truck float on which rode a figure of himself driving out of the Capital men labeled professional politicians.

Politicians who didn't take him seriously now are sitting up and taking notice. They foresee a real battle in the runoff between him and the veteran in politics—Coke Stevenson. The wave that carried O'Daniel into the nomination for governor might turn back and carry Brooks into the lieutenant governor's job.

Dallas voters didn't pay much attention to Brooks during his campaign but they voted for him just the same. His Dallas county vote was 14,941. Attorney General William McCraw, an other Dallas candidate, only received 11,446 in the governor's race.

Gerald C. Mann, Dallas attorney and former secretary of state surprised the politicians by running Lieutenant Governor Walter F. Woodul of Houston a close race in the race for attorney General. Woodul's backers maintained he would win without a runoff, but latest returns from the Texas Election Bureau gave Woodul 291,415 to Mann's 276,196 with 313,709 going to the W. Yarborough, Robert Calvert and Lewis C. Goodrich.

In the race for Railroad commissioner, C. V. Terrell, the incumbent was conceded a place in the runoff and John Wood of Austin member of the highway commission was regarded as the leading contender for runoff honors with Terrell. In the early balloting Wood led the entire field. Later returns put Terrell ahead and G. A. Jerry Sadler of Longview copped a place in the runoff.

On the basis of present returns Terrell has 247,550, Sadler 216,547 and Wood 188,707. Robert A. Stuart of Fort Worth, former state senator ran a poor fourth with 106,220; Frank Morris, who lost to Ernest O. Thompson two years in a runoff race, and O. C. Christie trailed the field of six with 64,635 and 24,366 respectively.

es and incumbent William H. McDonald; Supreme Court, incumbent Richard Critz and W. H. Davidson of Beaumont; Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals unexpired term, Harry N. Graves and James A. Stephens.

Incomplete returns gave McDonald 382,356 to 206,110 for Giles in the race for land commissioner. Judge Critz had 312,355 to 303,442 for Davidson. Graves led Stephens with 299,187 to 274,374. O'Daniel's victory in the gubernatorial race on the battle cry of "oust the professional politicians" enhances the chances of victory for the three "outs" in the races for lieutenant governor, attorney general and railroad commissioner. Walter Woodul, present lieutenant governor, is expected to be re-elected.

### STUMPIN' THE STATE—

tenant governor; Coke R. Stevenson, long a member of the legislature, and C. V. Terrell for 52 years in Texas politics, constitute the "ins" who will battle for the next month against the younger "outs", that is, Gerald Jerry Mann, Pierce Brooks, and G. A. Jerry Sadler.

Interest in the Texas congressional races centered on the defeat of Maury Maverick of San Antonio, ardent new dealer and friend of the C. I. O. by Paul J. Kilday. In the third district, Morgan Sanders, slated to become chairman of the powerful house ways and means committee, was defeated, running third. Another new dealer, W. D. MacFarlane, who recently got a warm greeting from President Roosevelt, trailed Ed Gossett in the Wichita Falls district.

There will be at least five new members in the Forty-Sixth Senate with five incumbents facing runoffs in their campaigns for reelection. Six members of the House were defeated in the first primary and 20 others face second primary campaigns, according to a compilation by E. R. Lindley, a member of the House staff, while 42 did not seek reelection. That will mean a minimum turnover of 48 members and a possible maximum of 68, should all in the runoff be defeated, which is not probable. Seventy members were reported re-elected.

Lindley's canvass reported defeat of two Senators, the veteran T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, dean of the Senate and sharp critic of numerous new deal policies, and E. M. Davis of Brownwood, who is completing his first term in the upper house.

Two Senators retired voluntarily, Frank Rawling of Fort Worth and Ben G. O'Neal of

Wichita Falls. Senators unopposed for re-election were Clay Cotten of Palestine, Claude Isbell of Rockwall, L. J. Sulak of La Grange and R. A. Weinert of Seguin.

Both of the runnersup in the gubernatorial contest, Ernest O. Thompson and William McCraw, tendered their congratulations to the eight week politician who bested them.

"In all sincerity," Thompson messaged O'Daniel, "I offer my wholehearted congratulations on your unprecedented victory and my earnest co-operation in every effort to promote the welfare of the people of Texas.

Attorney General McCraw telegraphed O'Daniel he hoped O'Daniel would not dissappoint the people of Texas.

"The people have given you an overwhelming expression of their confidence and trust," McCraw wired. "With this gift of their highest office goes a glorious opportunity and tremendous responsibility. I hope you will not disappoint our people."

McCraw who finished third in the governor's race which O'Daniel won told newspaper men in his Austin office:

"I got a smashing nomination to go into the private practice of law. Outside of my home box, Galveston county and Duval county, it looks like the people were overwhelmingly for me for that."

How did O'Daniel poll from the start to the finish of tabulations?

Here's the ration as compiled by the Texas Election Bureau, based on periodical returns:

Saturday night: Sevent p. m. 40.8 per cent of the total vote. Then 40.4, 45.7, 48.7, 49.74, 49.84 and finally 50.9 at 1:30 a. m. Sunday.

