## Prepared for German Tanks



"No tanks" say these effective anti-tank guns of Poland's army. Here the gunners are ready for the advancing German army on the Polish border. Officials of the Polish army place a great deal of confidence in the guns, which have proved successful in halting mechanized forces.



Major battle for Warsaw in progress. Polish troops holding their own, but Germans don't agree. It is not known.

Slovaks are pushing east along the Polish front.

On the Western fronts, French advances are reported on a 12 mile front. Attack being made on 100 mile front, which will probably be called the battle of the Saar River.

So far the Allies have lost 14 ships, Germans 5, Dutch 1, and Greek 1.

Broadcast from Paris: 4:35. Germans according to the Dutch, 55 of them, have crossed the frontier and "quit". Other, according to the French, rowed across the Rhine and gave up.

No. 16. Despite the enemies resistance we continue to make progress along a 20 kilometer front, is the last French Communiqué.

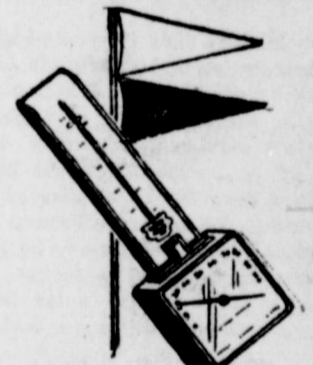
From London: 4:40: Goering's speech says or intimates Germany is bankrupt. Propaganda is still rampant. London newspapers complain of the lack of action, and says "pamphlets can't help the Poles much."

From Germany, 4:30: Germany say Poles bombard west part of Warsaw, and the city is on fire. No reports of the western front, except, there is a little action there.

## Hitler Fears Gestapo Head, Former Police Chief Says

**A**DOLF HITLER fears only one man. Still he is his closest confidant. Heinrich Himmler, head of the dreaded German Gestapo or secret police, is the one man in Europe who dictates to a dictator. "Renegade Catholic, farmer boy who has planted more corpses than seeds, whip hand of the secret police, commander of the black-clad, pure Nordic Death's Head army, sex stimulator to the nation and black-

mailer to half the Reich, Himmler multiplies his power every day. Beginning as Hitler's gunman-in-chief, he has now reached heights where he can hold a gun to the head of Hitler himself," says Albert Grzesinski in the October issue of Cosmopolitan Magazine.

Grzesinski, who was police chief in Berlin in 1933 and served as German demobilization commissioner in 1919, is now chairman of the French Government's refugee committee in Paris, a position which gives him access to confidential reports on the work of Himmler's agents both in and out of Germany. He was Home Minister of Prussia at one time and commanded Germany's old secret police. In an interview with Charles Hewitt, Jr., Grzesinski discusses the rise to power and the diabolic operations of Germany's only two hundred per cent Nazi.

"Hitler and Himmler, working together as never before, have brought Himmler's power to an all-time peak with their new 'Grand War Plan,'" says Grzesinski. "It runs as follows: Annexation of a ring of vassal states around the Third Reich. In this area of insulation—Austria, Czechoslovakia and Memel are the start—the next war is to be fought. All the population of these states that cannot be trusted or terrorized will be evacuated and forced to labor in the fields and factories of the Reich. This will free millions of native Germans for the front line service, multiplying Germany's man power in the last war by two."

Himmler is the spearpoint of Hitler's offense as well as his chief of defense, Grzesinski states. "The termites of the Gestapo," he writes, "must bore away at the foundations of any state Hitler wishes to destroy. Himmler foretold the march on Prague six months ahead."

Half private army and expeditionary force and half spies and executioners, the Gestapo makes its chief the greatest tyrant of the modern world, Grzesinski declares. His real genius is twofold—organization and fanaticism. He is the soul of three major persecutions of the Third Reich: Jews, Protestants and Catholics. Himmler is head of 437,000 policemen today, or one to every 135 persons in the German nation. Operating abroad are 5,000 German political police. They and their drafted workers are active in every nation on the globe, including the United States, Grzesinski says, and he adds that what the Gestapo

wants from these representatives and drafted workers abroad are long reports and money.

