### HWY. 36 AS HINES SHOWS INTEREST

With 190 registered delegates and others Highway 36 Association had a very successful meeting at the Ritz Theatre, with the Hon, Harry Hines, of the State Highway Commission as the principle speaker. Congressman Clyde Garrett and Clark Coursey of the West Texas Chamber of ommerce were also important speakers.





Gerald C. Mann, who polled over 328,000 votes for attorney general in the first primary, brought his vigorous runoff campaign here Saturday, speaking before a large crowd and pledging a constructive, efficient and capable administration. Mann, waging the same strenious campaign he made in the primary, had seven speeches in central Ttxas cities on his Friday ieinerary.

> "As attorney general I shal' cooperate with the governor and of Texas. Too long have many in state positions failed to work in harmony because of conflicting political ambitions."

Mann reasserted his premise of a continuous fight on all rackets existing in the state.

"When I announced for atterney general last February I was the first candidate in any race to pledge a finish fight on the political racket" he said. "That pledgstands as strong today as it did then and it shall continue to be my battle cry after I am elected.

"When I am attorney general those racketeers, the influence peddling lawyers, the self-styled influential politicians, the fixers, sit enthroned, I want to mane our capitol building a symbol of justice where any man may go and get what he is pustly entitled to without the aid of any schemer."

Mann recited his qualifications to the office of attorney general. said he would place his record as a lawyer against that of his opponent and he challenged his opponent to cite any legal or governmental accomplishment of his 21 years in public office at Austin that might compare with the securities act.

"When I become your attorney general I promise that I shall do what my conscience tells me is right and just. I shall sacrifice no principle to keep it."