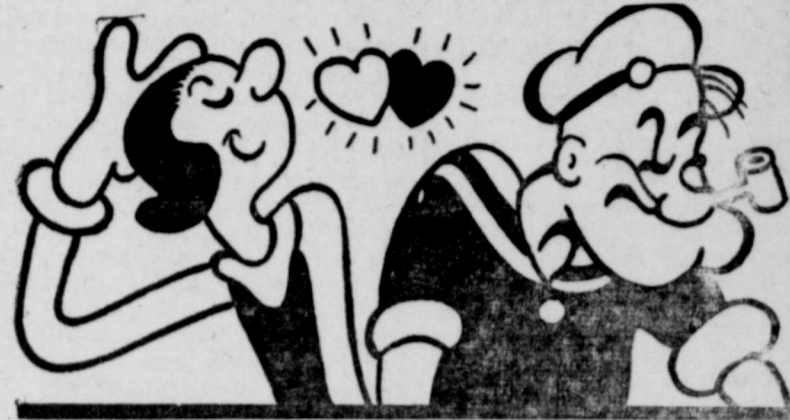

Robert stopped in Fort Worth on his way back home from the Pacific Coast. He accompanied President Roosevelt on his transcontinental trip recently and after bidding the Chief Executive goodby at San Diego went to Seattle to see Postmaster General Farley off on his trip to Alaska.

He called on O'Daniel at his residence and spent several minutes chatting with him.

"That man is no political fanatic," Robert said to reporters as he left the home. "He's a real fellow and knows what he is doing."

Robert said he had given O'Daniel his pledge of support of the national party, and commented that "He's my kind of a Democrat."

Robert was particularly impressed with O'Daniel's advocacy of the industrial development of Texas, and said that it "is bound to come—nothing can stop it."

Commenting on the magnitude of O'Daniel's vote in Saturday's primary, Robert said, "It certainly was a conclusive vote, and that's the kind I like to see. It is a full and complete expression of the will of the people, which is the very essence of a democracy"

Governor Allred was elated at the victory of O'Daniel. Allred called O'Daniel's victory "a victory not only unparalleled in the history of Texas, but of the nation."

"I have today wired Mr. O'Daniel my sincere and hearty congratulations," the governor said, "It is his personal victory and due to his efforts alone."

"Unquestionably Mr. O'Daniel has a big job ahead. He cannot carry on his program without the wholehearted cooperation of all the people and all other public officials. I hope he gets it; and personally and officially I shall be glad to assist him in any possible manner."

"W. Lee O'Daniel is a fine, clean Christian gentleman. He has a fine family, and Mrs. O'Daniel is a lovely lady. They are simple and unpretentious, but the type of family any should be happy to have in their own home. When they get to know Mr. O'Daniel, even those who did not support him will in my opinion find they have a governor of whom they will be proud."

Friends of O'Daniel were called on by Governor Allred to attend county conventions and choose State convention delegates friendly to the program of the program of the nominee.

As Allred called on friends of the nominee, as well as his, to attend county conventions to launch a program of cooperation with O'Daniel, the machinery of the Democratic party was made ready for an official canvass of the results of the election.

Van M. Kennedy, secretary of the State Democratic Executive Committee, sent forms to county chairmen for reporting results of State and District races. The State committee probably will meet in Austin Aug. 6 to canvass the returns and Kennedy said he hoped to have 100 per cent complete tabulations.

The official call will go out this week from Myron Bialock, chairman of the State committee for the State convention Sept. 13 at Beaumont, which will adopt the party platform. Kennedy said there was no prospect of major controversial issue at the convention, which usually is dominated by friends of the gubernatorial nominee. With O'Daniel receiving such a large vote, it is expected that his friends will encounter no difficulty at the meeting.

It is at the county convention, Saturday, to which Allred told his friends and those of O'Daniel to go, that delegates to the State convention will be selected. A new slate of party officials also will be chosen.

W. Lee O'Daniel will face many trying problems when he becomes governor of Texas. When he assumes office early in January, his biggest job probably will be to straighten out state finances, something all governors in recent years have been trying

to do with varying results.

The general fund of the state treasury has a deficit of about \$15,000,000. Expenses of the government have been growing by leaps and bounds. If O'Daniel's proposal to pay old age pensions to everyone over 65 should be put into effect, many millions additional outlay would be necessary. The state has never appropriated to make effective constitutional amendments to provide aid to needy blind and dependent children and to set up a retirement fund for school teachers.

Many people, therefore, have asked the question, where will O'Daniel find the money? In his campaign speeches, he usually replied with another question, "Where are they getting the money now to pay the \$150,000,000 expenses of government?"

He said no new taxes were needed, but that he thought many economies could be effected thru consolidation and elimination of unnecessary departments of government. Also he has said there were too many job holders in the state capital and he would go over the pay roll with a fine tooth comb and try to cut off all filled by "influence and pull". Apparently, however, most of the money for his program he expects, judging from his campaign speeches, to obtain thru state industrial development and the increased yield from the taxes now levied.

The question has been asked by his opponents and others as to where he will cut expenses. About 70 per cent of the expenses of government go for operation of the state highway department and maintenance of the school system. The state has a vast highway system and sentiment of the people, as reflected in the legislature, in the past has been strongly in favor of a large highway building and maintenance program.

Few ever try to do anything unfavorable to the schools. The state appropriation for schools including aid to rural schools, are the largest in history, and the school men say they need still more money because of growing demands.

Heavy outlay also is being made for the eleemosynary system, including insane asylums, but the state board of control, which supervises the system, says its need have not been met. The number of insane in the state is increasing at a faster rate than the population as a whole, and because of inadequate facilities, there are many insane kept in

jails because there is no other place to send them.