"Police Chief Himmler is first and foremost commander of a private army, the Schutzstaffel whose bizarre rules, 'Nordic Mission' and systematized sex life are still unfamiliar to America," Grzesinski says. "Its 350,000 members are the cream of the German nation. Applicants must present a family tree pass, certifying pure Aryan ancestry back to 1750. They must be at least 5 feet 7 inches tall, in good health and at least eighteen years old. They must pass a rigid examination on their wholehearted Nazi beliefs and they are required to resign from church memberships, as Christianity is considered weakening."

"Himmler's chief problem is to keep his black-shirted executioners from succumbing to normal human influences, such as friendship, religion and domestic love. No battalion is allowed to serve in its home area, so when ordered to fire on civilian populations, they will be as heartless as their leader. They are not allowed to remain in one district long, lest they fraternize with the masses. Transfers currently take place on an average of every three weeks. This shuttling back and forth, plus the wait for special marriage permits from Hitler, cuts weddings to a minimum. But every official effort is made to provide these youths with less confining entertainment. Consequently, the S.S., or Schutzstaffel, supplies and supports homes for unwed mothers throughout the Reich."

"Himmler is not only Chief of Police, he is also chief fanatic," Grzesinski concludes. When Hitler dies, he is the only man who can carry on all the Fuehrer's fanatic drives and Hitler knows it. He leans on him today as never before."

The policy is a contract between you and the company by which you meet certain provisions specified in the policy, and at some time in the future the company agrees to pay you certain specified sums of money."

"The insurance salesman is the only person who can give specific advice to you on insurance problems, so it is important to give him a complete picture of your financial situation. He can show you how to make a policy fit your needs," Miss Davis adds. "Buy your insurance for savings and protection."

**TOUCH-DOWN TACTICS**

★ UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN... by H. O. (Fritz) Crisler Head Football Coach ★



This is the fourth of a series of six outstanding diagram plays by leading college coaches from Grantland Rice's new Cities Service Football Guide.

DECEPTION has always played a big part in football. By faking a pass and hitting up to the left, I have found this play to be valuable in offensive football. The ball goes to the No. 4 back who fakes a pass and hits up following the No. 1 back, inside guard and right tackle. The end blocks in on the tackle and the No. 2 and 3 backs block out the end. The inside guard and right tackle go around the end's block and turn in to block the backer-up. The No. 1 back leads the play up and blocks out on the halfback. With the guard, tackle, and No. 1 back leading the play it makes good interference for the ball carrier to follow. By faking a pass the men backing up the line are held in position.

During the 1938 season, this play was strong for us and worked particularly well in our game with Pennsylvania.

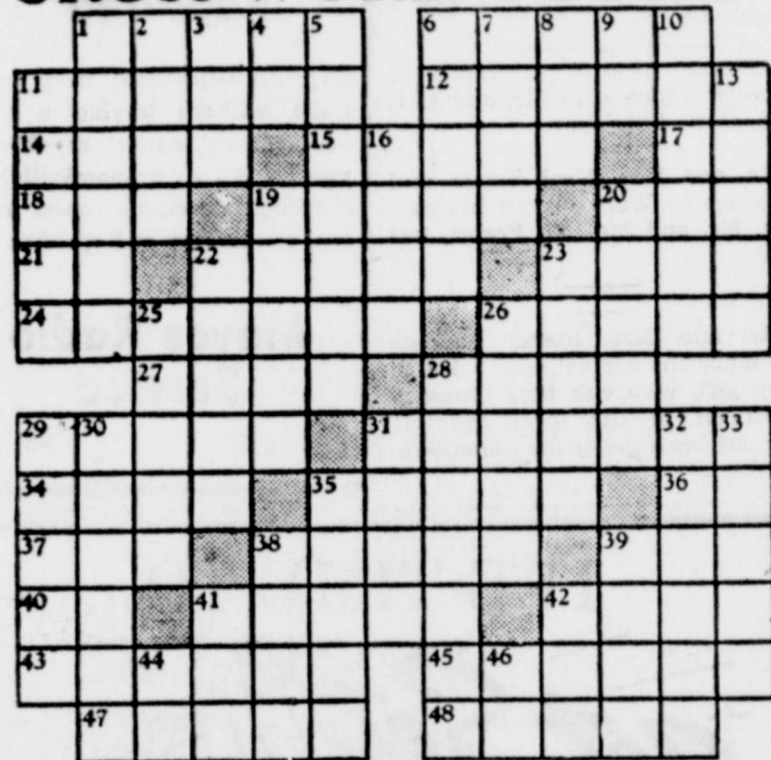

To lift an ordinary cut of meat to the realm of real flavor and distinction use sauces frequently. They are simple to make and add much to your main dishes.

