## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OKEHS CENTRAL TEXAS C. OF COM.

At a meeting of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce directors, Friday morning, they unanimously approved the proposed Central Texas Chamber of Commerce, and the suggested budget assigned to Gatesville of approximately \$275. a year for its maintenance.

We are also advised by L. A. Wilson, General Manager of the Waco Chamber of Commerce, that that body has also unanimously approved their budget of \$3,733 and the organization of the Cen-

tral Texas Chamber of Commerce. This organization will act for Central Texas in the same capacity as the W.T.C.C., the E.T.C.C. and the other district or sectional chamber of commerce bodies.

Preliminary work was started in this new regional chamber of commerce early this spring, and since then, a committee, including H. K. Jackson of Gatesville, has done considerable work toward developing this splendid idea for all of Central Texas.

### TWO ARE CHARGED WITH SILVER CITY BURGLARY

Sheriff J. H. Brown this week end, picked up Eugene Vick and "Preacher" Ellis, charged with burglarizing a store at Silver City, July 17. Also, E. A. Coleson, alleged to be operating a "fence" or store for the disposal of stolen property, was nabbed, charged with concealing and possessing stolen goods.

About \$120.00 worth of groceries was said to have been stolen from the Silver City store, and the entire loot was recovered at E. A. Coleson's store, according to Sheriff Brown, with the exception of three buckets of coffee and a case of salmon. Coleson said he paid a case of cheap liquor and \$21.00 for the \$120.00 worth of groceries. Vick is being held in the local jail and Ellis is in jail at Belton. Coleson made bond and was released.

### TRUCKS BARRED FROM FIVE HIGHWAYS ON SUNDAY: EFFECTIVE AUG. 1

The railroad commission Thursday issued an order, effective August 1, barring commercial trucks from certain heavily traveled roads on Sundays and various holidays.

Roads on which for-hire truck traffic will be prohibited are: Galveston to Houston, U. S. highway 75; San Antonio to Beaumont, U. S. highway 90; San Antonio to Fort Worth, U. S. highway 81; Hillsboro to Dallas, U. S. highway 77, and Fort Worth to Longview via Dallas, U. S. highway 80.

Jerry Sadler, member of the commission, announced the order had been passed "for the purpose of protecting human lives which are sacrificed upon most heavily congested state highways over the week end and during holidays."

Sadler asserted the order would not hamper farmers and other private haulers who owned their own truck and that exceptions would be made for trucks transporting fresh meats, fish, poultry, poultry products, milk and dairy products, fresh fruits and vegetables and any commodity requiring refrigeration in transit.

## TAYLOR YOUNG BITTEN BY RATTLE- SNAKE FRIDAY P. M.

Taylor Young, farmer, returned to his home after three days in the local hospital where he was treated for a rattlesnake bite.

The accident occurred about six o'clock Friday afternoon as Young was doing some work on his farm between Pancake and Jonesboro. His screams caught the ear of a neighbor's small son, who ran to the Young home and notified them of the accident. When they reached the scene of the accident Young was unconscious and suffering from hemorrhage. They rushed him to the local hospital where he was administered the rattlesnake serum.

Young was bitten on an artery in his ankle, which cause the poison to circulate through his body more rapidly than if it had been a flesh wound.
