the farm as a whole," Johnson said. "This extra profit is gained
in several ways. In the first place my crops will yield more, are easier to cultivate and will not suffer during summer months. The
system of terracing, strip. system of terracing, strip crop-
ping and contour tillage will prevent any further losses of seed and young crops during heavy spring rain. Another source of additional income will be from the proper use of land which was idle under
the old plan." the old plan."

Freeman farm two large gullies had already appeared thru the cultivated field. The new plan, which was made with the assistance of cians Conservation Service technicians, eliminated one of the gul-
lies by terracing. The other was fenced out and sodded to serve as a waterway to outlet the terrace system. This strip is connected to the pasture and will furnish additional grazing area on land which heretofore produced no income.