**TOMATO SAUCE**

- 1 tbsp. fat
- 1 slice onion
- 1-2 tbsp. flour
- 1 1-2 cups canned tomatoes
- 1 clove
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1-2 tsp. salt
- Few peppercorns
- Sprig of parsley
- Bit of chopped celery or celery salt or seed.
- Bit of bay leaf

Saute onions in the fat. Add the flour, cook until smooth, add tomatoes and other seasonings. Let simmer until reduced to 1 cup.

**HORSERADISH SAUCE**

- 1-2 cup heavy cream
  - 1-4 cup grated horseradish
  - Soft bread crumbs as needed.
- Whip the cream. Fold in horseradish with sufficient bread crumbs to give it body. Serve at once. This is particularly good with cold meats of hot roast beef. Substitute thick apple sauce for the bread crumbs for occasional variety. Serve with ham.

**BECHAMEL SAUCE**

- 1-2 pint cream
  - 1 1-2 tbsp. milk
  - 1 1-2 tbsp. butter
  - 3 tbsp. flour
  - Salt and pepper
  - 3-4 cup grated Swiss cheese
- Melt butter in double boiler,

add flour and stir until smooth. Add milk and cream gradually, stirring constantly. Cook for about 10 minutes, then add the cheese salt and pepper, cooking a few minutes longer.

**HOLLANDISE SAUCE**

- 2 egg yolks
- 2 tbsp. lemon juice

1-4 cup hot water  
1-4 cup butter creamed  
Salt and paprika

Break eggs in double boiler, beat and add 2 tablespoons lemon juice and water. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from fire and work in butter a little at a time.



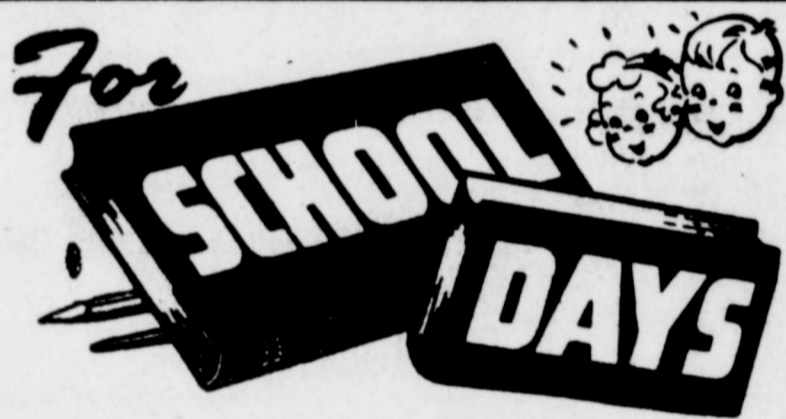

## SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 12

(Concluded from last Friday)

### SECTION 10

The provision hereof providing for Old Age Assistance shall not be construed as a vested right in the receipt of such Old Age Assistance and neither the State, nor any of its agents, shall ever be liable in any way to any recipient for any deficit. The taxes levied in this Amendment shall become effective September 1, 1939, and shall be in addition to all taxes now or which may hereafter be levied by law.

### SECTION 11

On and after January 1, 1940, the State's obligation to pay Old Age Assistance as provided in Section 51-B Article 3 of the Constitution; the State's obligation to provide assistance for the Needy Blind as authorized in Section 51-C Article 3 of the Constitution; the State's obligation to provide assistance to Destitute Children as authorized in Section 51-B Article 3 of the Constitution; the State's obligation to contribute to the Teacher's Retirement Fund as authorized by Section 48-A Article 3 of the Constitution, as well as the State's portion of the cost of collecting the taxes herein levied and the cost of administration

of these Social Security services shall be paid exclusively from the revenue derived from the taxes herein levied and no appropriation shall thereafter be made out of any other State fund for any such purpose nor shall any other taxes be levied for these purposes.

### SECTION 12

The term "Sale" as used herein shall mean and include any person, firm, concern, receiver, trustee, executor, administrator, agent, institution association, partnership, corporation, and any person acting under declaration of trust, as well as the trustees acting under such declarations of trust, or any other group or combination acting as a unit, and the plural as well as the singular number unless the intention to give it a more limited meaning is clearly disclosed by the context.

"Sale" means any transfer of title or possession or both, conditional or otherwise, in any manner or by any means whatsoever of tangible personal property, for a consideration; and a transaction whereby the possession of property is transferred but the seller retains title as security for the payment shall be deemed as sale. A "Retail Sale," or a "Sale at re-

tail" or a retail sales transaction" means a sale to a consumer or to any person for any purpose other than for resale in the form of tangible personal property, and shall include all such transactions as the State Comptroller, upon investigation, finds to be in line of such sales; provided, however, "sale at retail" shall not include an isolated or occasional sale of tangible personal property by a person not engaged in such business.

The term "tangible personal property" means personal property which may be seen, weighed, measured, felt, touched, or is in any other manner perceptible to the senses.

The term "sale for industrial purposes," as used in connection with the sale of gas and electricity energy, means and includes all sales made for industrial uses or purposes and all sales made for the purpose of resale.

### SECTION 13

There is hereby exempted from the provisions of this Amendment and from the computation of the taxes levied, assessed, and payable under this Amendment, all dairy products, when such products are purchased from farmers, processors, distributors, and other persons engaged exclusively in the production, processing, distribu-

tion and sale of dairy products, the first sale by the producer of all horticultural, agricultural, livestock, and poultry products; all sales of newspapers and magazines; all sales of gasoline and cigarettes; all sale of beverages having an alcoholic content of more than one-half of one per cent by volume; all sales in interstate commerce to the extent, and to the extent only, that the State of Texas is prohibited by the Constitution of the United States of America from taxing such sales; all sales by or to the State of Texas or any subdivision thereof; and all sales to the United States Government; all sales involving the acquisition of tangible personal property for resale as a component part or ingredient of other tangible personal property, or for use in processing or treating other tangible personal property for sale to the ultimate consumer, or the acquisition of any tangible personal property to be manufactured, processed or refined is for resale.

### SECTION 14

Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the third Saturday in August, 1939, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing a system of Old Age Assistance, levying social Security taxes for the payment of such Old Age Assistance and providing a source of revenue for the payment of the Destitute Children's Assistance, Teachers' Retirement Benefits and Assistance to the Blind."

And all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the State Constitution providing a system of Old Age Assistance, levying Social Security taxes for the payment of such Old Age Assistance and providing a source of revenue for the payment of Destitute Children's Assistance and Teacher's Retirement Benefits, and assistance to the Blind."

### SECTION 15

The taxes levied by the adoption of this Resolution shall automatically expire on September 1, 1944, unless the qualified electors shall re-adopt the Constitutional Amendment at the General Election in the year 1942. At said General Election the question of repealing the Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted in the following manner:

"For repeal of Section 51-E of Article 3 of the Constitution as adopted in the year 1939."

"Against repeal of Section 51-E of Article 3 of the Constitution as adopted in the year 1939."

In the event the majority of the votes cast at said election favor repeal, the Amendment to the Constitution shall be eliminated therefrom. In event the majority of votes cast are opposed to repeal, then the Amendment as adopted in 1939 shall for all purposes be and remain in effect.

### SECTION 16

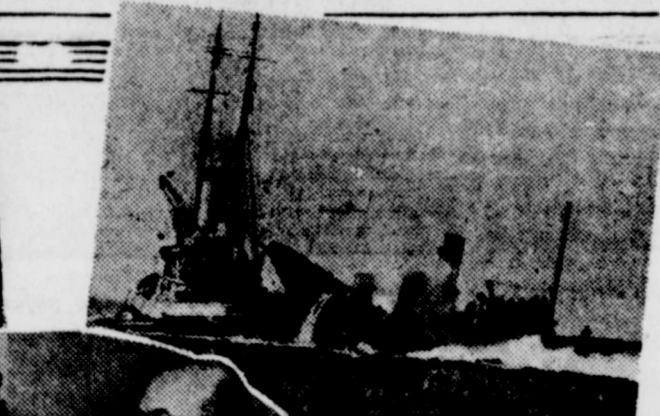
The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

The sum of Twenty Thousand (\$20,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of this State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

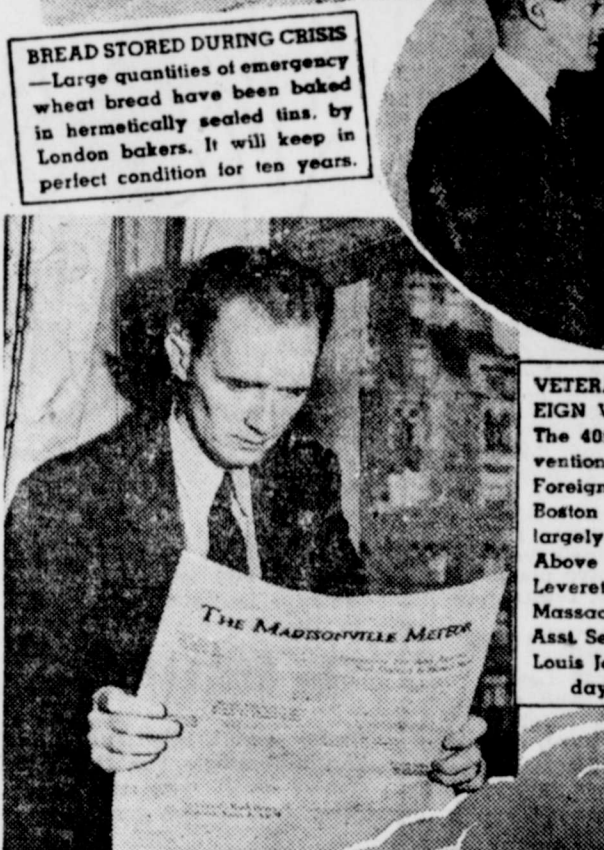

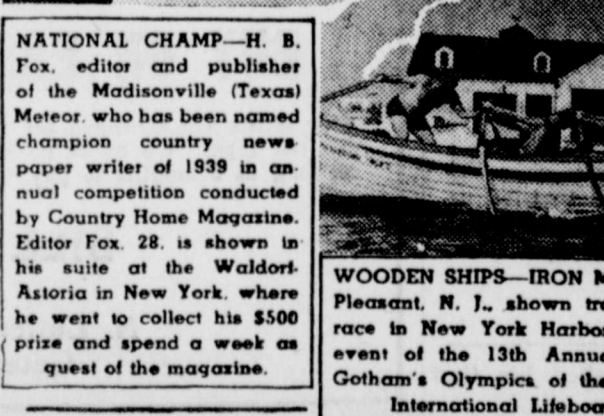
**BREAD STORED DURING CRISIS**  
—Large quantities of emergency wheat bread have been baked in hermetically sealed tins by London bakers. It will keep in perfect condition for ten years.



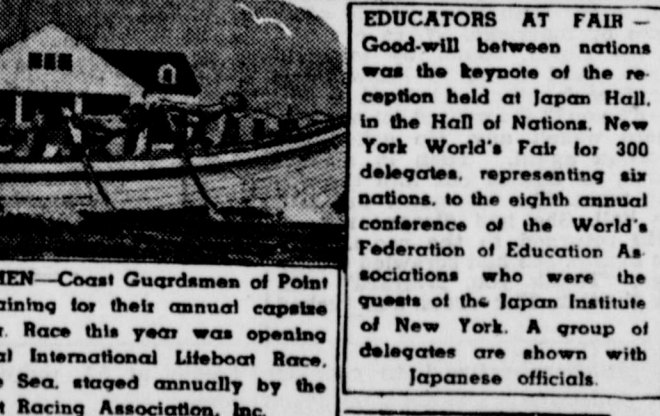

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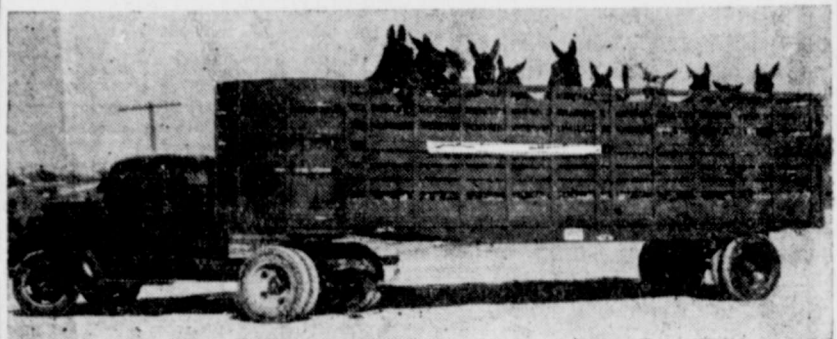
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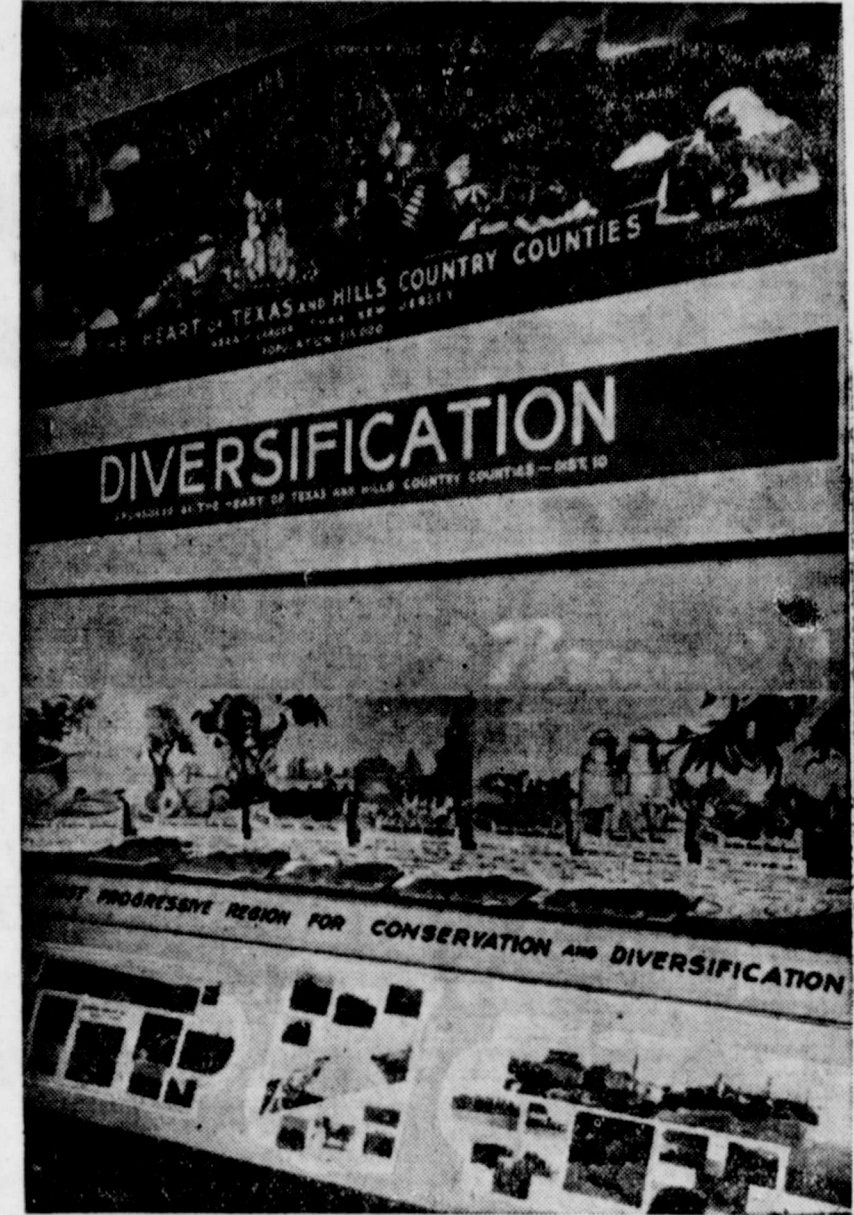
  
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Thousands of people from thirty states have learned interesting and important facts about Gatesville and Coryell county from the Diversified Agriculture display in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Resource and Museum Institute located in Abilene.

The District No. 10 booth, in which Gatesville and Coryell county are included, is one of the most elaborate displays in the entire exhibit hall.

The display is proof that West Texas is not a one or two crop country, but shows that this section grows profitably many and varied products.

Coryell county is shown as a leading producer of many of these products, including corn and oats and many others.

The district sponsoring the Diversification booth is known as the Heart of Texas and Hill Country area and is called in the title line of the booth, "The Country's Most Progressive Region for Conservation and Diversification."

Other counties in the district, in addition to Coryell, are Comanche, McCulloch, Erath, Hamilton, Bosque, Llano, Burnet, Gillespie, Blanco, Mills, Brown, San Saba, Lampasas, Coleman, McLennan, and Mason. The area of these 17 counties is larger than the state of New Jersey. The population of the district is 315,000.

Products featured in the booth paintings, colored cutouts, photographs and on a lighted, moving miniature waterwheel include turkeys, fruits, corn, poultry, dairy products, pecans, peanuts, watermelons, cantalopes, oats and hogs.

In addition, the area is shown to have large production of cotton, livestock, wheat, wool and mohair, and feed stuffs. This section also has manufacturing and wholesaling establishments with net sales of \$142,000,000.

Photographs and paintings also present the section as an ideal hunting and fishing place.

A map showing the counties in the district is seen at the top of the booth. Paintings show industrial plants, beauty spots, livestock feeding pens, fruit and pecan orchards, peanut fields and a dairy farm. Photographs show cotton fields and gins, orchards, irrigation scenes, fields of feed, horses, hogs and poultry.

The exhibit hall also contains individual panels of 95 towns, pointing out their special attractions. Gatesville is invited to install such a panel without charge.

The WTCC exhibit hall, located near U. S. highway 80, one of the

most traveled transcontinental highways in the country, is visited daily by many out-of-town people—more than 10,000 from 30 different states in the last year. It is a unique advertising and publicity medium for every town and county in West Texas, being the only exhibit hall of its kind in the world.

The hall was designed to give a complete picture of West Texas' vast resources, showing some of the history of the area, its past growth and development and pointing out the possibilities and opportunities for future development. The Diversification booth


is one of the ten booths in the hall each showing a major West Texas resource. The other booths are devoted to cattle, wool and mohair, minerals, land, cotton, and feed, oil, industries, wheat, and climate. Thousands of additional tourists are expected to see the hall during the remainder of the summer and numerous school groups will visit the displays this fall.

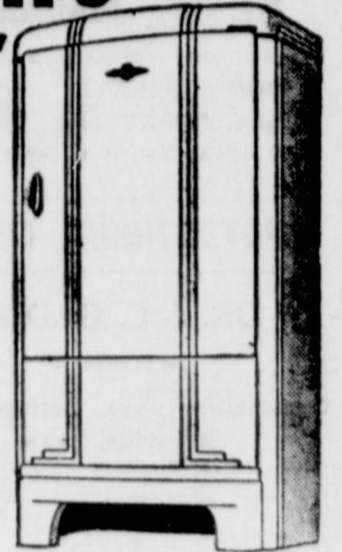

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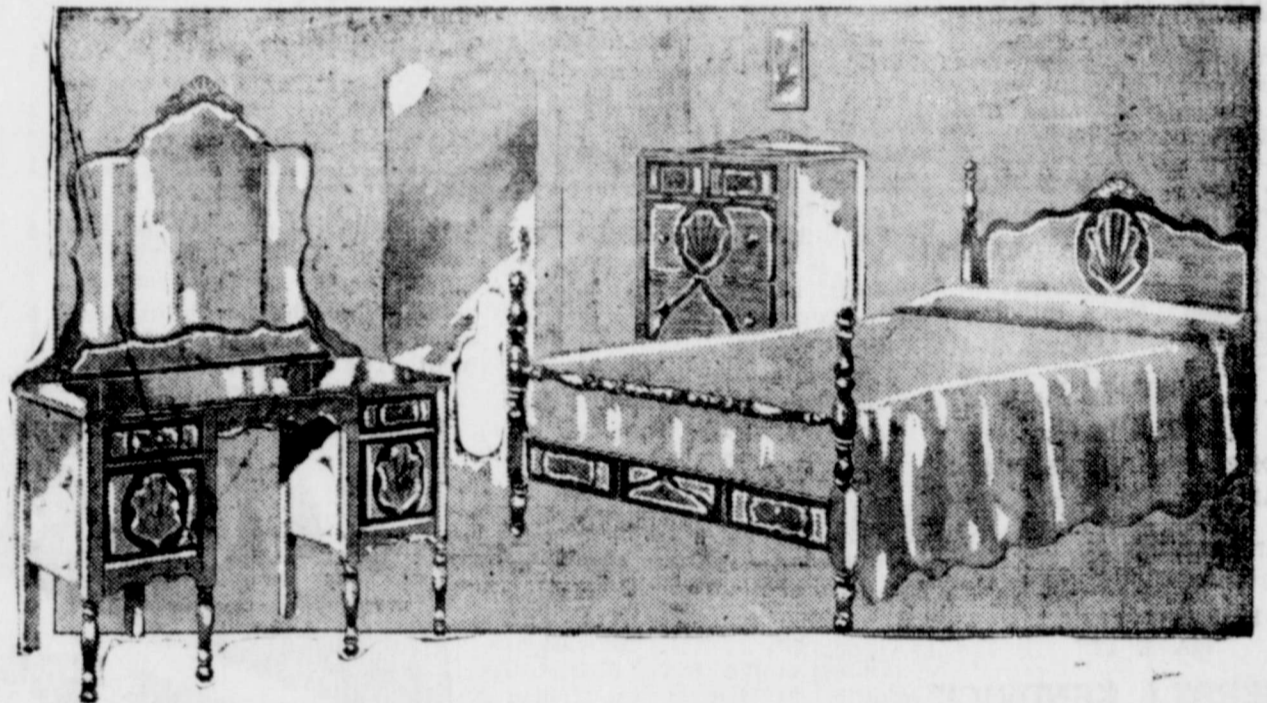
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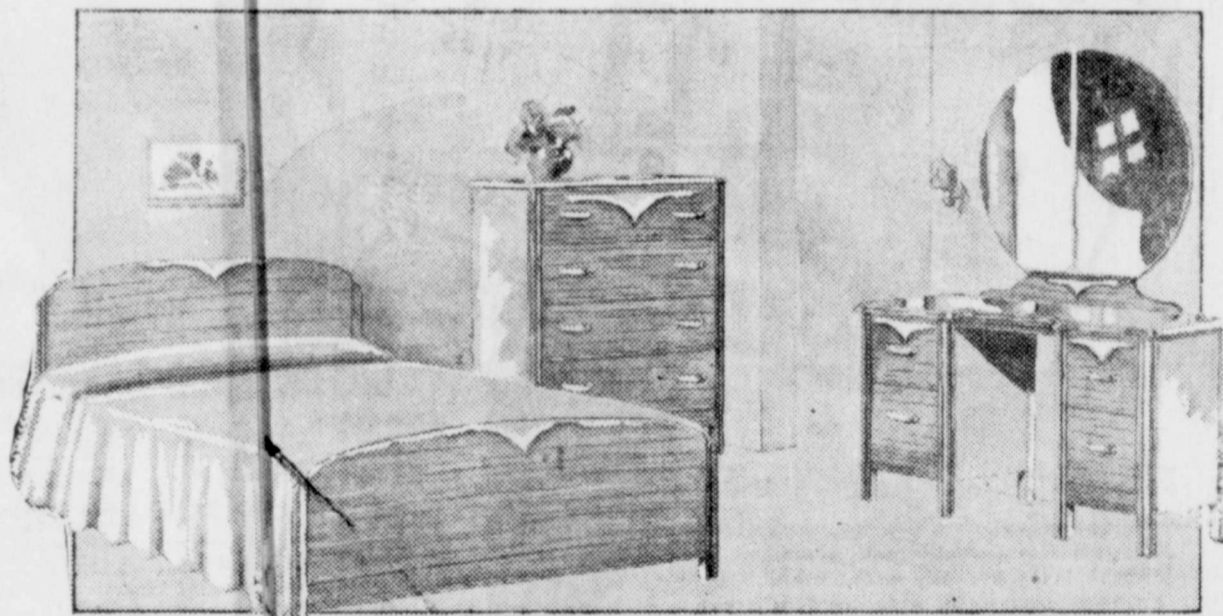
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
